CAMPUS SENSES REVIVAL SPIRIT

October 6 at 7:30 p.m. will mark the first night of our revival at Trevecca. Everyone should be there to hear Rev. Melvin McCullough, who will be the evangelist.

After graduating with honors and receiving the Good Citizen Award from Bethany Nazarene College in 1961, he moved on to graduate from the Nazarene Theological Seminary with highest honors and was awarded with the Outstanding Student Award in 1964. He then became the founding pastor of a new home mission church in Fort Worth, Texas that is now a substantial soul-winning church with a beautiful sanctuary and educational unit. Also, while he was pastoring in Shawnee, Kansas, he saw this church more than double in membership through an

aggressive program of personal and pulpit evangelism. In August of 1971 he assumed the postorate of the First Church of the Nazarene in Seattle, Washington where his congregation is experiencing tremendous growth. His book, *The Inevitable Encounter*, was published by the Nazarene Publishing House in 1971.

Ken Tippitt will be our song evangelist during the revival. Mt. Tippitt graduated from the Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, Idaho and is now the minister of music at the First Church of the Nazarene in Denver, Colorado. He also directs T.V. music for Denver First Church. He has been song evangelist in many revivals with outstanding results and rewarding experiences.

If all the Christian students at Trevecca, including faculty members, would spend at least ten minutes in sincere prayer each day, there would certainly be results. If only we become burdened for the needs of just one other person and want with all our hearts for that person to meet our Savior face to face and be willing to pray, fast, and sacrifice for that one soul, our Savior will not let us down, but will boost us by giving us a rewarding experience through this revival. If we can just bring ourselved to make a little time for this and to care a little bit and to ask God to guide and direct us, we could all bring at least one to the feet of Jesus because he is waiting. And that would be worth everything.

Love is a commodity known to few, and enjoyed by even less. The word, love, which attempts to discribe a beautiful concept, has often been abused by use in context irrelevant to its meaning, and to such an extent that most people no longer interpret it as they should. There have been so many unorthodox attempts to find a real, consummated love, that many people are confused, not knowing how to find it. Not even knowing what they will have after it is theirs.

Like most youth today, I began to search for love without any real knowledge of what it is and few conventions to aid my search. I thought I knew what love was all about, in fact, I even confessed a love for many people. Somehow, though, I felt that there had to be more to love than I was experiencing. This became even more evident when I read the instruction of John as he said, "Little children, let us stop just saying we love people; let us really love them, and show it by our actions." This brought many questions to my mind. Do I love people as I should? Was what I called love really love or was I just saying, "I love people."? If it was not love, how could I find a complete love? Too often, my actions did not reflect a spirit of love.

As I studied the various aspects of love in the Bible, in books, and from other sources, I realized that love is not something that happens. It is a feeling which has to be learned. Just as a baby learns to trust and then to love its mother, just as young converts learn to trust and then to love Christ; so must we as individuals learn to trust and love each other.

"For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ." This is the key. I realized that real love must find its foundation in Jesus Christ. Any other foundation can only result in a perverted love, one full of problems, disappointments, and disillusions. However, through Him we are able to love by faith. Inspite of all outside influences, a love which is peretuated by faith can remain strong. By faith we can ask Jesus to give us love for everyone — even those who cause problems.

I am far from an authority on love; I can only share with you that which I have learned through study and through a personal relationship with Christ. Each time I read from His word, the way becomes more evident. It is as though I am climbing a mountain which will never end. However, with each step higher, my vision, which scans the secrets of a true consummated love, becomes less impaired.

It would seem that a spirit of love should be a fruit in every Christian's life. I feel that is could be if the human factor were not involved. We have a tendency to be led away on tangents of self interest which are contrary to a real love. Going on these tangents is like throwing a rock into a still pond. The love is agitated much as the water is when a rock breaks the surface; but if we are sincere in seeking God's love, this true love will resettle with greater magnitude.

As editor of the Trev-Echoes, a member of the student council, a student, and just Bill Gunno, my goal is that they will know I am a Christian by my love. Will you make this your goal?

The Women's Resident Association strives to promote unity among the women on campus and to make a definite contribution to the college. With these two goals in mind, they are planning a number of activities for the coming


A major project of the WRA this year is the Big-Little Sister program. Several social activities, are planned for the Big-Little


