Wanda McMichael



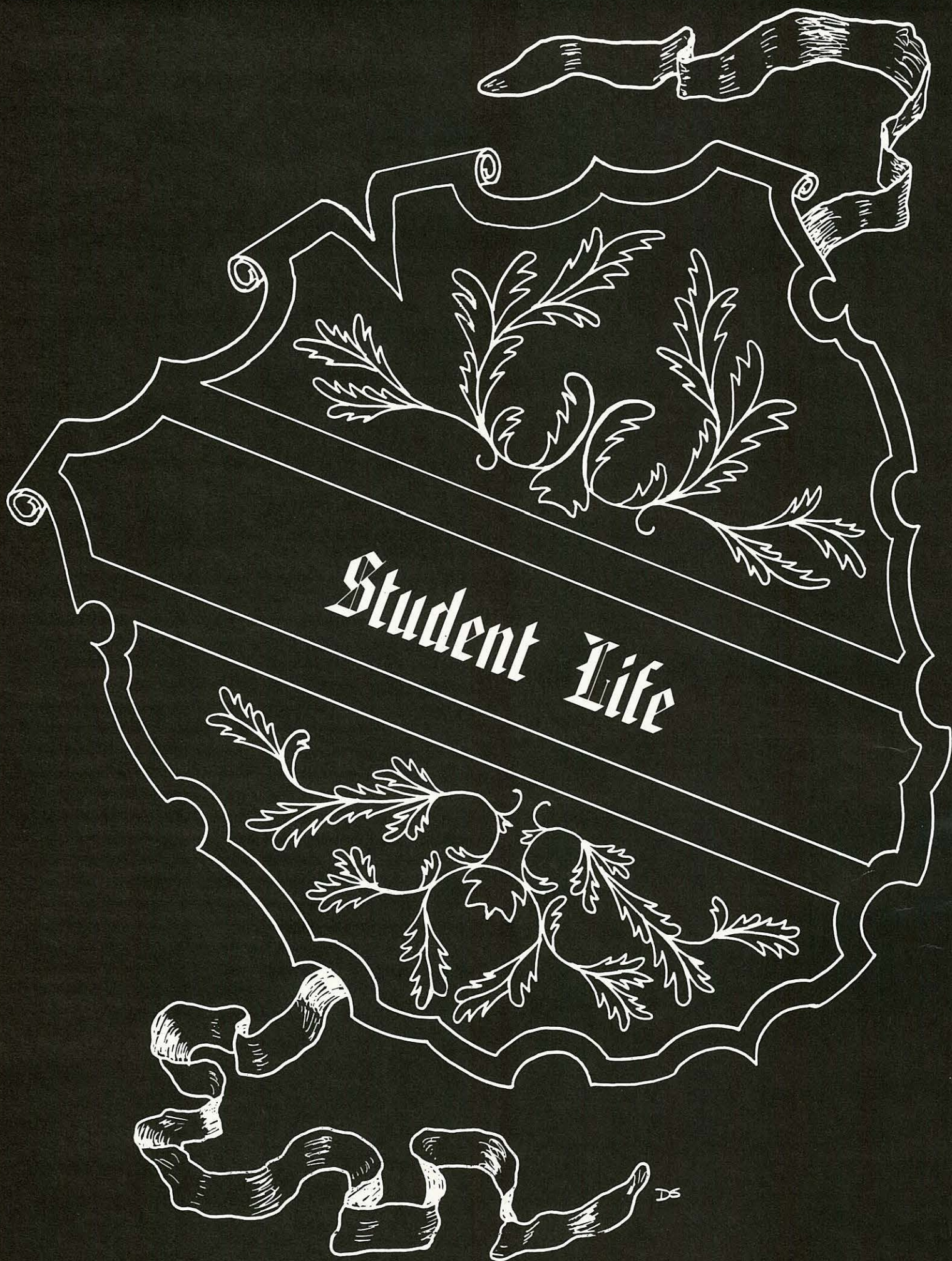




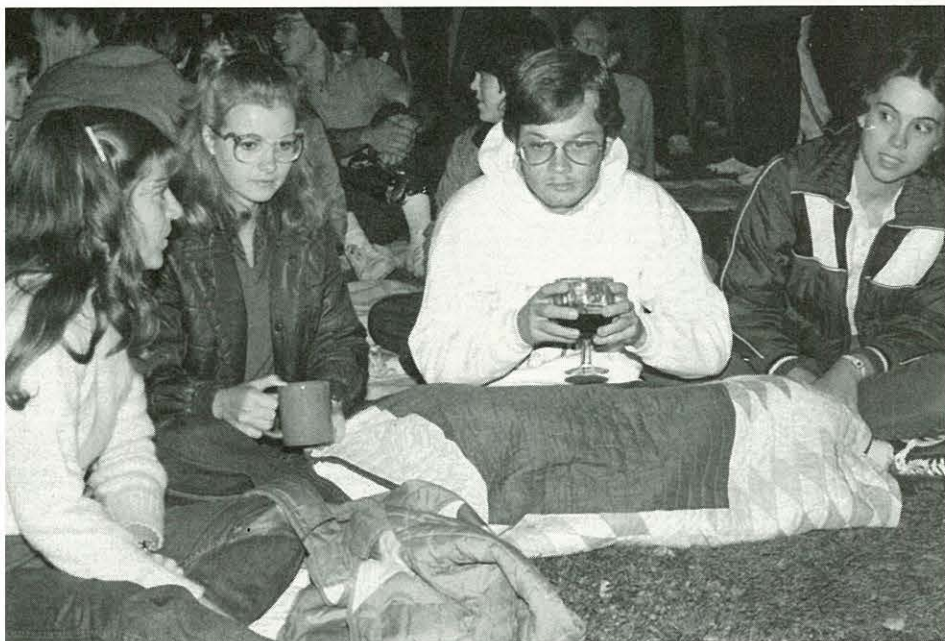
It's time for the first social event of the year; B.Y.O.B. (Bring Your Own Blanket).

It's the NNC Root Beer Fest and it's outside and traditionally it's cold, but the atmosphere at least is warm.

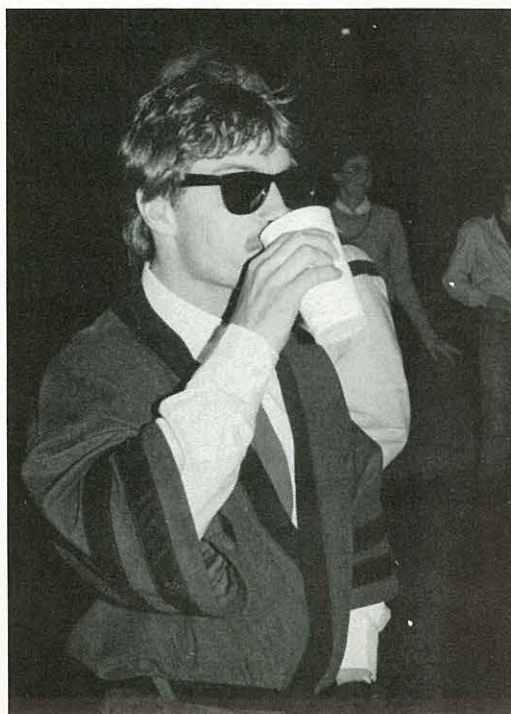

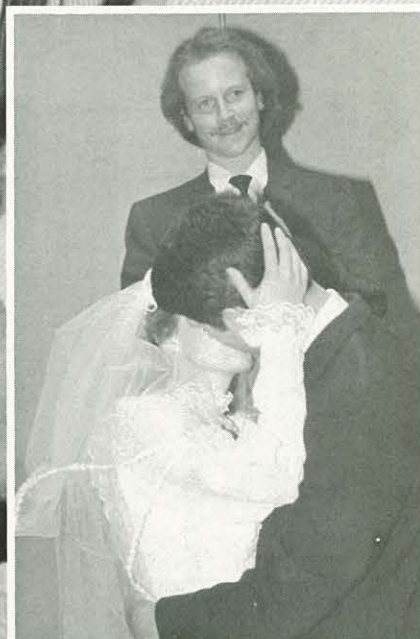
Thornton Wilder calls all of us, through thoughts and words of his characters who grow to maturity and even speak to us after their death to not take lightly the time which we spend in this world.

It is the tearful Emily Webb, who sums up Wilder's point as she watches her loved ones from the grave, "Do any human beings ever realize life while they live it — every minute?"



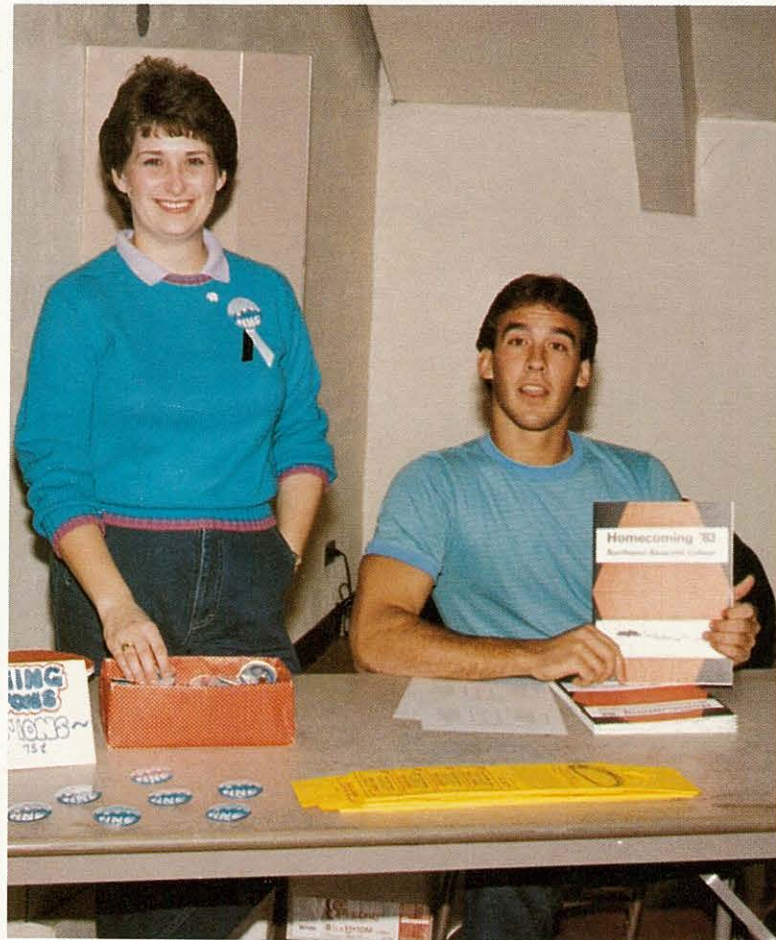

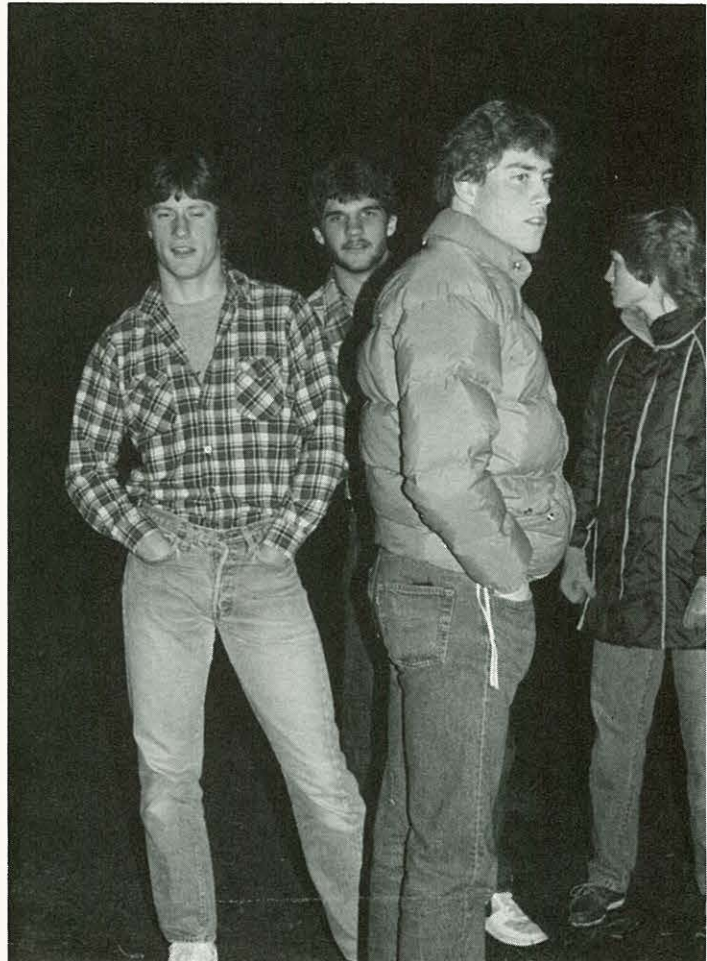


Homecoming Highlights

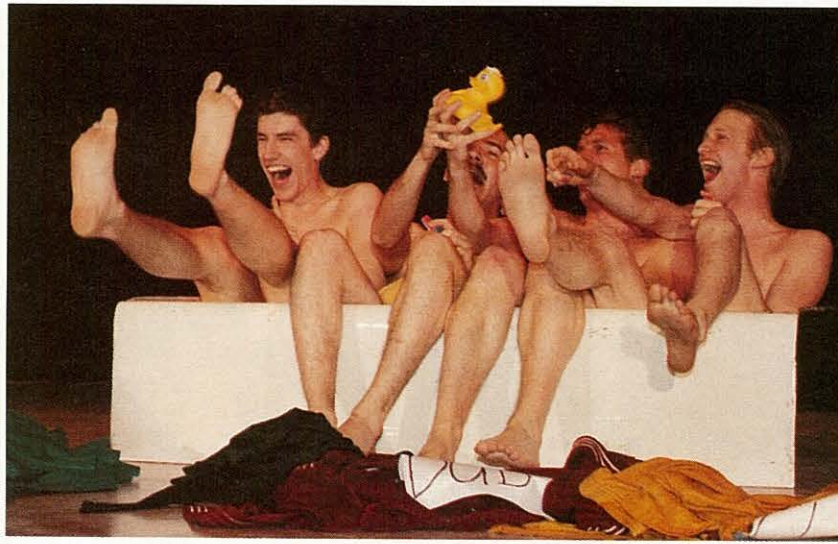

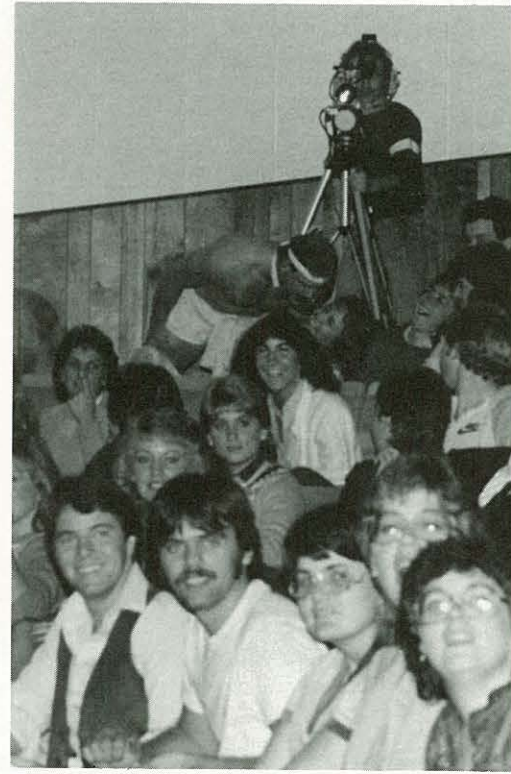


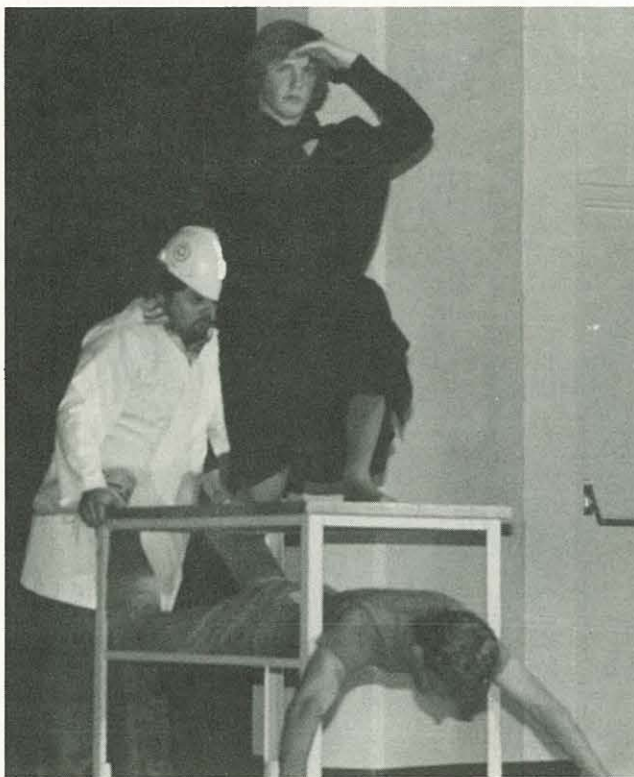
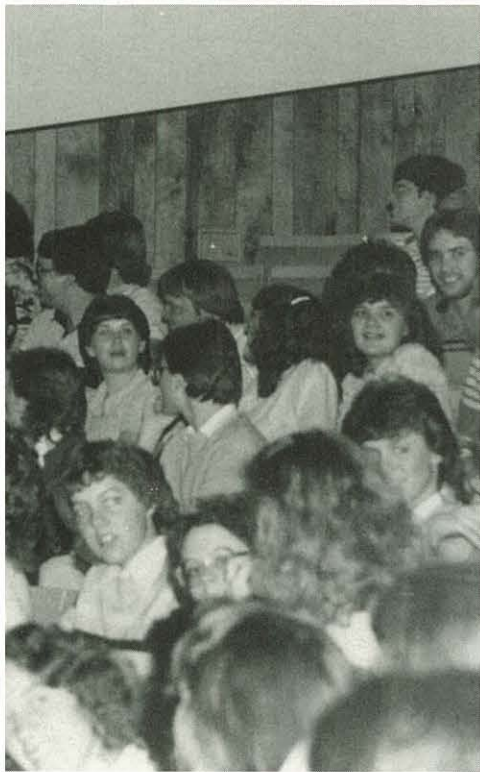
Friday Night Live

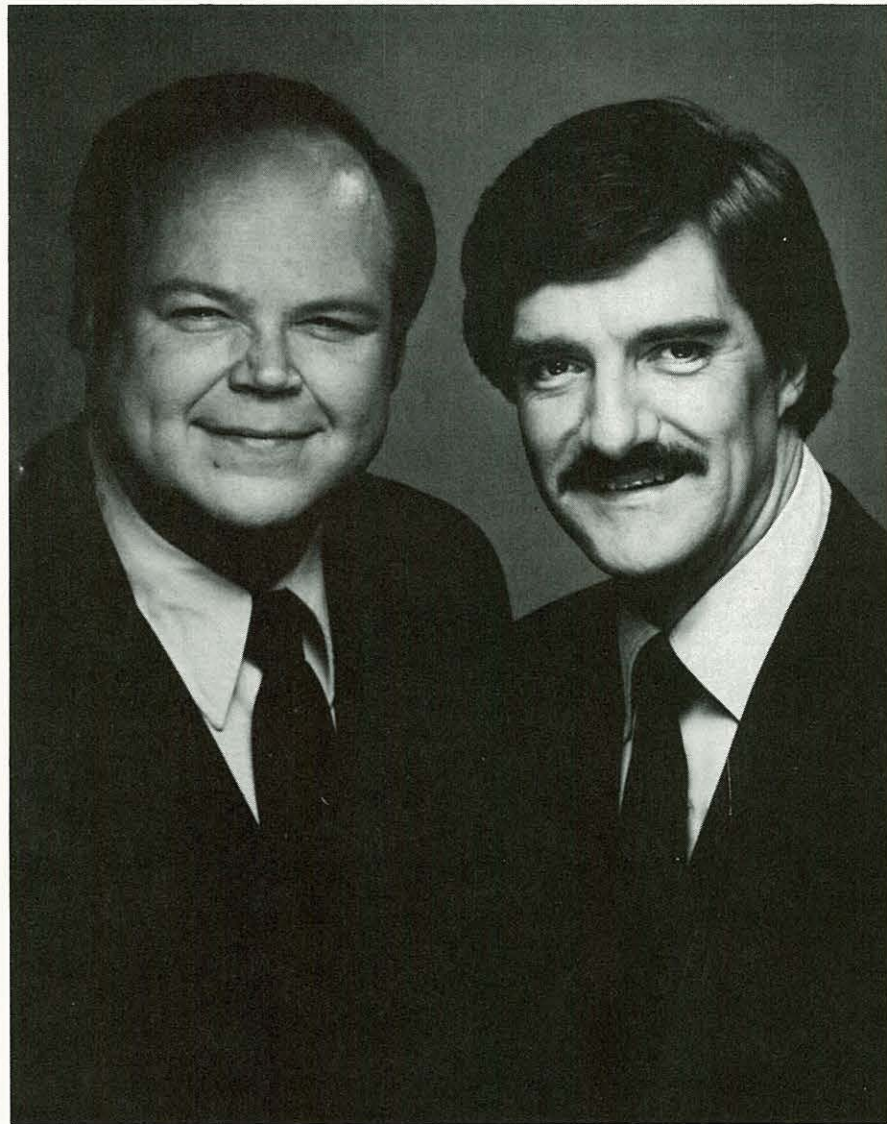

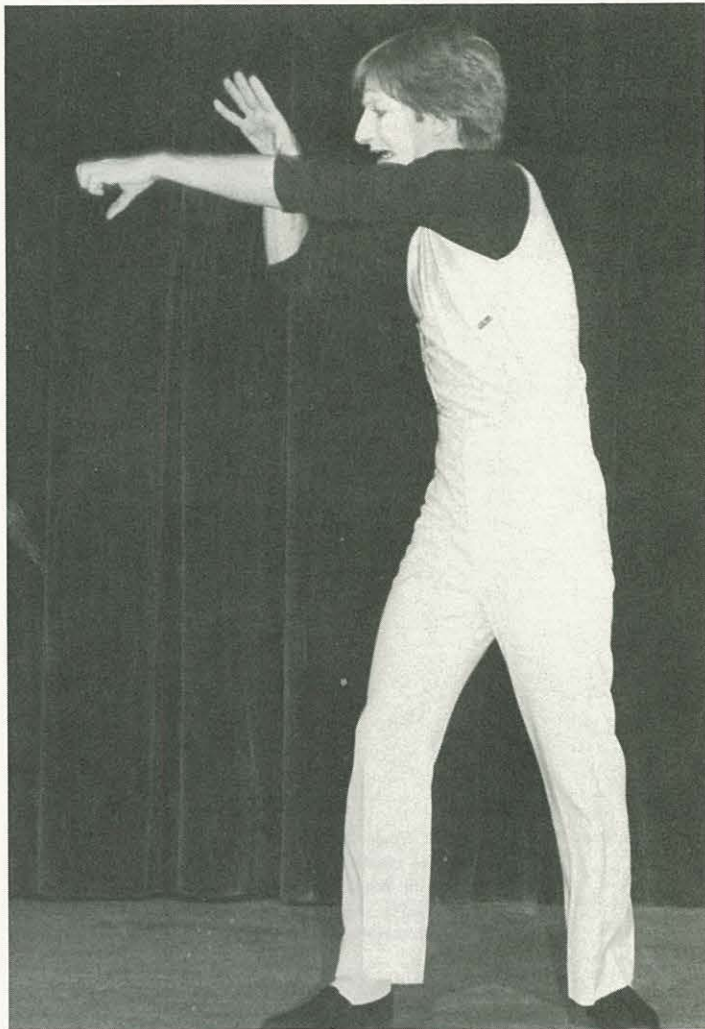
Chapel Highlights

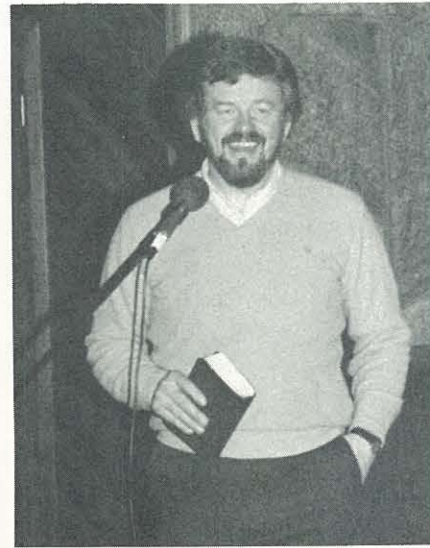

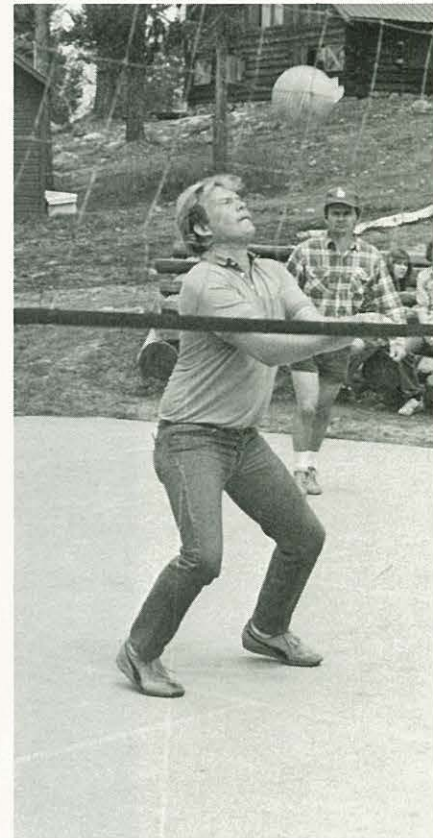




Junior/Senior Retreat

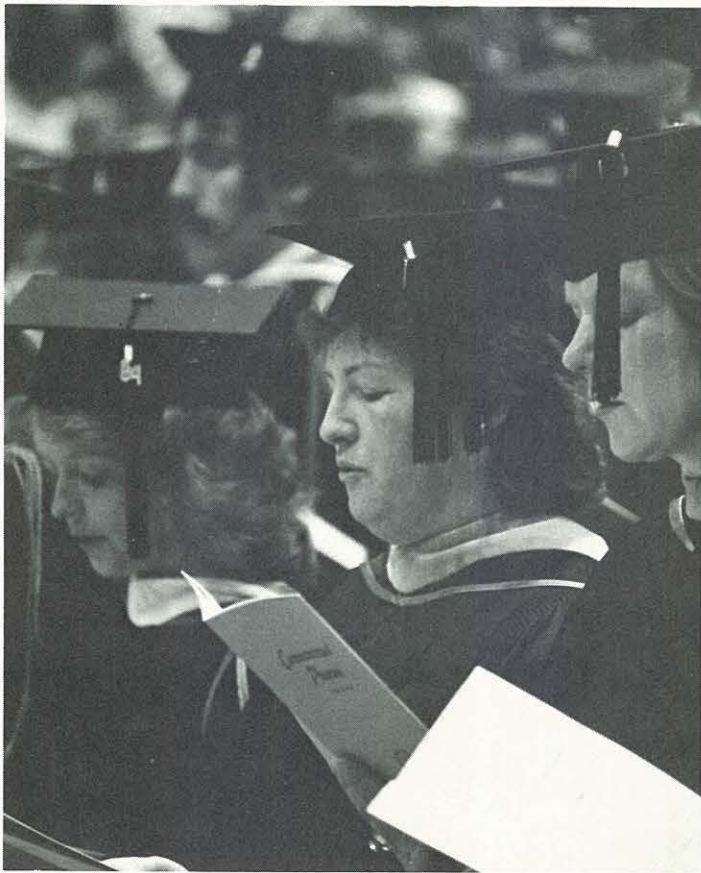


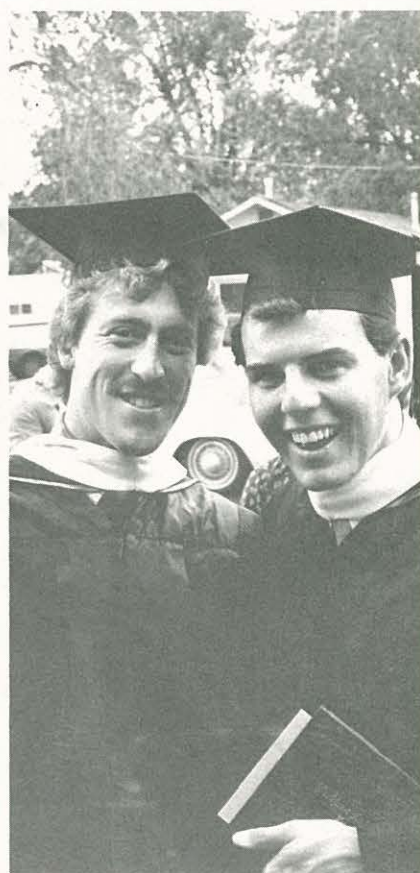
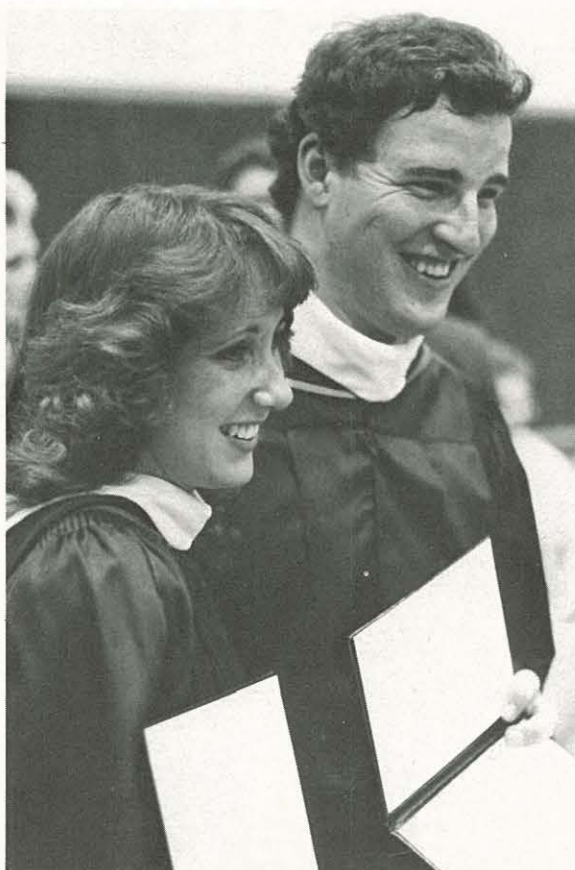
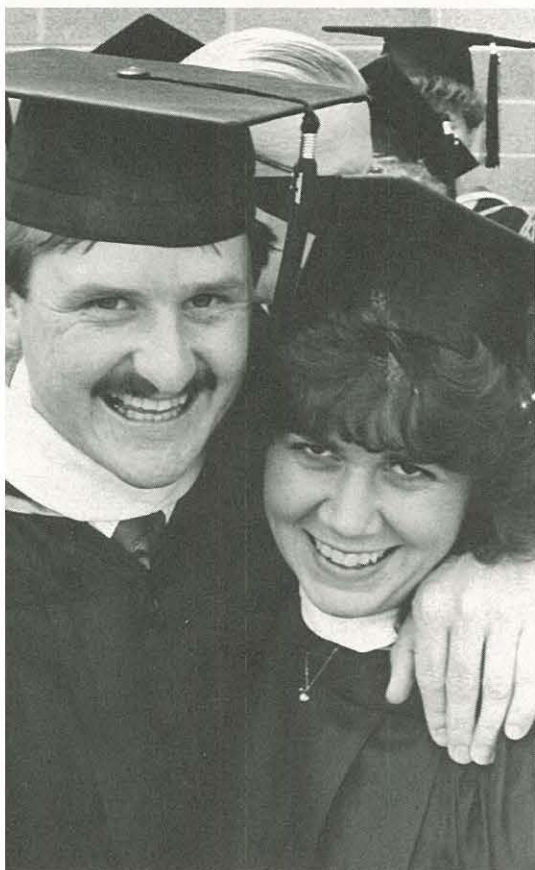


Graduation 1984



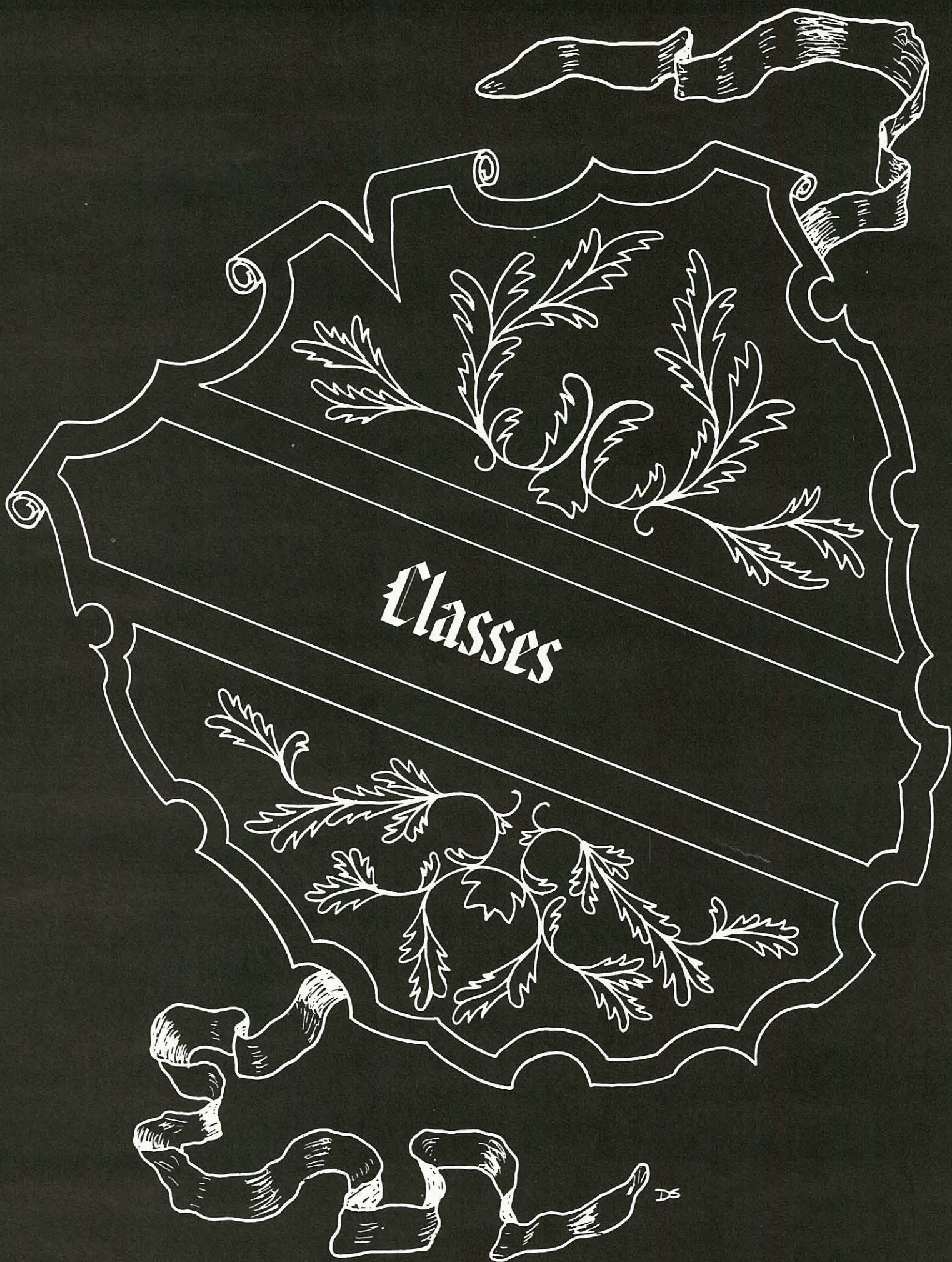






Goodbye . . .

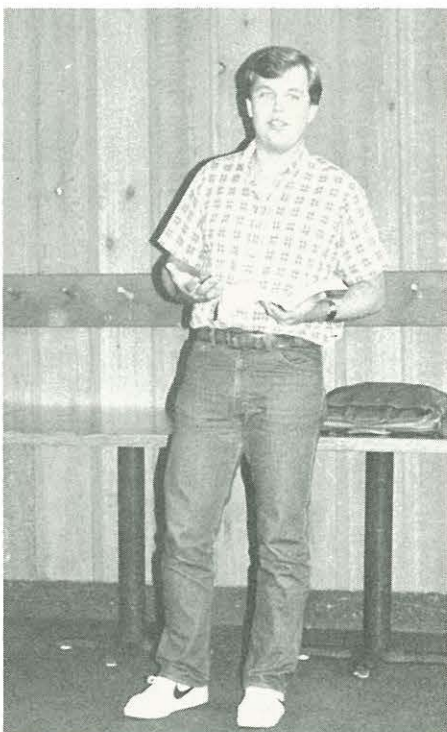


Judicial Board



"We heard several cases this year, however many students are still unaware of their freedom to use the judicial board as a service to them," noted Chief Justice Bob Sherwood.

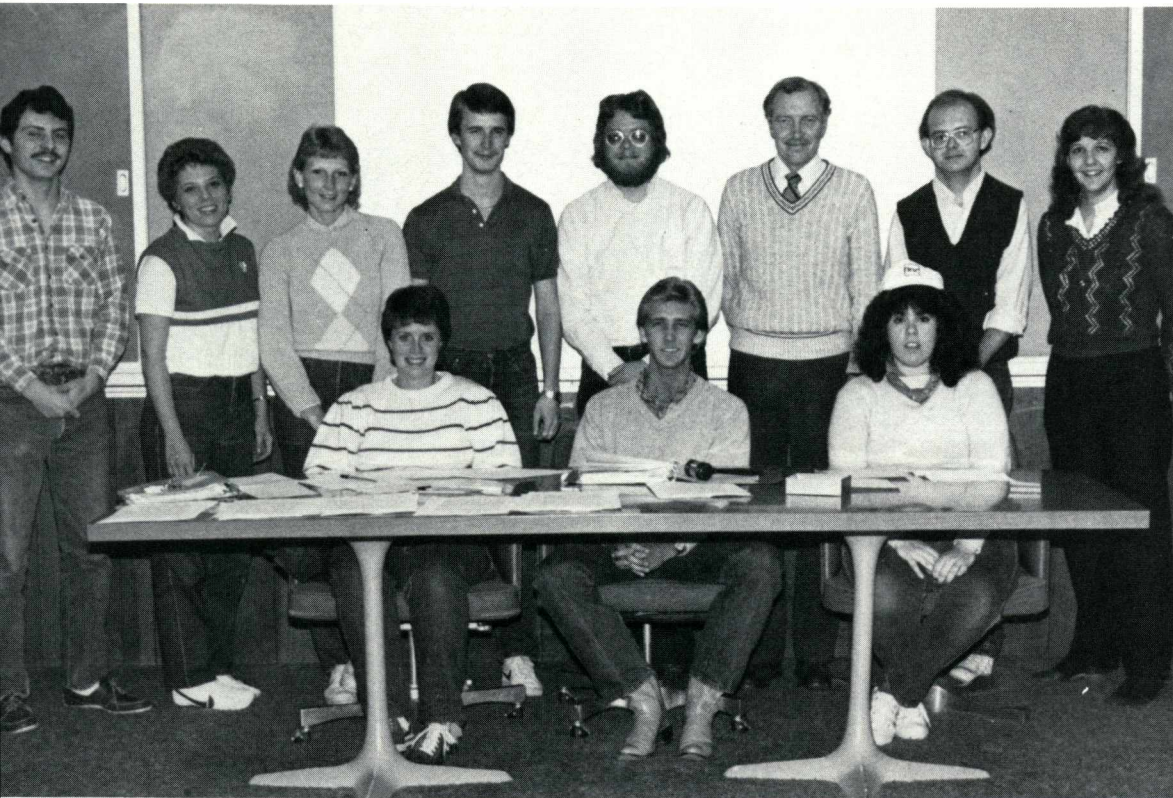
The Judicial board is the student branch of school legislation, and is available to students who wish to appeal fines and also is the final approving body for club constitutions.

Crusader Choir

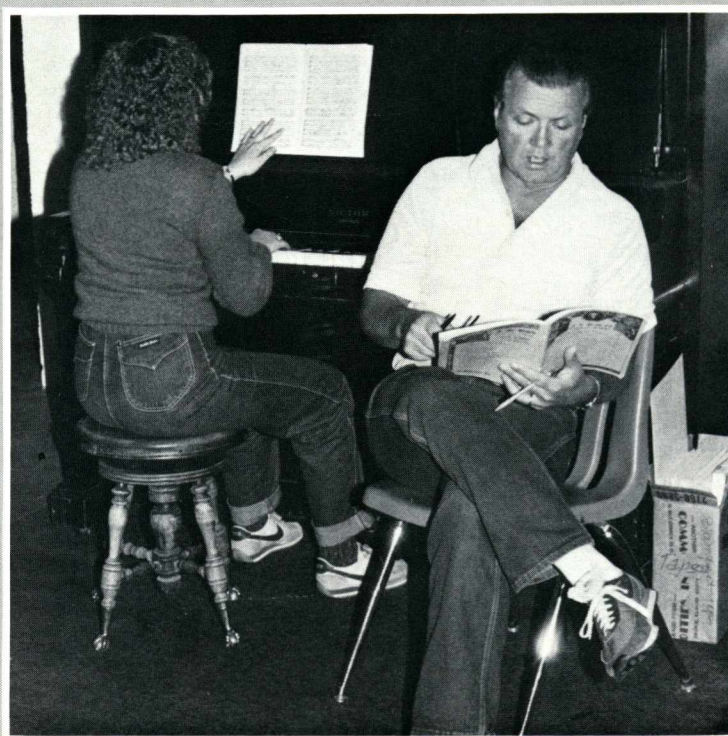

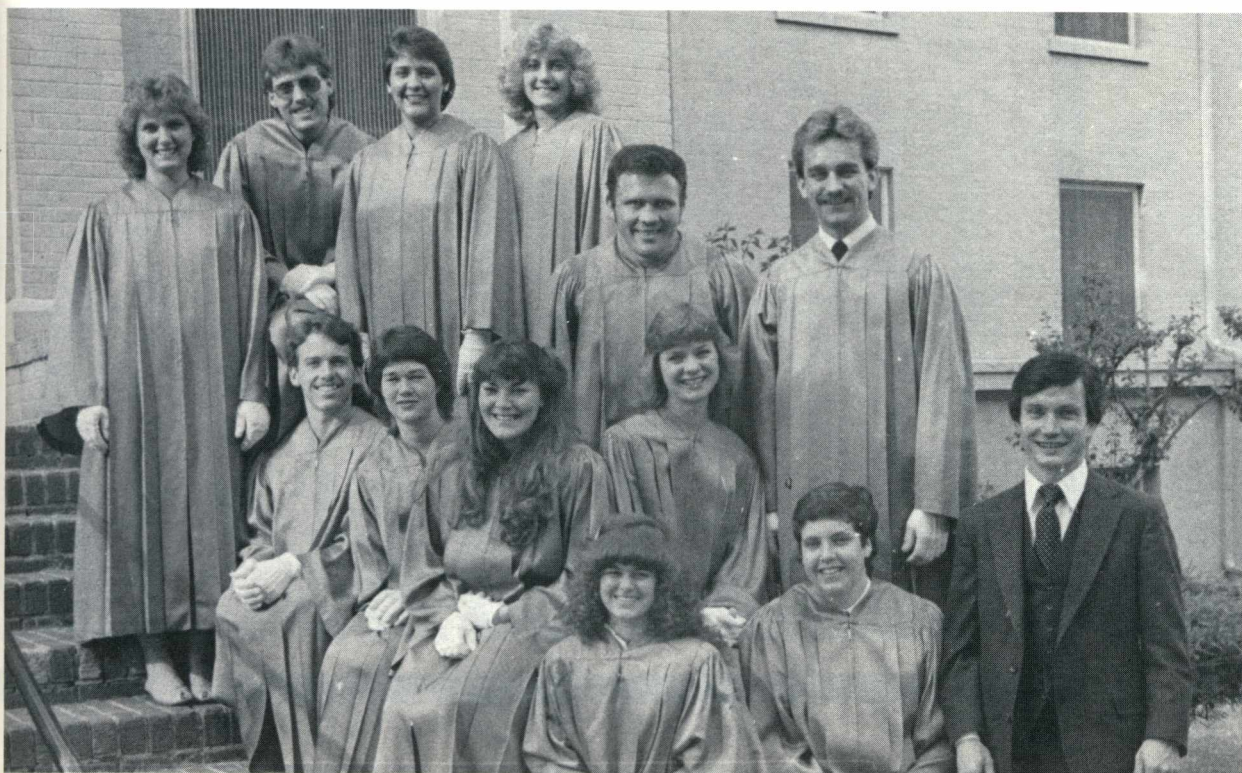
Women's Choir

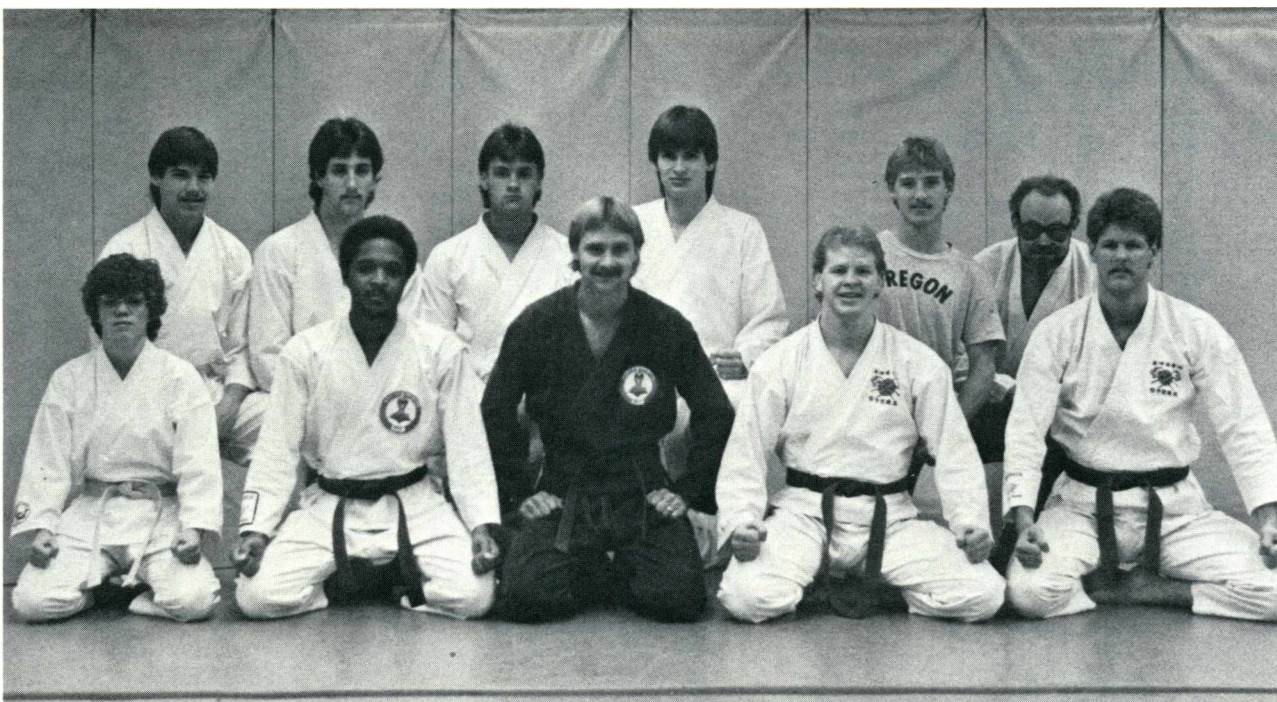
Shepherdess is an organization consisting of wives of ministerial students, or fiancées of these students. Lynn Neil is the faculty advisor.

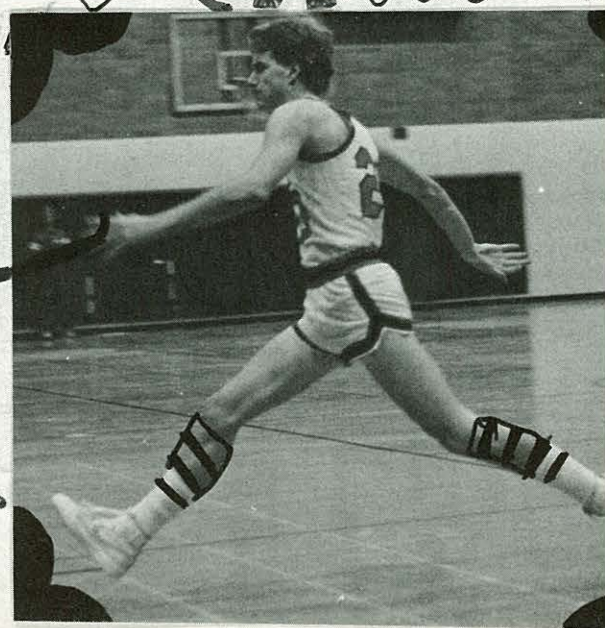

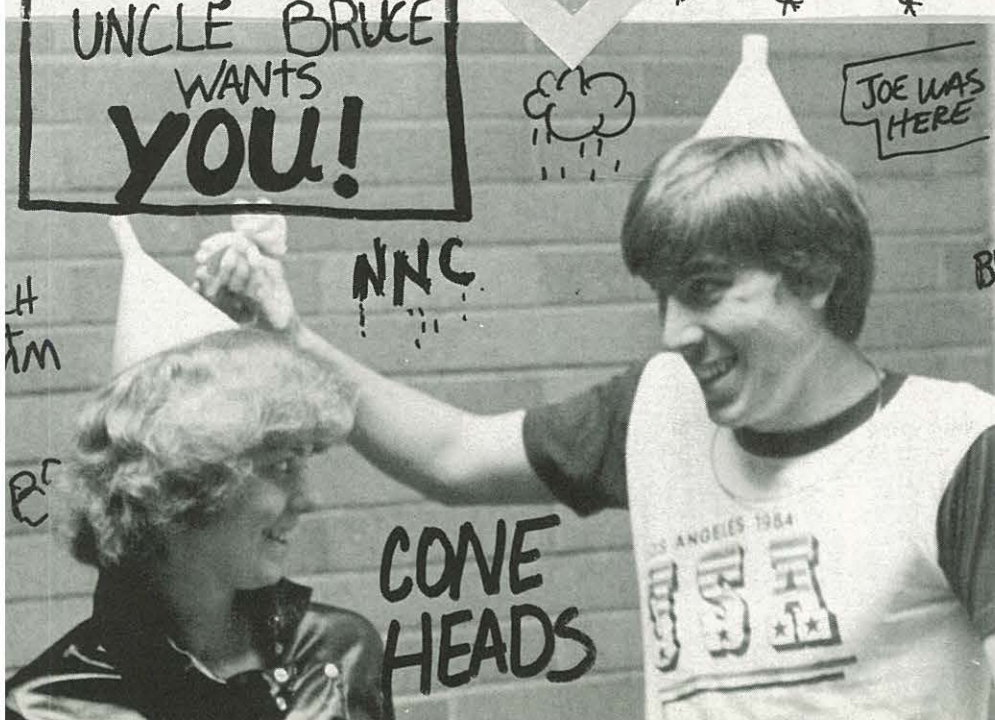

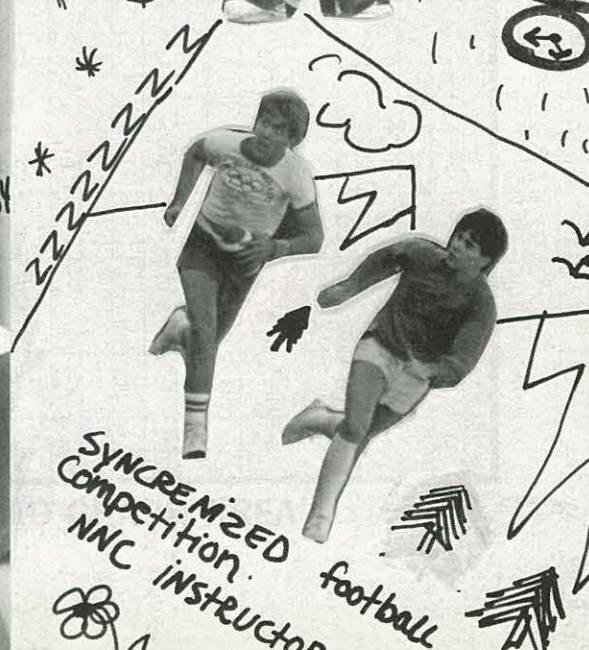
