What makes Trevecca a "something extra college"? If this question was asked to each student, administrator, professor, staff member or any other person connected with our college, I am sure that it would receive a variety of answers directly proportional to the number questioned. Furthermore, even after all the answers were analyzed it is unlikely that we could derive a connotative answer. Even without this clear-cut definition of the terminology "something extra college", I am sure that most of us would agree that Trevecca has something extra to offer its students. For this reason I will not, at the present time, try to describe what makes Trevecca a "something extra college". From the perspective of a transfer student who has spent the first part of his college career in a state college, I can see that Trevecca has much to offer as a Christian college

In the recent past there have been many Christian colleges with goals, standards and a general atmosphere which is parallelled to those now existing at TNC. Many of these colleges in a desperate attempt to survive have compromised their original goals. The survival of the college becomes more important than those standards and goals for which it was founded.

The temptation to compromise comes to these colleges as well as Trevecca in two major forms. The first is that of lowering their standards of dress and conduct in order to entice the enrollment of more students. However, more important and far more dangerous is the temptation of over dependence in the government for loans to subsidize their building program. A proper use of these funds can be a great asset. Two good examples of acceptable applications of the federal loans are our science and physical education buildings.

The danger, as I see it, comes when too much of the campus is covered by buildings which are financed by government loans. These loans are accompanied by many restrictions. Organized Christian classes and activities are not allowed in these buildings. Restrictions on the use of special buildings such as the science and P.E. buildings, are understandable. However, if as each building becomes outdated we replace it with one which has been financed by the government, then someday the only building in which Christian activities can be held will be the McClurkan building.

Most small colleges do not have the needed funds to complete their building program. A government loan can be obtained at three percent interest. If they borrow money to construct a million dollar building from private sources at eight percent interest, it will cost an additional fifty-thousand dollars per year in interest alone; thus, the temptation is great to borrow from the government.

What happens when McClurkan can no longer be used? The government will not loan money for a chapel. Will we have to pitch a tent for religion classes and Christian activities? This is not likely. The Church of the Nazarene has an recent years supported our college very well. In his book Red and Black, William W. Jellema lists our church as second in the percentage of money given to each college and fifth in actual dollars. This includes all Christian denominations.

This being the fact, what do we have to worry about? Our need for money is becoming greater. If the church and private sources do not respond to this need, then Trevecca, like so many of her sister institutions, may have to increase their dependence on the government. With this increased dependence also comes increased restrictions.

Christian activities may be limited to one building and possibly, at some future date, crowded completely off our campus. If this happens, the present dress codes, standards of conduct, and other rules would be of

Our church is to be congratulated for the excellent support it has given to its college in the past. However, if we become lax in support now, the result could eventually be "Trevecca State College." Many people will say that Trevecca could never become a state college. This may be true, but the same was probably said of many of the existing state colleges which were originally Christian colleges

Trevecca has much to offer its students as a Christian college. It creates an atmosphere which perpetuates a warm Christian fellowship, rarely found on most college campuses today, particularly state colleges. It gives opportunity to study a sound gospel of Christ and many other things too numerous for listing now. It is very important that we conserve this segment of Trevecca.

We should be aware of this situation, so as not to fall victims of the same circumstance as many Christian colleges before us. The survival of Trevecca as an institution should not become more important than the goals and standards for which it was founded. If this happens, "Trevecca State College" may become a reality.

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Trevecca's Day In Court

A Day In Court

The Student Council started the year with a successful Leadership Retreat on September 22-23 at the Y.I. Youth Camp. At this time, students, administrators, and faculty gathered for a meaningful program, discussion groups, good fellowship, and recreation.

On Friday night, September 22, the Student Council members and administrators had a discussion led by Dr. Paul Cleckner. Dr. Cleckner encouraged each person there to "throw away" any problem that would be a barrier of communication between himself and the others present. Then with a sense of unity, Dr. Moore, Dr. Parry, Dr. McGraw, Dean Lewis, and the Student Council members had an open time of sharing about any topic that they wanted to discuss.

On Saturday, September 23, the retreat was opened to all students, administrators, and faculty who wanted to attend. The program for the entire day was organized on the basis of a day in court. Presided by Lawrence Golden, the Student Council President, the court presented the case on Trevecca Nazarene College. Three charges were brought before the court:

1. Relationships - Where Do We Stand?

 Trust — Why Do We Need It?
 "Something Extra" — What Do We Have to Offer?

With Mr. Jerry Hull as the attorney of prosecution and Danny Boone as the attorney of defense, several students and faculty members were called to the stand as witnesses for or against the charges. Along with each charge, a paper was presented to give the meanings of each topic as related to Trevecca. The papers were written by Dean Lewis, Dr. Wynkoop, and Les DuVall.

After a session for each charge, the court was dismissed. Everyone

present, acting as jury, was then divided into four committees. Each committee discussed the particular charge and graded Trevecca on an evaluation scale (1-10) to decide where it stood in relation to relationships, trust, or "something extra". Then the members of the committee presented a list of suggestions of how these three aspects of Trevecca could be improved.

At the end of the day in court, the verdicts, evaluation scale, rating, and recommendations of the four committees were presented to the court. The court found that TNC rates 6.6 on a scale of 1 to 10 on the three charges. This is above average. However, the court felt that Trevecca must strive for the ideal, that being 10. Lawrence Golden, the judge, then sentenced the student body, administrators, and faculty of Trevecca Nazarene College to four months of probation. During this time, the court encouraged each to try and enact many of the recommendations which will help build better relationships, trust, and something "extra" to offer. A few of the many recommendations are as follows:

1. The Student Council should set aside a day to have small interaction groups discussions involving the total college community.

2. Student Council, individual classes, and individual clubs should encourage their members to make a more conscious effort to make better inter-personal relationships with other students, faculty, and administrators as individuals.

3. Complete honesty from all students, faculty, and administrators on any issue would help all to trust each other.

4. Trust is based on knowledge, understanding, and confidence in one another. Therefore, getting to know each other would help to promote trust.

5. To attain "something extra". Trevecca must always reach beyond its grasp for goals and constantly work for them.

It was also the court's decision that these charges and recommendations would be reviewed at the end of this four-month probation. Then it would again rate Trevecca in order to show how much it had

So, each student, each faculty member, and each administrator is now on probation. It is the responsibility of each to make the recommendations of this mock court a reality.

During these next four months every member of this college should try to improve relationships with other, to have more trust in others, and to find that "something extra" at Trevecca for himself as well as for others.

Revival or Recycle?

What does a revival do for you? Sometimes it seems just an endless pattern of two or more revivals a year. The problem is that many people don't expect revival to do something lasting for them.

For a week we enjoyed the messages in music and preaching from Mr. Ken Tippit and Rev. Melvin McCullough. Beginning the first night, many people found the help they needed. It was apparent that still more people drew closer to the Lord and to each other. The services were really exciting. But I'm sure no speaker wants to think that the impact of what he has to say will last only a week. What is it that will make words stick so they'll never get away from us? Rev. McCullough does not expect us to remember everything he said, but he would be concerned that we maintain a spirit of revival and renewal on campus. This year T.N.C. is pleased to have among the new faculty Mr. Gary Coutler. Mr. Coutler instructs communications and speech. He graduated from Northwestern Nazarene College and has taught at the University of Missouri in Kansas

Dr. Guess first became interested in science while in high school. Much of what he learned was on his own, outside the classroom. Apparently there are also a number of students here at Trevecca who feel science is important since both Dr. Guess's physics and chemistry classes are quite large. He says, "Science is interesting because there are just a few important principles that you have to know, maybe three or four through the whole quarter. Once students learn these principles, they can handle most any situation and experiment in the class. Simply, it involves understanding the basics."

Why did he choose to teach in Nazarene colleges? Well, not only did he join the Nazarene denomination at the age of six, but he also felt that his way of being of service would be "teaching in one of our (Nazarene) schools... I have certainly enjoyed the relationships I have had with the students and the opportunities we have had to learn together."

Although most of his time is now spent in teaching, Dr. Guess has other pastimes as well, including camping, hiking, and photography — "when I can afford to buy the film!". He is also an acoustics bug, especially where church auditoriums are concerned.

Dr. Guess now lives in Hendersonville, a suburb of Nashville, with his wife and two children.

The Trevadores sang in four district youth camps and held church concerts every night. During this tour, the guys and Rev. Latham recruited over forty students for Trevecca and traveled 14,000 miles.

Rev. Harold Latham, in charge of church relations for TNC, acted as leader for the group.

One of the quartet members, Dale Kendall, tells of the experience in his testimony that follows:

"'The service of Jesus true pleasure affords' became a resounding statement in the hearts of five All-American guys who traveled through the southeastern states representing and reaching out for Jesus Christ and TNC this summer. It was a rewarding summer just to see the Lord's hand in everything that was said and done, and to know that we were a unit all striving for one goal. Any of the fellows would tell you this.

"Altogether, there were seven weeks of traveling. The kindness

and generosity of the people we met on our way was overwhelming to us. One thing we learned was that Nazarenes are not all the same. There is a characteristic distinction among those who know Jesus.

"Fried chicken, ham, and iced tea were some of the 'biggies' that we received on our twenty-one meal plan. Someone said we were fowl, but what can you expect from eating chicken all the time?

"The verse that I relied on this summer was Phil. 4:19. It reads, 'But my God shall supply all your needs according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus.' God has blessed beyond human understanding, truly for you and me. To God by the Glory for the things He has done!"

TRAFFIC TRAUMA

Most of the students at Trevecca will agree that one of the most important improvements that should be made on the campus is a solution to the traffic and noise problem. Not many know that there are already plans in the making for the streets running through Trevecca.

Councilwoman Lois E. Jordan of the Seventeeth Metro District has been working on this for about a year. The plans include completely closing off Hart Street from Donelson to Lester.

There is also something in store for Lester Avenue. William Lamb, of the City Planning Committee, has plans to widen Lester from Murfreesboro to Hart to fifty feet, with sidewalks and more adequate lighting. The bond issue has passed, and the city, of course, will pay the bill

SPIRIT of EXPECTANCY

"There is a spirit of expectancy," responds Rev. Melvin McCullough when asked about the spirit of Trevecca's campus this fall, 1972. Mr. McCullough, who was the evangelist for the fall revival (Oct. 2-8), holds the participation of teenagers in today's evangelism as the most important of all areas of evangelism. "There are some things people need to know in order to tell about Jesus Christ," says Mr. McCullough. "The key factors are to present God through the gospel and to honestly take an interest in those to whom one witnesses. Too, one must delve into a deep personal questioning as to "what would you say if God asked you why He should let you into heaven." Furthermore, Mr. McCullough says that the teen-agers are the hope of the body of Christ. They can have an explosion in Christ if they challenge themselves to be disciples by voice and profession.

Parallel to the sense of evangelism on TNC's campus is a spirit of being "one in the bond of love." Mr. McCullough frankly states that the spirit on campus is one of openness, oneness, love, and a refreshing unity. He contributed this spiritual environment to the leadership of the college itself. Personal concern and a desire for spiritual perfection as well as academic excellence on the part of the faculty and administration are the ingredients for this revival.

There is a hope for complete and total revival not only on campus but throughout the entire Nashville area. As Mr. McCullough concluded, the spirit felt on Wednesday, October 4, 1972, at the chapel service in McClurkan was one that might have been present on Asbury's campus a few years

If we, as Christians, band together not only during seasons of revival but during seasons of disappointment and heartache and place everything in the hands of God; if everyone loves each other with a spirit of God's love and with a heartfelt understanding for each other's problems, revival will not depend on an external catalyst. That catalyst will be present in every heart through the love of God.
