## SINGLE: the limbo years?

It's Valentine's Day. And possibly Cupid has neglected you this year. So you use up a box of Kleenex's and eat three chocolate bars over an episode of "Love Boat."

Or maybe Cupid has been at work, but has obviously blundered and paired you with a starry-eyed Joe or Jane Blockhead. No, you say, this just will not work.

Or maybe this year, you just don't care.

Dating seems to be made such an important issue on Trevecca's campus, but it is probably also the one that causes the most frustration.

You will often hear TNC girls declare in moments of desperation that they will become nuns (although I've yet to hear of a Nazarene convent). Guys don't tend to mention becoming monks, but do vow to "give up on women" or claim they'll "never understand women." (So who understands men?)

All this frustration seems to result from many unsuccessful attempts to avoid a state of "singleness."

Many young people have what another Elva McAllaster calls "hope-chest syndrome." They perceive singleness as a state of limbo in the transition to a "married" status.

In truth, singleness can be a very important time — time to get to know yourself, to direct your path toward a career, to straighten priorities, to cultivate friendships, to develop a strong relationship with God.

As writer L. Norment says in her article "Single . . . and Loving It!" which appeared in *Ebony*, "There are things that I do that have nothing to do with men. I sing, I write, I have a relationship with God. None of these are second-best."

Singleness is a time to pull your life together before tamping with someone else's. Being a strong, healthy, and whole single has a lot to do with becoming a good half of a good marriage. What is that they say

— a chain is only as strong as its weakest link? Not to say that a good mate won't complement his partner and help him to grow, but two neurotic, aimless people who enter into marriage are probably going to find things rough.

The subject of short — and long-term singleness is complex, and a lot more attention probably needs to be paid to it. As Elva McAllaster points out in his book, *Free To Be Single*, there is much help and counseling available for married couples; and for them there is always the last-resort option of divorce.

But who is counseling the single person? And what can he do — divorce himself when he is not succeeding at being single?

Mackey Library has several good books on singleness — look under "single" in the card catalog. Two excellent ones are *Free To Be Single* by Elva McAllaster and *One is More Than Un* by Debbie Salter.

So if there is no special Valentine in your mailbox this year, you might even count yourself lucky. (I know you won't believe me, and actually, I'd trade this article for a Valentine anyway.) But maybe this is a time, within God's will, to concentrate on yourself and the present.

Consider Debbie Salter's words:

"What a waste if in my dreams for tomorrow, all of today — all the praiseworthy things of today, all of the happiness-producing, contentment-filling gifts of God, found only in today — are lost because my thoughts are elsewhere."

Who you are now, with or without someone else, is of prime value. Happy Valentine's Day.

## Colleges trying unusual ways to raise extra money

(CPS) — The campus of Park College in rural Missouri happens to cover over 800 acres of rich limestone deposits. Soon, officials plan to mine and sell the limestone, and then lease out the excavated caverns as underground warehouse and office space.

The scheme may sound odd or even far-fetched, but administrators at Park don't have much choice. They say it's the best way they have to make up

for federal and state funding cuts the school has suffered over the last few years.

Colleges everywhere are resorting to schemes and somewhat-eccentric strategies in this, the third year of a prolonged depression in college revenues.

Georgetown, for example, is going into the energy business. Brown has jumped into the mail-order business, peddling gifts ranging from \$10 to \$10,000 in a special "pull-out

catalogue" alumni newsletter section that might make Romco proud.

To some, particularly in the Reagan administration, all this is great news.

"Colleges are coming up with all kinds of ways to replace money they have lost from funding decreases," exults U.S. Dept. of Education spokesman Duncan Helmrigh.

Such creativity in getting money is "proving that a lot can

be done, as President Reagan said, when you put your mind to it," he asserts.

The president, of course, has argued that colleges have been too dependent on federal support, and that once cut off, they'd find some new ways to support themselves.

"I don't share the view of some that the cuts being made in higher education will bring about disaster," agrees David continued on page 2

# Music Department records first album

The music department of Trevecca Nazarene College produced a record recently. Mr. Pleais Hampton was in charge of making the recording with EVENING LIGHT PRODUCTIONS of Nashville as producer. The recording will be released March 15, 1983.

The recording is being made to expand Trevecca's ministry. It's purpose will be to introduce the band and the choirs of the Music Department to the people. The recording will also be used as a gift of appreciation to the pastors across the educational zone for their support of Trevecca.

Groups used in making the recording are Ambassadors, Concert Choir, Treble Tones, and Concert Band. The student body singing four beloved hymns during a chapel service is also included.

Hymns from the chapel service used on the record are "O God, Our Help in Ages Past", "And Can It Be", "To

God Be the Glory" and "Wonderful Grace of Jesus".

Concert Choir, directed by Mr. Walter Heck, recorded "Psalm 103" and "Holy Lord".

Ambassadors, directed by Mr. Fred Mund, recorded "Salvation is Created", "De Animals A-Comin'", and "How Rich I Am".

The Treble Tones, directed by Miss Mary Bates, recorded "Swing Low Sweet Chariot", "Come, Thou Fount", and "I Will Arise".

Concert Band, directed by Mr. Stephen Farnsley, recorded "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God".

The recording was made at College Hill Church of the Nazarene in Nashville, Tennessee. The front cover of the record features a group of students on the porch of McClurkan. The back cover has a picture of each choir and the band, with a write up about each one. The total cost is \$4,600 for the recording and the project is expected to pay for itself.

Hampton said, "I'm excited about the album. It's a good

quality production and I think it will help the college (in) it's ministry to the people on the educational zone thru music. It will have a very positive impact on our people over the zone. I think it will also be a good recruitment tool."

This recording is different from other recording's the school has made recently because it is the first time all of the choirs, the band and a live

chapel song service were included on an album. The recording will be sold by the choirs and band during the

spring break tours. The recording will also be made available to students on campus at a selling price of approximately \$5.00 for the record album and \$6.00 for the cassette tape.

McKinney, financial affairs vice president at the University of Idaho.

"We've got to get the federal deficit down, and we've all got to tighten our belts a little. A lot of people in higher education are blowing smoke," he adds, "but there's still no fire."

But few of McKinney's colleagues seem to agree. "The big question is whether we are dealing with a short-term or long-term problem," notes James Mingle of the Southern Regional Education Board and author of several books on colleges' retrenchment.

"Colleges and universities have had a long period of financial sources not keeping up with inflation and expenses," he says. "In a lot of institutions, there's no fat to trim. It was gone long before the current Reagan-induced recession."



## College enrollment falls nationwide

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CPS) — A new headcount suggests that college enrollment fell this academic year after all, according to preliminary estimates released by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).

In September, NCES predicted a slight increase in student enrollment, but they now say there was actually a decline. The study also shows a decline in the growth rate of female students and in the number of part-time students, which colleges had hoped would make up for expected decrease of regular students due to the population decline and student aid cuts.

Schools can and are selling off land, building windmills, holding telethons and escalating appeals for contributions from businesses to raise money, but they can't keep doing that forever, Mingle says.

"There is a limit to how many different, long-lasting ways a school can come up with extra income," he concludes.

"The competition for the corporate dollar is getting stiff," agrees Bob Graze of the Independent College Funds of America. "The expectations of what the private sector can do are too overrated."

"Overall, private giving cannot take the place of federal and state funding," concurs a spokesman for the Council for Financial Aid to Education.

Although private giving to colleges has increased 20 percent over the last several years, more schools may be getting less individually. "The entrance of public schools into the arena (since the federal funding cuts began in 1981) has made it very, very competitive," he says.

The scrambling for money, moreover, has helped some colleges recoup budget cuts, but hasn't allowed them to move forward.

By making faculty and staffers accept salary freezes and mounting an aggressive fundraising campaign, Springfield College in Massachusetts has managed to scrounge enough financial aid oney to bring aid availability to its students back to what it was before the Reagan cuts.

"All our efforts are to offset losses," says Joseph McAleer, Springfield's public relations officer. "Obviously we won't have the resources to offset the

government funding cuts forever. I just hope we don't have to find out when that is."

The losses have indeed been substantial. The American Council on Education figures the federal student aid budget alone has suffered a real decline of 23 percent since Reagan took office.

Colleges have suffered even more damaging cutbacks in state funding. Twenty-four states slashed budgets during the last fiscal year because the recession choked off the tax money it normally collects, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

With nowhere to turn for help, then, the schools have been feverishly trying to turn necessity into invention in fundraising.

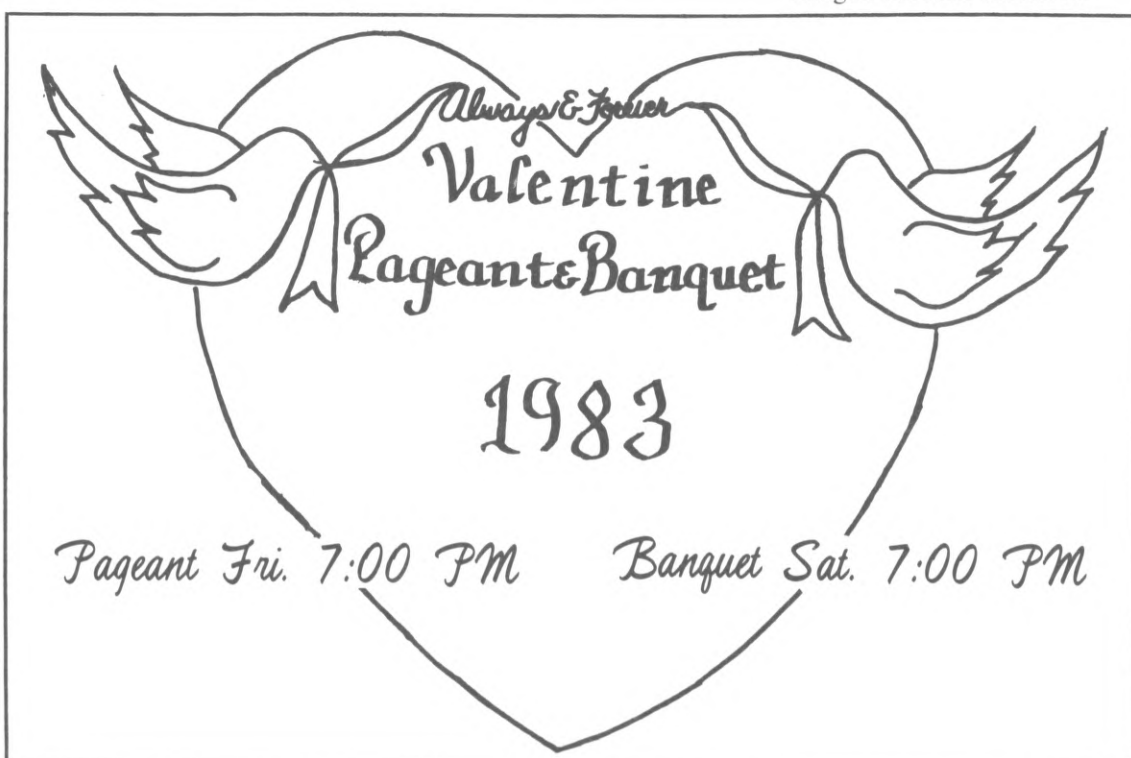
St. Andrews Presbyterian College, for example, leased out 10 acres of land to a shopping center, sold 40 to a hospital, and is readying more land for sale to private residential developers.

Stanford, Princeton and the University of Dallas have also sold land to generate income.

The University of San Francisco is building a "windmill farm" to save on energy, while Dakota Wesleyan fired salaried support workers and hired cheaper student workers to take their place.

Brigham Young has asked faculty members and workers to contribute money to the university through voluntary salary reductions.

Texas Wesleyan is trying to attract donations with celebrity golf tournaments, while Texas Christian does it with "phone-a-thons."

1. To promote greater unity among Nazarene Colleges and students and loyalty to the cause of holiness as set forth by the Church of the Nazarene.

2. To promote academic excellence in accordance with the highest ideals of the Christian commitment.

3. To promote student responsibility in the establishment and maintenance of student spiritual life.

4. To promote opportunity to share ideas, problems and solutions as related to student life.

5. To define the role of student government in terms of the total program and purposes of the Church of the Nazarene.

6. To encourage responsible Christian citizenship.

7. To better understand and strengthen student administrative relationships.

8. To provide orientation and training for new student leaders.

9. To provide opportunities for dialogue between student leaders and administrative leaders of the Church of the Nazarene.

The NSLC also has a special project each year. Last year it was the Nazarene Hunger and Disaster Fund and could very well be the same this year.

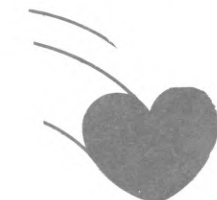

Why can't we Christians stand up for *our* rights and try to make the world safe and clean for our children.

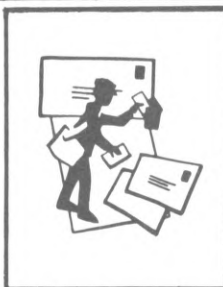
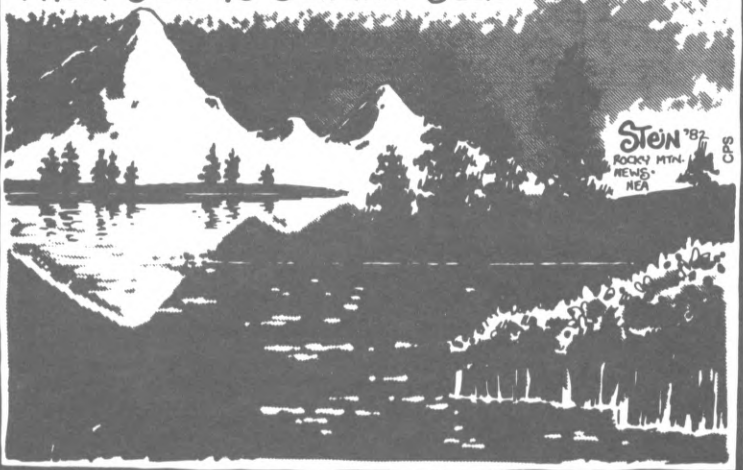

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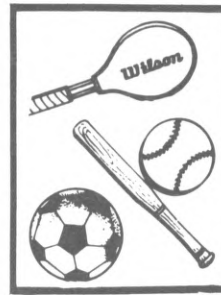

# Trojans stay in battle for VSAC title

Trevecca, after beginning the year with three straight victories, lost two in a row, but came back to win 8 straight.

Bethel, the team that knocked Trevecca out of the VSAC and District 24 playoffs last year, and Belmont handed the Trojans their first losses of 1983.

However, Trevecca bounced back to win eight in a row, including 6 VSAC games.

#### Bethel 76, TNC 69

Trevecca trailed Bethel by 11 points, 60-49, with 8:45 left in the game. Then the Trojans came storming back to within one, 69-68, and 2:10 left. However, a foul and a turnover saw Trevecca quickly down by five and they did not recover. Melvin Taylor led all scorers with 23 points in the loss.

#### Belmont 73, TNC 67

Eighteen turnovers proved to be the Trojans downfall as they suffered their second loss in a row. Trevecca held a two point lead at the half, 39-37, but they were unable to hold it as Belmont took the lead midway through the final period.

The Trojans grabbed the lead one more time by a point with 2:10 left, but a crucial 3 point play and a missed shot on the ensuing play sealed their fate.

Trevecca was led by Alexander with 18, while Taylor had 16, and Williams 13. Suddeth contributed 10 rebounds.

#### TNC 107, Lambuth 78

For the sixth time this season the Trojans went over the century mark as they completely dominated the Eagles. Trevecca jumped out to an 11-0 lead in the first four minutes and never looked back. Featuring an excellent transition game, the Trojans put points on the board easily.

Eleven players scored, led by Taylor with 26, Alexander, 17; Williams, 15; and Bell, 14. Suddeth grabbed 9 rebounds and Stivers returned to action (after being sidelined for 5 games with an ankle injury)

scoring 4 points, bringing down 7 rebounds and dishing out 4 assists.

#### TNC 75, Freed-Hardeman 73

In a storybook ending the Trojans pulled out a big road victory over the Lions. Trevecca trailed most of the way but chipped away at a 12 point deficit until Melvin Taylor's short jumper tied the score 73-73, with 56 seconds left. The Lions held the ball until taking time out with 10 seconds left, to set up a final play. But, Freed-Hardeman took the inbound pass and committed a foul to give the Trojans the ball.

Alexander then took the inbounds pass and scored a layup with 3 seconds remaining, to give Trevecca the victory.

Taylor led all scorers with 25, while Williams added 18, Bell 13, and Alexander 10.

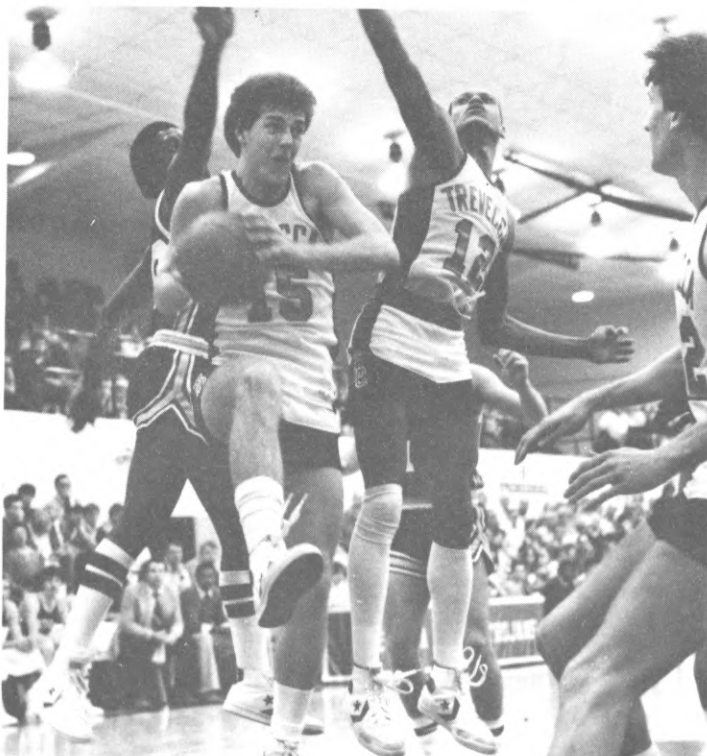
#### TNC 76, CBC 71

The Trojans were in control most of the way as they defeated CBC for the second time and knocked the Buccaneers out of first place in the VSAC West. Reggie Suddeth sustained a knee injury in the first half and freshman Tim Bell filled in, scoring 17 points, including 9-10 from the free throw line.

Taylor led the Trojans with 22. Williams also had a great game scoring 21 points (including 100% at the free throw line), 7 rebounds and 5 assists.

Albert Kummer is played by Philip Kraig. Kraig is a freshman Computer major from New York.

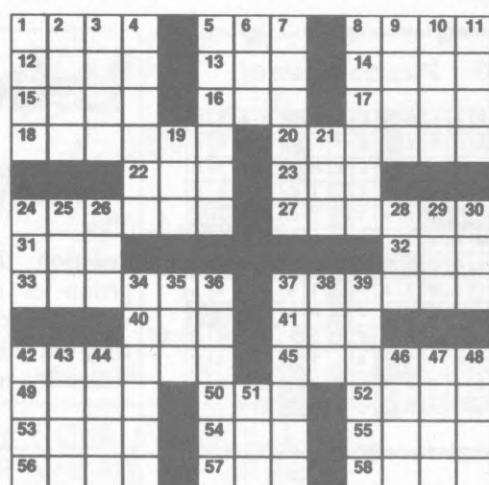
