Personal Action Radically Touching You (P.A.R.T.Y.) is the promise brought back to Trevecca's campus from the 28 of our students who attended San Diego '89. San Diego '89 was a five day conference for college students and young adults with an emphasis on evangelism and missions.

Approximately 450 students from Nazarene campuses in the U.S. and Canada attended this event. This event consisted of seminars and workshops aimed at letting the students become aware of the many opportunities available in the mission field. They were challenged to serve Christ and to make the most of every opportunity to share His word with others.

The workshops covered such areas as ministry to the poor, chaplaincy, pastoring, AIDS ministry, urban ministry, ministries to the homeless, concert ministry, work and witness teams, Christian journalism, health care ministry, and teenage runaway ministry.

Special speakers included Dr. Ron Benefiel, Barry Brown, Becky Laird-Christensen, Dr. Steve Green, Dr. Donald Owens, Dr.

Robert Scott, Norm Shoemaker, Dr. Bill Sullivan, Vern and Natalie Ward, and the very popular Dr. Tony Campolo.

Dr. Tony Campolo opened the San Diego '89 conference with a story about partying for the Lord and serving Him joyfully. Trevecca students furthered this idea and came up with the acronym "P.A.R.T.Y." to challenge other students to minister to others by becoming involved in their lives in a very personal way. Through personal contact others can see the compassion and love of Christ. But in order to do this, we must be willing to get out and look for opportunities.

In addition to the workshops and seminars, there were ministry excursions each day. These excursions included visits at orphanages, beach ministry opportunities, talks with homeless, and a trip to Tijuana.

Booths were also set up on Point Lom's campus to show the students various aspects of the different ministry opportunities. These booths included areas such as lifetime ministry, short term outreach, sponsorship of children, urban ministries, and various Nazarene church related pro-

One common denominator with all students at Trevecca whether freshman or senior, male or female, rich or poor, is concerned about finances. In light of this feeling of concern, an interview with the Dean of Students, Steve Harris seemed appropriate. Through many questions, I discovered new insight into the financial situation here at Trevecca.

Trevecca is financially sound. Our school had a very low default rate in comparison with state

schools and other Nazarene schools. This simply means that the majority of the students who attend here eventually pay their bills. The key word is eventually.

Over the Christmas holidays, many received a letter encouraging the payment of Spring Semester's bill by April 1, 1990. This date has been the policy at TNC for years, however, due to abuse of this date it is now having to be reinforced with the possibility of disenrollment.

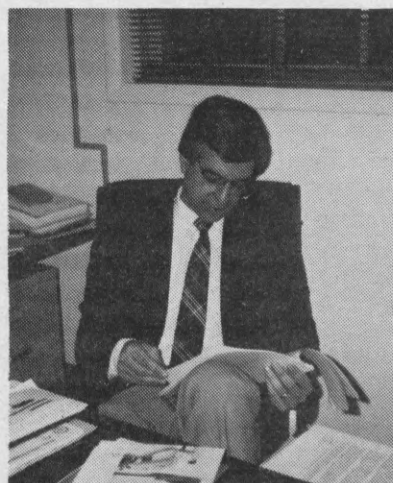
I ask Dean Harris if this disenrollment was going to happen as

was stated in the letter. He clarified the statements to refer to those students who have no payment plan for paying their bill. He emphasized Trevecca's desire to keep students from sinking into a debt they have no means to repay. By coming into the offices of the financial directors and trying to work out a payment plan, many students who may face disenrollment can avoid it.

The abuse of paying one's bill has dire consequences, I learned. Last fall, although TNC was "in the black," we owed 1.8 million

dollars in outstanding debts. On paper, the school is operating above its debt, however, the cash flow indicates a problem that had to be addressed. In fact, last summer, TNC had to borrow money in order to operate due to students who were not paying their bills on time. "Trevecca is not a lending institution," stated Dean Harris, "we need you to help us out by paying your bill off with funds from an institution able to lend money."

In effect, students who don't pay their bills until the end of the

Weekend entertainment is spent in the Bible Study, prayer, or out on the town seeking to share the Gospel with the Homeless or unfortunate.

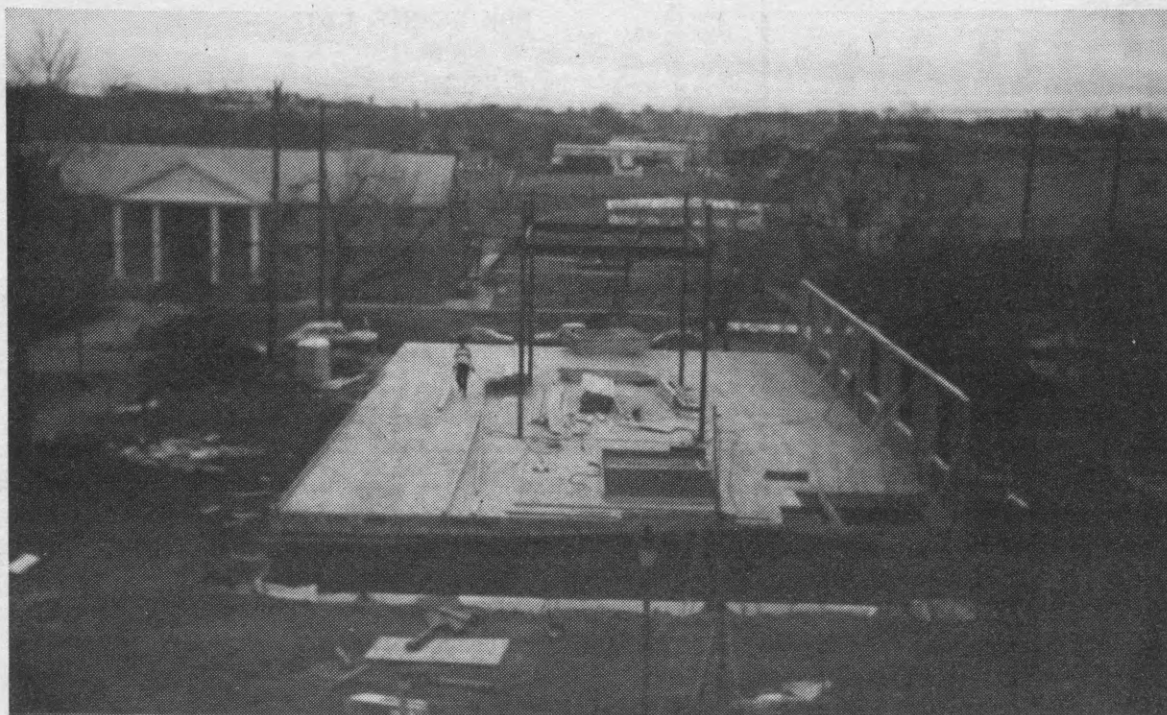

Dr. Homer Adams, our president, explains quite well the purpose of the project and where the money came from.

Dr. Adams explained that the enrollment of TNC has doubled in the past semesters, thus demanding an increase of staff. Although with this growth the current administration building and its space has remained the same. The new building would allow for the offices to be more adequately spaced and it would increase efficiency. He admits that the lack of space of the present building has had an effect of the services rendered.

The new Administration Build-

ing would welcome the Alumni Office (from Tidwell), Church Relations and Development, Admissions, and the Public Information Offices. The new building will be able to serve the public better, according to Dr. Adams.

He also said that the new building would not "benefit the present student body, but it will effect indirectly for better services."

So where is the money coming from?

Dr. Adams reassures the student body by telling us that the money for the building is from gifts. It is not being paid for from our tuition. Its total cost is approximately \$316 thousand dollars.

Dr. Adams feels that the building "would be a great benefit to the entire campus; it would relieve the crowded situation and would allow office space for faculty and their services."

One last note. Let's appreciate the new Administration Building instead of holding it against TREVECCA.

Bills, bills, bills...

As classes resume for the Spring semester of 1990, many students are faced with that big question. "How am I going to pay the remainder of my bill?" This has always been a big issue, but not until January 8th did the students realize just how big it really was. Students were informed by a letter from Dr. Adams dated December 28, 1989 that the remainder of their bills must be paid by the April 1, 1990 deadline or the school would take action to disenroll them.

Many students began to think

that Trevecca was desperate for money or they would have to file for bankruptcy. This is not true. Trevecca Nazarene College is not closing its doors. According to Mr. M.L. White, Chief Fiscal Officer, Trevecca is in good shape financially. In another six years all the indebtedness should be erased from the books.

There have been students who feel that the stricter regulations have just come about but the guideline have always been in the Trevecca Catalog.

However, not until recently did the school feel the need to en-

force those guidelines and regulations. This decision came about because students tried to get by with paying just the bare minimum and Trevecca realized the need to take action. When a student registers at Trevecca, they will be expected on the day of registration to pay their tuition only. They will have until the April 1 deadline to pay the remaining part of their bill which includes room, board, and any lab fees assigned to them. To some this seems rather harsh but there are other colleges that require students to pay the full amount on the day of

registration.

According to Mr. White, the Nazarene Credit Union will be coming to Trevecca to help and assist students in paying off their bills. They will issue loans to any students who have a bill due April 1st. They will virtually guarantee to make a loan so the student may pay the remaining balance.

Luckily, Trevecca did not lose many students due to this. Trevecca has tried to work with the students rather than against them.

Mr. White does not feel that enrollment will drop due to the tighter payment regulations because most people have been very cooperative thus far.

LOCATION FOR 1993 GENERAL ASSEMBLY CHANGED

The site for the Twenty-Third Quadrennial General Assembly and Conventions will be Denver, Colo., rather than Houston, Tex., as was previously announced, according to B. Edgar Johnson, general secretary.

"There was a grassroots dissatisfaction with the plan for 1993 which led to a reevaluation of the Houston site and a decision to change locations," said Johnson.

The assembly and conventions will be held at the new Colorado Convention Center and at adjacent facilities in downtown Denver. Sunday's traditional opening services will be held at Denver's Mile High Stadium.

The Colorado Convention Center is located within two blocks of the city's 16th Street Mall and within walking distance of 4,000 hotel rooms. It is scheduled for completion in April 1990.

"Easy accessibility by air and land plus many wonderful, relatively low-cost hotel facilities, and a beautiful new downtown convention center make Denver an excellent choice for our quadrennial gathering," said Johnson. "It also offers hundreds of possibilities for pre- and post-assembly vacations in the nearby Rocky Mountains."

The General Conventions and Assembly are scheduled to run from June 23 to July 2, 1993.

NAZARENE CHOIR TO BE FIRST IN SPACE

The choir of Lakeland, Fla., Highland Park Church of the Nazarene will become the first church choir in space during the next space shuttle mission, according to Jim Lacy, minister of worship. The next shuttle launch is scheduled for Saturday, February 10, at Cape Kennedy.

The 102-voice choir will not visit space personally, but they are sending a tape of the song, "Golden Dreams," which they recorded Sunday, January 7, Lacy said. They will also sing in Jetty Park, adjacent to Kennedy Space Center, just prior to lift-off.

Lacy reports that the process to get a "moment" (NASA's designation for items sent into space) on a shuttle has taken two years. The idea originated during a Fall 1987 shuttle launch when a church secretary, Peggy Dawson, suggested that it would be wonderful to send a tape of the choir into space.

Approval for the tape came Monday, January 8, according to Lacy. The tape will be sent to Johnson Space Center in Houston, Tex., for security checks and then returned to Cape Kennedy for the launch.

Lacy also reported that, after the shuttle mission, a NASA executive will formally present the tape to the church. It will be placed in a time capsule and buried until the church's 50th anniversary in 2010. Don Wellman is the senior pastor of the Highland Park Church.

The David K. Wachtel Lecture Series on Evangelism was presented in chapel January 16-17 with special guest speaker Dr. W. Donald Wellman.

Wellman is Senior Pastor of the Highland Park Church of the Nazarene in Lakeland, FL as of March, 1989. He was previously pastor of the Denver First Church of the Nazarene from 1968 to 1989. While in Denver, Wellman created the "Dynamics of Discipling" program which has been translated into several languages.

The Tuesday, Jan. 16th service focused on Matthew 28:16, "The Great Commission", but the example in Acts 3 was used to portray the Commission in action. He drew from four points: pattern, problem, preaching, and power.

"Pattern" is the basis of fellowship with God in prayer 3 times a day--seven days a week.

"Problem" is man's crippling at birth which is composed of sin and selfishness. And that men are begging to come to the knowledge of Christ.

"Preaching" is man's way of conveying God to others. Our actions in carrying out the life of Christianity holds a sermon in itself.

What kind of sermon are we preaching?

"Power" is what the lame man experienced when Peter came and lifted him up and his legs were healed. In this same fashion sinners can only be healed when Christians show that love to them

as a hope and lift them out of the trapped lifestyle that they live.

On Wednesday, Jan. 17th, Wellman shared Ephesians 4:11-16. The emphasis was the vitality of the classroom in preparing God's disciples for potential use. The example he used was of tuning a piano.

"Not only is it vital that God's disciples prepare for service but that the learned knowledge is put to use in works of service," Wellman said. "What use is the piano if we do not use it after it is tuned?"

According to Wellman, Acts 2:46 shows God's disciples how to use their knowledge in works of service: learning, fellowshiping, worshipping, and reaching.

He emphasized that if all four of these areas were not exercised to their potential within the disciple's life then he/she would eventually "reject, accept, or reduce."

Wellman made a special appearance in McClurken RM 304 at 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 17th for a class on Evangelism. He addressed questions from students concerning evangelism in their own community of TNC.

Wellman said that if TNC was like most Christian college campuses then there should be plenty of hurting people that need to be loved and "picked up" right on our own campus.

Editor's Note: Calvin Miller, a Baptist pastor in Omaha, Nebraska, spoke in a series of chapels last spring. He has written fifteen books including the popular *Singer and Singreale* trilogies. The man from Down Under

How does it feel to be a foreign student of Trevecca Nazarene College? How does it feel to enter an environment like TNC's - whose ideals are at the very least familiar - and abide by rules that to an Australian represent good and bad aspects of America. Having been at Trevecca for two short (or long) 3 weeks I think that while basically it is an institution of goodness, there are apparent areas where greater communication between administration and students is required for the benefit of all.

As an outsider, hopefully objective enough to paint an accurate picture of this institution, Trevecca is an enigma. Not because it is a Christian college but because it doesn't fall into place with other conceptions of America that in fairness to Australians are often distorted.

By conceptions I refer to those of excessive capitalism, many inequalities and opportunity which is commonly abused. At first glance, Trevecca is a contradiction to these opinions and whilst this is good, there are other less enlightening facets I have also come across.

Not that I or other Australians have anything against "Uncle Sam." Rather it is what is expected and what actually occurs that causes my indifference.

My experience up to date have told me a lot about TNC. Since I have been here I have observed a very strict school that upholds Christian beliefs in a light of discipline and order. This nevertheless has tended to create friction between the student body and administration, as displayed by certain fire alarm incidents. Admittedly these are serious offences, but it has struck me that it is against the college's best wishes when model students in fields of academic and athletic excellence are dismissed for acts that, if true, represent little more than student immaturity not pre-meditated disruption.

Coming from a land of many atheists, it seems a contradiction that Trevecca should believe so strongly in its Christian beliefs and then stubbornly refuse to forgive those who have sinned. If those in much higher positions are able to be given second chances, then surely those students -- if I am to believe the American Christian value of equality -- should be given opportunities to redeem themselves.

On a more complementary note I have found Chapel to be more rewarding and less of a liability

untouched. Am I to take for granted that this college environment is typical of those around this country, or am I to believe that Trevecca is a last bastion of worship for those young at heart and mind? Only time will tell what I am to believe deep down.

In the mean-time there are more immediate problems at Trevecca that I have realized. Perhaps it is because I come from a place 20,000 miles away where it is the middle of summer, but I was of-

fended when told shorts are a definite no-no. What ideal does this college have to uphold more strongly than that free world right to wear shorts during summer?

Less importantly, it appears strange that TNC has relatively few courses to major in, including ones that require specialization in different fields. A course that readily comes to mind as being unfairly inadequate - it is only a major - is a subject called journalism. Where, I ask would all the great newspaper writers of today be without having that chance to study journalistic principles through college?

My last major grumble concerns the reasons for administering fines. While school order is important I feel it is a poor excuse to fine students because their rooms are messy. If members of the opposite sex are indeed disallowed in students dorms and, after all, the dorms should be used as students see fit to an acceptable level, then why should people be fined purely because of varying personal standards of cleanliness?

I think basically, Trevecca is a good school. Sure, there are things that can and should be improved, but what school is infallible? Within reason of the quality of first impressions, TNC is to me, an acceptable change in lifestyle. "Say G'day Trevecca!"

Coach Wilson dismissing after 1990 season

After 11 years as Head Baseball Coach at TNC, Coach Elliot Johnson will be dismissed following the 1990 campaign.

Johnson began his baseball coaching career at Taylor University back in 1978 before coming to TNC in the 1979 season. Official reasoning for Johnson's dismissal is the lack of a Doctorate in the Physical Education Department.

Amassing a sparkling 299-137 win-loss during his 10 year tenure, Coach Johnson has been among the top ten winningest coaches in the NAIA. However, to this modest coach the record is a reflection of the hard work and discipline both he and his players have endured over the years.

Johnson's successor is Greenville college coach Dr. Dave Altop. Altop will also be Athletic Director as well as the P.E. departmental head.

Coach Johnson feels no bitterness toward TNC but sees this as an opportunity for him to use his skills elsewhere.

"I was glad things were finalized before the spring season started," Johnson said. "I didn't want the off-field problems to be detrimental to the team."

The team of which he spoke is this year's Trojans. Coming off his most memorable year in coaching, Johnson feels this year's team is much stronger than the District 24 Champion '89 squad. His plan for this year is to approach it just like any other with a positive attitude and spirit.

"With the potential this team has it is necessary for us to keep

a good attitude," said Johnson. "We must practice and prepare hard in order for our maximum potential to be reached."

Unlike most coaches in a similar position, it is hard to believe that he can enter his final season with such a positive attitude, considering the circumstances.

This is a great showing of the class of this man, not only as a coach, but as a person. Johnson has built TNC Baseball into a solid program which has been nationally recognized in the top twenty

in the NAIA. As Coach Johnson looked back over his career to date, he cited the '89 District 24 Championship Season of which his Trojans won six sudden death games in a row as his most memorable occasion.

When asked how he wanted to be remembered as a coach, Johnson replied, "As a man who gave his all to the program and to help the players reach their potential on and off the field, as well as a man who strengthened the ties of a player and christianity."

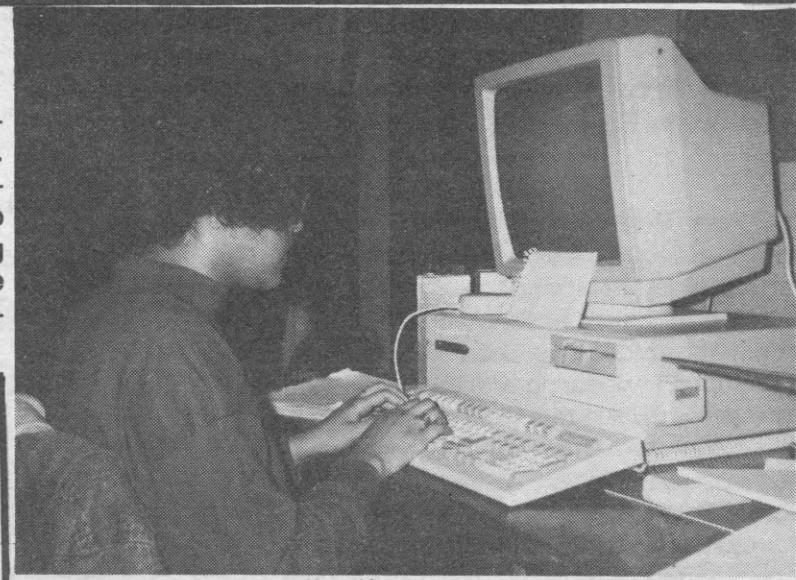
