

BLACKWOOD SINGERS TO PERFORM AT TREVECCA

(MCN Gospel News, March 1, 1972) - "Successful, very, very successful; was the way Blackwood Singer, Ron Blackwood summed up his recent tour of the West Coast.

"On the road a little better than three-and-one half weeks, the Singers arrived back in Nashville, exhausted from the rigid pace manager Ron had set for them.

"When the Blackwoods left Nashville, little did they realize that they would return with a storehouse of statistics. The Singers traveled more than 10,000 miles and sang in 24 performances.

"Standing-room-only crowds were found on three different occasions; the biggest crowd was in Anaheim, California where more than 3,000 persons came to see the Blackwood Singers at Melodyland...

"While in California the Blackwood Singers became the first group to bring gospel music to Knotts Berry Farm, the third largest amusement park in the world, which presents entertainment acts year round on a week-end basis.

"The Blackwood Singers sang to

capacity crowds at two performances and held their own on the stage which in the past has graced such acts as Red Skelton, Jeannie C. Riley, Milton Berle, Joey Bishop, Porter Wagoner and Dolly Parton, Ray Coniff Singers, Johnny Cash, and Roy Rogers and Dale Evans...

"Entertainment Manager Bill Hollinshead of John Wayne Theater acknowledged them from the stage by saying that 'in the entertainment realm, we hear very little about the gospel music business. However, I think we are going to hear quite a lot about a group that performed at Knotts Berry this weekend'..."

In addition to breaking records in the secular field, the Blackwood Singers are dedicated Christians. They give God all the praise for their success, and their main purpose in singing is to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to as many people as possible.

They will be presenting a concert here at Trevecca in McClurkin Auditorium, Tuesday night, March 5 at 8:00 p.m. Tickets are only \$1, and the profit will go towards Concert Choir's European tour.

Time and again, day in, day out, I'm faced with one recurring issue that always irritates me and often makes me somewhat angry - the lack of cooperation on Trevecca's campus. No matter which way I turn, I find this lack of harmony between students, administrators, and faculty members.

Believe me, I don't expect our beloved TNC to be a Utopia for Nazarenes - a perfectly-working society for the inhabitants of a beautiful island - like the society in 1984. No, I don't expect the people of Holy Hill to be without blemish; but it really bothers me when I see what a lack of concern there is here for other students', your own friends', feelings. Little effort is made to understand the other guy, to literally crawl behind his eyes, to peep out at the world and see it as he sees it.

All these have some merit, no doubt; but, in my opinion, none is worth the money and effort if you weren't allowed the freedom to decide for yourself if you liked Trevecca enough to help make it that "something extra" place we hear so much about.

Celebrate Unity - how ironic a theme, ironic in the sense that we can't celebrate something we still lack in so many phases of our campus life and curriculum.

Looking back over a letter I wrote to the student body early fall quarter, I made this statement: "It takes the total cooperation of many people to put out a good paper, not just the work of a certain few." I feel this is true for the whole school, too. If we want a good atmosphere and attitude to prevail at Trevecca, we need to work together in a cooperative effort to create such an attitude and atmosphere.

Now, how do we go about starting such a change? I feel both "Letters to the Editor" this issue might be a step in the right direction - looking for the good and building on that good in the school and in the people that go here, instead of always looking at the bad and tearing down the whole institution as a result.

I'm not blinded to Trevecca's faults - she's got a lot of things that need to be improved. I just happen to think, though, that Trevecca's got a lot of good in her yet, too. And we need to start realizing that - Trevecca is as good or bad as we the student body make her.

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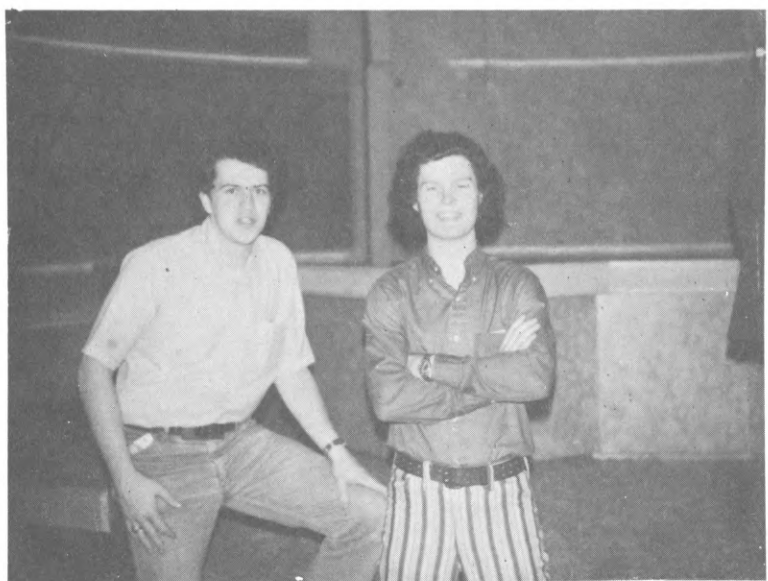

NEW FACULTY: Dr. Robert E. Norton

Doctor Robert Norton is new to Trevecca this quarter. He has been teaching in the Education and Psychology department.

Dr. Norton is from Hampton, Texas. He and his wife both graduated from Bethany Nazarene College, where he received his B.S. degree. He received his M.E.D. degree from Sam Houston State University, and his Ph.D. from the University of Texas.

When I asked him what made him decide to start teaching, he said both his parents were teachers, along with other relatives. He was

very interested in biology when he began school but later changed it to his minor.

Dr. Norton has been teaching since 1959. He taught elementary school, substituted, taught student teachers in the University of Texas and taught in a teacher training school in Swaziland.

He served in Swaziland as a short-term missionary for two years. He taught the native people in the aforementioned teacher training school which, when completed, gave the students the equivalent to a high school

education, which they used to teach in primary schools.

Dr. Norton's wife, Zola, has her master's degree from Sam Houston and also teaches. She has taught elementary school, and taught high school in Swaziland. The Nortons have two daughters: Whitney, age two, who is in nursery school and Heather, age six, in kindergarten at College Hill.

Air Force ROTC???

You may think you know everything you need - or want - to know about ROTC, and you may be right. But then again, you may be wrong. Did you know that Air Force ROTC is offered to students at Trevecca Nazarene College? Did you know that it's not too late to enroll in Air Force ROTC? Did you know that a total of 6,500 scholarships are given each year to cadets at 180 colleges and universities enrolled in AFROTC? Did you know that there are two Trevecca students (Dennis Conrad and Steve Blakeman) enrolled in AFROTC, and they both are now on AFROTC scholarships? Scholarships pay for tuition, books and allot \$100 per month for a tax-free allowance. Did you know that 20 percent of these scholarships can be given to cadets enrolled in the AFROTC two-year program? This two-year program enables those who missed the opportunity of enrolling in Air Force ROTC during their first two years on campus to enroll for the second two years. If you have two years remaining at the undergraduate or graduate level, you may be eligible to enroll in the two-year program.

If you want to learn to fly, what better way than the Air Force? Of course, if you like sailing, that's a little out of our line. Suppose, however, you don't want (or are not physically qualified) to fly. Well, we think that Air Force has a lot to offer you - more than 180 careers to pick from. Our cadets get to go

I asked Dr. Norton what is his impression of Trevecca so far. He likes it and hopes to stay a long time. He says the administration and faculty are very nice, and the students are congenial. He doesn't like the wet weather, but then not many of us do!

Dr. Norton is a great addition to our school, and we're glad to have the opportunity to know him. Welcome to Trevecca!

BENSON LECTURES HELD

Idaho, and Oregon.

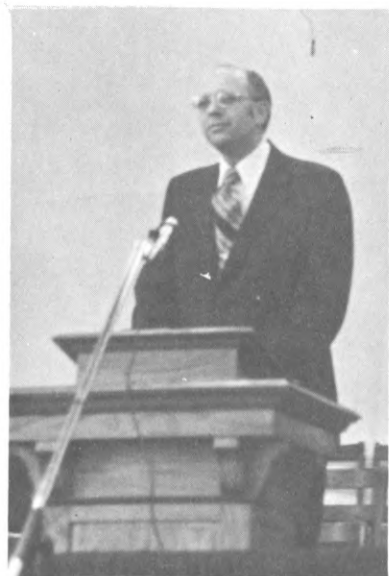
In 1958, Johnson and his family moved to Frankfurt, Germany, where he pioneered the work of the Nazarene church in the Middle European and Northwest European districts.

At his present position, Rev. Johnson supervises the work of more than 550 missionaries in 52 world areas. We at Trevecca were indeed privileged to have heard this man during our chapel services.

The subject of Rev. Johnson's lecture series concerned an archaeological expedition through the Bible. In the four services at which he spoke, Rev. Johnson spoke on vital and extremely interesting topics.

The John T. Benson Lecture Series is in memory of the late John T. Benson, Sr., a benefactor and leader of this college for many years.

Mr. John T. Benson, Jr. annually provides the funds to make this series possible. We of the Trevecca community are deeply indebted to the Benson family for establishing this timely lecture series. "FASTING"

The very word fasting used to conjure up dark visions of black ashes, black robes and people weeping and mourning. It was a time of repenting and was done, if at all, very seldom.

But God has begun to break down those boxed-up conclusions. Fasting can become a powerful tool for God. However, to many Christians, fasting is a fast-dying word and an already dead work. Fasting slipped out with the Dark Ages along with turning lead into gold. Or has it? More importantly, should it?

Fasting is mentioned enough times in the Old and New Testaments to deserve some thought. Jesus fasted for 40 days at the beginning of his ministry. Paul mentions that he himself fasted often. In Acts in two specific instances (13:2, 3; 14:23), the leaders of the church fasted when seeking guidance and choosing leaders. The church in the early centuries emphasized fasting as a necessary duty of the Christian, at the same time warning against letting it become a mere external act. Coming down through the centuries, John Wesley also considered fasting to be crucial. When a minister was received into membership, he was asked: "Will you recommend fasting or abstinence both by precept and example?" Wesley's Seventh Sermon on the Mount is devoted entirely to the question of fasting. There he warns that there will be those who exalt it all out of proportion, but also there are those who ignore it completely.

There is always the danger, of course, of over-emphasizing fasts, or letting it become a mechanical observance. The Old Testament prophets warn us that fasting is useless without right conduct. The Pharisees are a prime example of how fasting can be used to exalt the self.

With the right attitude, however, fasting can become a silent but powerful weapon for the Kingdom of God. Can we, as Christians, afford to ignore anything God has given us to help in this earthly spiritual battle? I would urge all Christians to seriously think and pray in this direction.

If God leads you to fast for a particular need, don't question or hesitate to follow His will. It could be the beginning of a miracle.

February 2 the Trojans were again on the road for a 5 1/2 hour trip to Johnson City, Tennessee to play a strong Milligan College.

For Trevecca, the highlight performance came from Ralph Watson, 20 points and 17 rebounds for another good game for Mr. Leaguer. Ralph said, "I just had a mad night."

Johnny "The Machine" Evans was right behind Ralph with an output of 18 points. He also helped the Trojans score with 5 assists. Sam Davis, a strong ball player for Trevecca this year, had a very fine performance of 18 rebounds. He did a good job starting and came off strong from the bench. Sam scored 5 points. Dennis Powers, the quick guard, had 6 assists.

As a team, Trevecca shot 34-83 for 41 percent; free throws, 1-7 for a very poor 14 percent. Trevecca had 58 rebounds as a team.

The highpoint men for Milligan were Jerry Craft, 20 points; Craig Boyles, 18 points; and Rick Long, 24 points. These three totaled for 64 points. As a team, Milligan shot 37-83 for 44 percent, and at the foul line, 10-18 for 55 percent. They totaled 45 rebounds.

On January 22, the Trojans bused to Bryan College. Many people missed the game due to the distance involved.

Highlight of an overall poorly-played game was Johnny "The Machine" Evans, who tallied 29 points. He also helped with 7 assists. In addition, he used his defensive abilities by picking off 3 interceptions. Ralph Watson, who had been keeping the nets hot with his scoring, sacked 24 points Larry "Country" Hatfield, the outstanding (and only) freshman on the team, scored 17 points on the boards, pulling down 9 rebounds. Larry, though small-size for a forward, has power and toughness underneath for Trevecca. Mike Griner, one of the most physical Trojans, muscled his way for 11 rebounds.

Stats for Trevecca were field goals, 42-90 for 47 percent; and free throws, 11-18 for 61 percent. Rebounds for Trevecca as a team were 27 offensive and 25 defensive for a total of 52.

Highlighters for Bryan College were three men who scored in the 20's: Woody Duncan (29), Reggie Cook (20), and Dave Eldridge (26). The team stats showed Bryan from the field, 43-70 for 59 percent; free throws, 27-37 for 73 percent; and rebounds, a mere total of 35.

Looking back at one of the most heart-breaking seasons, it seems that we, as an inter-collegiate athletic school, have lost something.

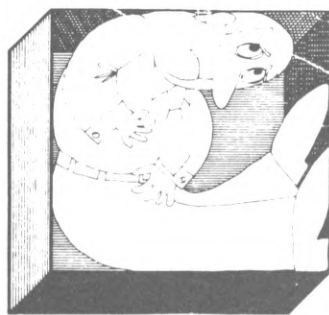
