TREVECCA RECEIVES

\$50,000 DONATION

President Mark R. Moore recently announced to TREV-ECHOES that TNC received a major donation of \$50,000. This gift is from the Arthur Vining Davis Foundation. This check was sent by the Executive Director of the Foundation, Mr. William R. Wright, and received in the mail by Dr. Moore a couple of weeks ago.

Mr. Claude Diehl of Trevecca visited the Arthur Vining Davis Foundation at its home in Miami, Florida. This contact was followed up by a visit to the Trevecca campus by Mr. Franklyn A. Johnson, consultant for the Foundation, on July 18, 1972. He was interested in Trevecca's Self Study and how the school operated.

Another man most instrumental in arranging this gift was Mr. Roscoe Buttry, President of Third National Bank here in Nashville, and member of the President's Advisory Board. He has had a very keen interest in Trevecca Nazarene College. This grant was received at the present time largely through his continued effort and interest.

This large sum of money will have a two-fold purpose: (1) to increase the enrollment through a vigorous recruitment program. and (2) to intensify our development program. The office and personnel for financial development and recruitment will be restructured over a two-year period. Three to five new staff members will go out over the Zone counseling prospective students on a more personal basis than before. Thirty thousand of this money over the two-year period will go for this program. The other twenty thousand will be used in the financial development. These new programs will also serve to help raise money from business and industry.

Trevecca Nazarene College is indeed grateful to all those involved in the arranging of this gift. Through this gift, Trevecca will continue to expand and grow at a greater rate than ever.

MACKEY SCHOLARSHIP **ESTABLISHED**

Most all of us have at one time or another felt the Spirit of God. We may have felt Him in chapel, revivals, prayer rooms, and countless other places. In 1963 a new type of aircraft wing was successfully tested. Most wings have the standard curved upper surface to give it lift. The air at first comes in contact with sticks to it at high speeds and disturbs the airflow, thus increasing drag and decreasing speed. The new wing, called the laminar-flow wing, has numerous curved slots cut in both its upper and lower surfaces. Instead of the churning unstable air disturbing the airflow, it is sucked through the wing by two turbine driven pumps, rigged beneath and aft of the wing, and jetisoned out the rear. The laminar principle

lowered friction and drag by an encouraging figure. The improvement came when the air passed not only over the wing but through it.

Ephesians 5:18 says, "be filled with the Spirit." Don't just stand in His presence but be filled with it. It. seems as though Satan is making more of an effort today to put forces of drag on Christians than at any other time. So if there has ever been a time when we need to take the laminar principal and apply it to our spiritual lives, it's now. The time has come for us to be filled with God's Spirit and have the fruits of that Spirit come jetisoning from our lives. This is the kind of person that is precious in the sight of God.

LYCEUM PRESENTATIONS: "ST. JOAN" and "TRUTH"

If you happened to attend the play entitled "Saint Joan" put on by the Alpha-Omega Players, you would have a pretty good idea of who this remarkable woman was. If, by chance, you missed it, the play was the first entertainment of this year's Lyceum Series season.

The actual performance was given on Friday, November 2, in the sanctuary of College Hill and lasted a total of an hour and forty-five minutes. The cast was made up of five members portraying eleven characters, who put on the highlights of the play. The original play was written by George Bernard Shaw.

In the play and history both, Saint Joan was a young French maid, a spokesman of God in the battle against the English. She led them to victory and was later burned at the stake for her commitment, which everyone thought was against the Church. However, her faith kept her true to Him and she was willing to die for His cause. Her memory still lives on.

Around 200 people attended this dramatic presentation, which

proved to be an evening well spent.

The Trevecca Cascades: Preparation For Diamond Anniversary

Probably most of the students on campus have noticed the many stakes with blue colors tied on them and wondered what they were. Few students know much of, or are even aware of, the significance of them. Nashville First Church of the Nazarene, under the 75th Anniversary Committee, headed by Nona Owensby, has voted on and accepted a plan to build a beautiful Cascades in front of the Administration Building.

Mr. Harold Morris, of Apollo Contracting Corporation, member of Nashville First, and an active member of the President's Advisory Council, has assumed the Chairmanship of the project, and his firm is already working on the final stages in the planning of the Cascades. The President's Advisory Council's purpose is to raise funds for the college. member receives the Presidential Plaque. Mr. Morris states that the actual work on the Cascades will begin in February or March of 1974, and will probably be finished by June of the same year. Ron Lederer of Southern Land Surveying, Inc. will be the landscape

Nashville First Church is donating this in memory of their anniversary, and in celebration of Trevecca's 75th anniversary. The Cascades is one of the first projects for the campus's beautification, many more of which are planned, to be finished by 1976, the year of Trevecca's Diamond Anniversary celebration.

The Trevecca Cascades will be built on the same concept as that at Cheekwood, but will not be a replica. The Cascades will start directly in front of the Ad Building with a pond containing a double cascade, out of which water will gush. A stream lined with rocks, plants, trees and benches will meander down the lawn of the Ad Building. At one point the stream will go underneath a footbridge that will connect one of the many paths and sidewalks lining the Cascades. A reflecting pond will be situated halfway down the slope, over which there will be a viewing platform. Out of this pond the stream will continue, flowing over several waterfalls to a final reflecting pond at the foot of the slope. This pond will contain three fountainheads to shoot the water two feet into the air.

Abundant shade trees will line the Cascades.

The Cascades will add much to the beautification of Trevecca's campus, and there are many more such projects in the planning stages now. The year 1976, Trevecca's Diamond Anniversary, will show a very different and new Trevecca.






