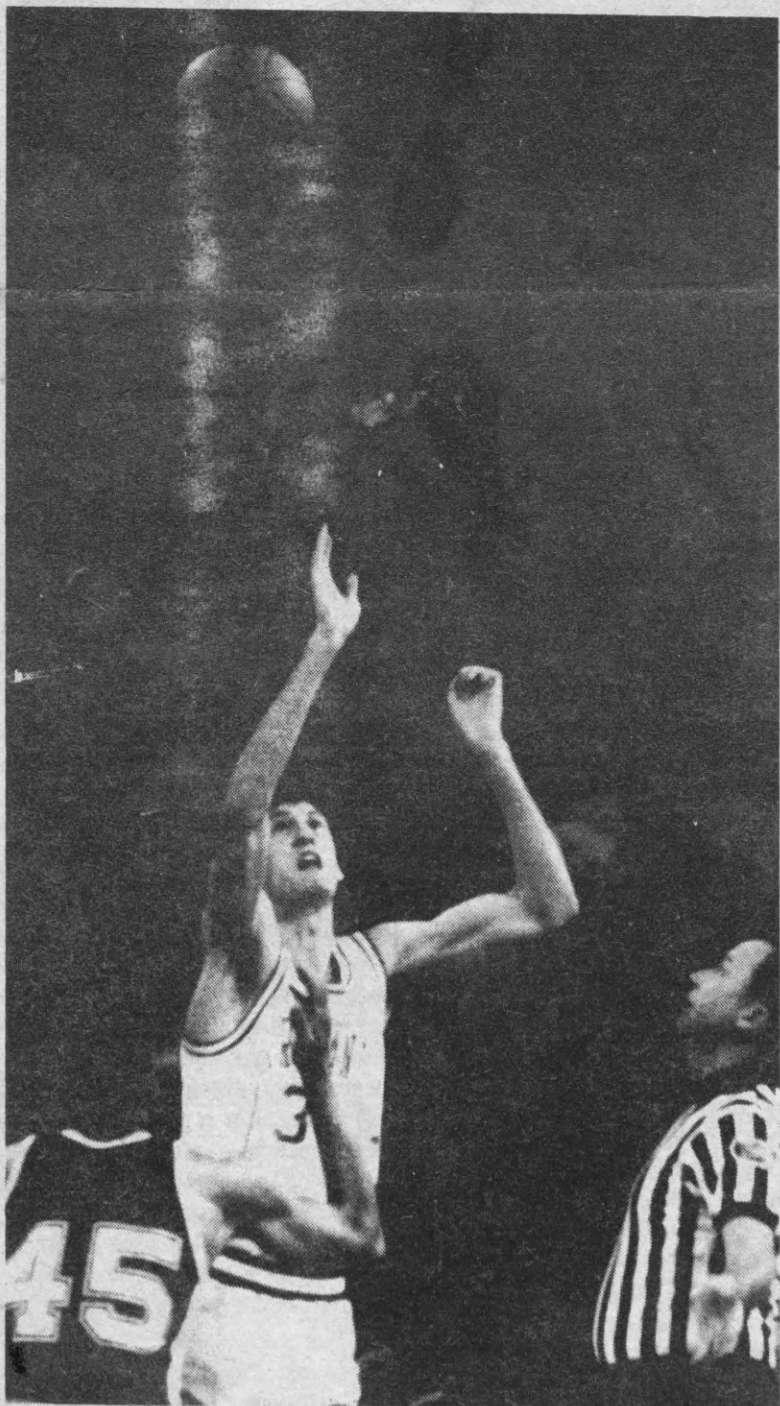

What a season !

Trevecca overcame early jitters to score an impressive 82-68 victory over Wayland Baptist University in the first round of the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City.

Avery Patton led the Trojans in scoring with 24. Sandy McClain had 17 points, 11 rebounds, and 4 steals, most of which came in the second half. Mac Heaberlin and Stacy Mason dominated underneath, grabbing 11 and 10 rebounds, respectively. Wayland was led by Michael Parks, who scored 22 points to go over the 2,000 mark for his career.

The Trojans missed several easy layups in the opening minutes, allowing the Pioneers to take a 13-8 lead. But Trojan front men Heaberlin and Mason, hitting the offensive boards, led a 13-1 spurt, putting Trevecca ahead 21-14 with 8:00 left in the half.

Wayland was not about to let the game get out of hand that easily. After trailing 32-24, they scored 10 straight points to take the lead for the first time in about 10 minutes, 34-32. Scott Hiser then sunk two free throws to tie the game at 34 at halftime.

The Pioneers came out smoking in the second half, taking a 42-37 lead, but Patton started heating up from the outside. He hit two three pointers as the Trojans scored ten unanswered points, and went ahead to stay, 47-42.

Both teams traded baskets for the next five minutes until Sandy McClain caught fire. McClain, who had been cold in the first half, scored 9 points in four minutes as the Trojans stretched their lead to twenty, 77-57 with 2:39 remaining.

Trevecca earned the right to play in the quarterfinals by defeating St. Mary's of Texas on Friday, 73-68. Sandy McClain once again sparked a second half rally to lead the Trojans with 19 points and 7 rebounds. The other two-thirds of Trevecca's tandem guard offense shared the load as Charles Brooks (7 for 8 from the field) and Avery Patton (6 assists) each had 16 points. Henry James paced the Rattlers with 25 points, most of which came in a second half flurry, scoring 14 out of the team's 18 points over a seven-minute period.

No one led by more than four points in the first half. Scott Hiser had five early rebounds and Reggie Tiller kept the Trojans close with seven first-half points. Meanwhile, St. Mary's lost one of their better ball handlers when Anthony Houston went down with a separated shoulder. Brooks driving layup with 2 seconds to play put the Trojans ahead at halftime, 38-36.

McClain picked up two fouls in the first two minutes of the second half and left the game with four. The Rattlers led by as many as 8 before McClain re-entered the game with ten minutes to play. He promptly hit 3 three-pointers in four trips down the court to tie the game at 60. Brooks then hit a 14-footer and the Trojans never trailed again.

Trevecca coach Frank Wilson was delighted with the victory. "We really hit the free throws when we had to," he commented after the game. Indeed, they hit five of their last six to ice the game, 73-68.

Trevecca's finest season ever came to an abrupt end at the hands

of Georgetown College, Saturday March 14. They had played extremely well in the first two games, but a different team showed up as the Tigers from Kentucky defeated the Trojans, 81-66.

Avery Patton, who had complained of back spasms during the day, symbolized Trevecca's free throw woes by missing his first four attempts from the line. The Trojans hit only 10 of 22 free throws, while Georgetown made 25 out of 33.

The only bright spots for the Trojans were Scott Hiser's 14 points and 12 rebounds and Sandy McClain's occasional hot streaks. McClain finished with 21 points and 9 boards.

Brian Sheppard led the Tigers in scoring with 21 points. Donald Hanson added 20 for the winners. Don Butcher had 9 assists and made some key free throws down the stretch to preserve the win.

McClain's driving layup just after the tipoff gave Trevecca their only lead of the game. After the Trojans cut the Tigers lead to 8-6 the Tigers made 5 straight points to take control of the game. The closest Trevecca came after that was 3 points, right before halftime.

Both teams traded baskets over the first 10 minutes of the second half before Georgetown converted nine straight points to take a commanding 15 point lead, 62-47 with 6:03 remaining. The Trojans could never get close after that.

Coach Wilson gave Georgetown a lot of credit for the victory. "They really beat us on the boards. They were the better team tonight and deserved to win," he said.

"General" Patton, the man behind the face

Many know him as the "Lil' General," some know him as the "man with the answers," but to Geraldine and Dorris Patton he's just Avery. In a personal interview with the "General" much was learned about his in-depth feelings toward this past basketball season and some other personal things only his family and friends would know.

Patton attended Glencliff High School, here in Nashville, and won numerous awards for his involvement on the basketball team. While playing for Glencliff Patton never dreamed that he would play on the same college team as (Charles) Brooks, (Sandy) McClain, and ("Big Mac") Heaberlin. "It was alright," states Patton, "because I knew them and knew how well they played." He continues, "It was just a matter of us blending together as one team." He adds, "We worked together very well."

Trevecca is the college Patton chose to attend because "It was closer to home." Patton also said he chose to attend Trevecca because he saw the basketball program as "a growing program," and he "wanted to help it grow." Patton also chose Trevecca for the education offered. He is looking forward to graduating in June.

Grades have never proven a problem for Patton. "Ever since my sophomore year grades have been pretty steady, at least a 2.5," Patton continues, "I do my work, I have to, my mother stays on me about my work." Patton has acquired a major in Education but feels that he will wait a few years before going into coaching or teaching. "I just want to get a good job right now, doing some kind of supervising or something." Patton states, "In my mind I came to college to graduate," he continues, "I had a lot of people to tell me, people that used to play college ball, to take advantage of the education." "I've been playing basketball since I was 7," states Patton, "I love basketball." Patton clearly points out that "First of all I just wanted to get my education, that's what my parents told me to work for." He recalls, "You'll always have the skill to play basketball, but you need to work in your books." He continues, "I knew I

could always play basketball, but I also knew I had to study to accomplish what I need, my degree."

Of the past four seasons of Patton's career he vividly remembers the Belmont game of his sophomore year over the others. "They beat us by one point right at the buzzer," he continues, "I'll never forget that." It was the Belmont game that decided whether or not the Trojans would travel to Kansas City that year.

In speaking about the past season for the Trojans Patton feels that the Lee College game was the best played. "It was the game that decided whether we go to Kansas City or not." Patton continues, "It was the game, I feel, I really played with all my heart—the best that I could play." It was during the Lee college game that Patton scored a record 43 points for a single-game high. "Everything fell into place for me," says Patton. "I was determined to make it to Kansas City."

Trevecca's first loss of the season to David Lipscomb during the pre-season TCAC tournament "wasn't really that important," to Patton. He said, "I knew we were better than them." At the time Patton had no real worries about the season still before the Trojans.

Patton feels that part of the sloppiness of the Lambuth game (during which he broke Melvin Taylor's career scoring record with #2080) was partly due to the team wanting him to hurry and get the nine points needed so they could go on with the game. Patton recalls, "I was just rushing, like, 'Come on, let me get the points so we can go on and win the game.'" He adds, "I felt good after I got the points, but I was also glad we won."

Patton missed one game in his college career. Trevecca's Trojans played the game against Lindsey Wilson without the "General" due to an ankle injury he received during the previous Lipscomb game. Patton stated, "I knew they could win without me so I just took a day off."

"We've been through some really rough years here," states Patton when speaking of team-

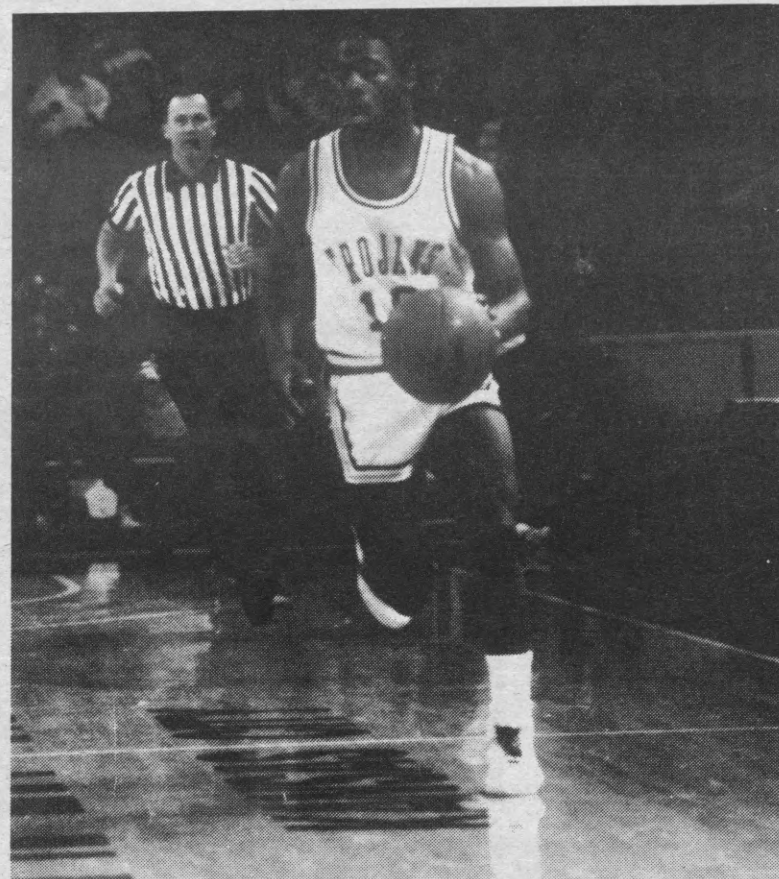
mate Reggie Tiller, "it was good for us to make it (to NAIA Nationals) when we did." Patton continues, "It's my last year and I don't have nothing to look back on."

In speaking about the fans involvement this past season Patton says, "They're what made us want to play hard and play good." He continues, "They have been with us all through the season." Patton recalls two episodes where the fans showed their dedication to the Trojans in the way they responded to rival crowds. Those two episodes he speaks of are the two which caused Trevecca administration to get involved so as to avoid major conflicts at Lipscomb and during the Lee game. "I've gotta go with the fans, whatever they do, because they went with us," he states.

In reference to Kemper Arena and knowing what to expect Patton says, "I've played in Vanderbilt's and TSU's arenas, just summer league ball, and there you can do what you want to do, but it's different when you have to play and it means something." At Kemper Arena "everything there was set-up, organized," he continues, "it was different from playing at home."

Trevecca's Trojans travelled to Kansas City to face their first opponent, Wayland Baptist from Plainview, Texas, with high expectations. Patton recalls, "I slept most of the way on the plane...I was scared...I had never been flying before." When looking at the team members and their personalities, one can just imagine the fun they had on that plane ride.

When speaking of the win during the first round NAIA tournament Patton feels that "the first half against Wayland Baptist we didn't play well because it was our first time there and everybody was a little tight." States Patton. "In the second half I upped the tempo." Patton feels "the first game is the biggest game." He adds, "Winning that game was a relief because now we could relax because it wasn't like we would play one game and go home, we were there a while." Patton held the game-high 24 points, followed by McClain with 17 points

and 11 rebounds. Up from underneath Heaberlin and Mason made their presence known with 16 points and 11 rebounds and 13 points with 10 rebounds, respectively.

In the second round against St. Mary's of Texas most of the guys were slowed down due to the flu. States Patton, "Sandy pulled through for us and we all pulled together as a team to win that one." McClain led the scoring with 19 points (including 3 straight 3-pointers in the second half). Patton and Brooks tied for 16 points.

During the third round against Georgetown, Patton was playing in a lot of pain. It was thought that Patton was only having back spasms but later it was discovered that he had a disc out of place. "We didn't play good at all," Patton continues, "most of us were sick." Patton feels that on the norm the Trojans could have "played them guys 4 times and we'll win 3." Patton feels that if any of the three teams should have beat the Trojans it "should've been St. Mary's." "But you can't take nothing away from Georgetown," he recalls, "they stopped our running game, they outright beat us."

It appeared that the Trojans had forgotten how to lose, what with a 21 straight games won. "It took me four years to get here and I was just proud to be here." In the locker room after the game Patton was thinking "Why did it have to end this way?" Patton states, "I

knew that there was no team up there who was 15 points better than us," he continues, "it made it look like they destroyed us but it wasn't like that." Patton recalls that Coach Wilson "came in and told us to pick our head up 'cause we had a great season." He adds, "After everybody talked about it we got over it."

March 24 it was announced that Patton had been named first team NAIA All-American. Patton is the first Trojan to receive this honor since Taylor made it in 1983. Patton states that with the close of his college career "I don't have anything to look back on." He continues, "I went out the way a lot of people wish they could go out—with style."

Patton feels that his parents have been the biggest influence to him during his career. He recalls, "They have been with me ever since I can remember." "I think they missed one game the whole time I was playing and that was because my mother was sick." "My father is a preacher and he doesn't pressure me into doing something I don't want to do, he wants me to be my own self." Patton continues, "As long as I'm doing what I want to do, that's alright, but I gotta respect him."

"When I first got here I was a little wild but Coach Wilson got on me and tamed me a little," he continues, "I like him for that and I'll never forget him." Patton feels that "me and him (Wilson) are just alike and I enjoy being around him."

In closing Patton commented "I love all the players I played with. All of them were very unselfish and there was not one problem in the team." Patton hopes "they do better next year and make the same trip that we made this year." Patton adds, "I'll be at every home game."

#2 Gardner Webb (63) at Trevecca (83) (Trojan Homecoming Classic)

Trojans win Trojan Classic over North Carolina powerhouse...Avery Patton breaks career assist record (410) on 3-point shot by Reggie Tiller on last shot of game...Patton also scored 26 points and had 5 steals...Heaberlin grabbed 12 rebounds for second game in a row...Record: 2-0.

#3 Trevecca (103) vs. Freed-Hardeman (80) (TCAC Tournament at David Lipscomb)

Third seeded Trojans scored easy victory...Patton led scoring once again with 23...Stacy Mason had 12 rebounds (9 offensive) and Hiser had 10...Record: 3-0.

#4 Trevecca (91) vs. Union (81), ot (TCAC Tournament)

Trevecca defeated 7th-seeded Union who had upset #2 CBC...Down by nine late in second half...the game went into overtime...Trojans dominated in overtime to gain the victory...Patton scored 25...Heaberlin and Mason each had 11 rebounds...Willie "Smooth" Holland had 30 points for the losers...Steve Jett led the Bulldogs with 16 rebounds...Union was 18 for 19 from the line...Record: 4-0.

Trojans up by 9 at halftime...Led most of second half until foul trouble took the Trojans out of their offense...Bisons hit 10 3-pointers...Patton and Brooks each had 21 points...Heaberlin had 19 points and 14 rebounds...Philip Hutcheson led the Bisons with 28 points...Anthony Jones scored 25 (including 5 3-pointers)...Record: 4-1.

#6 West Va. Wesleyan (93) at Trevecca (115)

McClain scored 17 and blocked 3 shots against his former team, a traditional powerhouse...Mason picked the team up by coming off the bench to grab 13 rebounds...Patton scored 32 points...Brooks had 25...Terry Howard scored 29 for Wesleyan...Record: 5-1.

#7 Hannibal-Lagrange (73) at Trevecca (101)

Trevecca ahead 48-29 at halftime...Heaberlin had 19 points and 15 rebounds...McClain led Trevecca in scoring with 21...Patton's 19 points broke a string of 6 straight 20+ games...Lane Price had season-high 9 points...Record: 6-1.

#8 Trevecca (102) at Lincoln Memorial (116)

Most points ever scored against Trevecca...McClain scored 32 points...Patton had 24...Heaberlin had 11 rebounds...Record: 6-2.

#9 Trevecca (96) at Bristol (85)

Trevecca ended longest losing

streak at 1...Patton had 31 points and 8 rebounds...McClain and Hiser each had 15 points and 11 rebounds...John Dickenson scored 25 and grabbed 13 boards for the losers...Record: 7-2.

#10 Freed-Hardeman (75) at Trevecca (88)

Win broke a losing streak that went back to the '84-'85 season...Trojans dominated the first half...Outscored the Bisons 54-40 at the half...Patton led in the scoring with 27 points...McClain and Brooks had 23 points and 17 points, respectively...Heaberlin led both teams on the boards with 16 rebounds...Record: 8-2.

#11 David Lipscomb (91) at Trevecca (101)

Broke six-game losing streak against Lipscomb...Trevecca up by 14 at halftime, 54-40...Patton had 27 points and 7 assists...McClain had 23 points including his first slam as a Trojan...Heaberlin and Mason had 16 and 14 rebounds, respectively...Anthony Jones led the Bisons with 27 points, including 7 three-pointers...Record: 9-2.

#12 Trevecca (84) at Christian Brothers(90)

Trojans last regular season loss...Trevecca led by 13 in the first half before a bench clearing brawl took the momentum away...All five starters had at least four fouls...Patton had 20 points and 8 assists...Hiser had 17 points and 10 rebounds...Philip Haney scored 10 (including 14 for 16 from the line) for the Bucs...Record: 9-3.

#13 Union (74) at Trevecca (88)

Union forward Barham had scored 8 early points before being injured...Trevecca came back to take a 7 point lead at halftime...Patton led the Trojans with 23 points and 8 assists...Record: 10-3.

#14 Trevecca (98) at Bethel (78)

Only third time Trevecca won at Bethel in last 16 years...Bethel scored first 9 points of game...Trevecca fought back to tie at halftime...second half was no contest...First game where no Trojan scored over 20...Hiser had 17 points and 15 rebounds...McClain also had 10

boards...Patton had 9 assists...Alray Lewis scored 19 points in first half, but only finished with 25...Record: 11-3.

#15 Cumberland (65) at Trevecca (80)

Cumberland stalled most of the game...Trevecca only led 28-20 at halftime...Cumberland hit 14 of 15 free throws to stay close most of the game...McClain led Trevecca with 20 points and 9 rebounds...Patton had a season-low 13 points, but came away with 10 assists...Record: 12-3.

#16 Trevecca (109) at Freed-Hardeman (95)

Trojans sluggish in first half, having arrived 10 minutes before game time because of snow...Took control of the game just before halftime and never looked back...Trevecca shot almost 62% from field...Patton's 14 assists tied school record held by Calvin Holmes...He also had 29 points...McClain finished with 27...Heaberlin was 7 for 7 from field...Mason led all rebounders with 10...Renard Carpenter scored 23 points for the Lions...Record: 13-3.

#17 Trevecca (97) at Belmont(80)

Trojans dominated Belmont on their home court...Belmont only shot 37% from the field...Patton had 29 points and McClain had 26...Hiser and Mason each had 10 rebounds...Calvin Peters netted 24 points for Belmont...Record: 14-3.

#18 Lindsey-Wilson (82) at Trevecca (96)

First non-conference game after 8 straight TCAC contests...First year as a four-year school for Columbia, KY college...Played tough, but lack of experience showed...Chris Johnson led all scorers with 24...Heaberlin had 21 points and 12 rebounders for Trevecca...Mason also grabbed 12 boards...Record: 15-3.

#19 Bethel (81) at Trevecca (93)

Bethel played tough in first half as Trevecca took a two-point lead to intermission...Patton led all scorers with 28 and Brooks added 25...Steve Tiszai had 10 rebounds for the Wildcats...Record: 16-3.

#20 Lambuth (74) at Trevecca (108)

Avery Patton broke Melvin Taylor's career scoring record (2080)...Sloppy game marred by 65 fouls for both teams...Two Trojans and five Eagles fouled out...Lambuth shot 30% from field...Patton and Brooks scored 21 points each...Brooks was 13 for 13 from line...Mason had 10 rebounds...Record: 17-3.

#21 Christian Bros. (64) at Trevecca (82)

Trevecca avenged only conference loss...Game much closer than score would indicate...Brooks had season-high 33 points and 8 rebounds...Tim Sprock kept CBC close with five 3-pointers and finished with 25 points...Record: 18-3.

#22 Trevecca (97) at Union (87)

One of the toughest games all year...Very close game until the end when two technicals against Union padded the score...All three guards scored over 20 points...David Barham from Union matched Patton's game-high 34 points...Heaberlin had a season-high 17 rebounds while Steve Jett countered with 12...Record: 19-3.

#23 Trevecca (72) at Cumberland (71)

Cumberland coming off an upset of Lipscomb, almost did the same thing to Trojans...Brooks came up with a steal and slammed the ball to give Trevecca a one-point lead with under 30 seconds remaining...He then blocked a last-second shot by Rodney Martin to preserve the victory...Cumberland shot 60% from the field...Patton had 12 assists for Trevecca...John Hunn had 25 points and 11 rebounds from Cumberland...Jeff Hummel added 22 points (11 of 13 from the field) for the losers...Record: 20-3.

#24 Bristol (83) at Trevecca (94)

Bristol led by 1 at half-time...Hiser had a team season-high 18 rebounds...Heaberlin 13 boards and blocked 3 shots...Patton had 27 points and 9 assists...Basron Minor and George Howard each had over 20 points for Bristol...Record: 21-3.

#25 Belmont (88) at Trevecca (94)

Trojan forwards in foul trouble most of game...McClain had 30 points (including 12 for 12 from the line) and 10 rebounds...Patton had 24 points and 13 rebounds...Calvin Peters once again scored over 20 points against Trevecca...Record: 22-3.

#26 Trevecca (94) at Lambuth (79)

Trojans clinched the conference title with 14-1 record...McClain, Tiller, and Lambuth's Paul Yarbrough were ejected for disorderly conduct...Patton led all scorers with 33...Brooks scored 20, including 14 for 15 from the line...Hiser had 19 points and 10 rebounds...Record: 23-3.

#27 Trevecca (108) at Lipscomb (100)

IN YOUR GYM!!!!...Trojans finish conference season with 15-1 record (best ever)...Broke all-time winning streak with 15...Trevecca took 18 point lead after an alley-oop from Patton to Brooks...Lipscomb roared back, scoring 17 out of 19 points to come within 3, 93-90...Trojans hit key free throws down the stretch to preserve win...Trevecca was 37 for 45 from the line...All three guards scored over 20 points again (Patton had 27, McClain had 23, and Brooks had 21)...Heaberlin pulled down 13 rebounds...Richard Taylor (8 for 11 from 3-point range) led the Bisons with 26...Anthony Jones added 22...Record: 24-3.

#28 Trevecca (73) at Lindsey Wilson (58)

Broke Patton's consecutive game (123) and consecutive start (121) records (injured ankle)...Reggie Tiller had career-high 21 points to lead Trevecca in scoring...Steve Martin scored 24 points for Lindsey-Wilson...Record: 25-3.

#29 Bethel (74) at Trevecca (101) (District 24 Playoff)

Trevecca dominated Bethel, who had eliminated Trojans in five out of last six tournament encounters...Trevecca hit 28 out of 32 free throws (including McClain's 9 for 9)...Patton netted 22 points...Heaberlin had 21 points and 11 rebounds...Hiser and Mason also contributed 11 rebounds each...Mason had 4 steals as well...Steve Tiszai and Alray Lewis paced the Wildcats with 22 and 20 points, respectively...Record: 26-3.

#30 David Lipscomb (106) at Trevecca (112), 2 of (District 24 Playoff)
