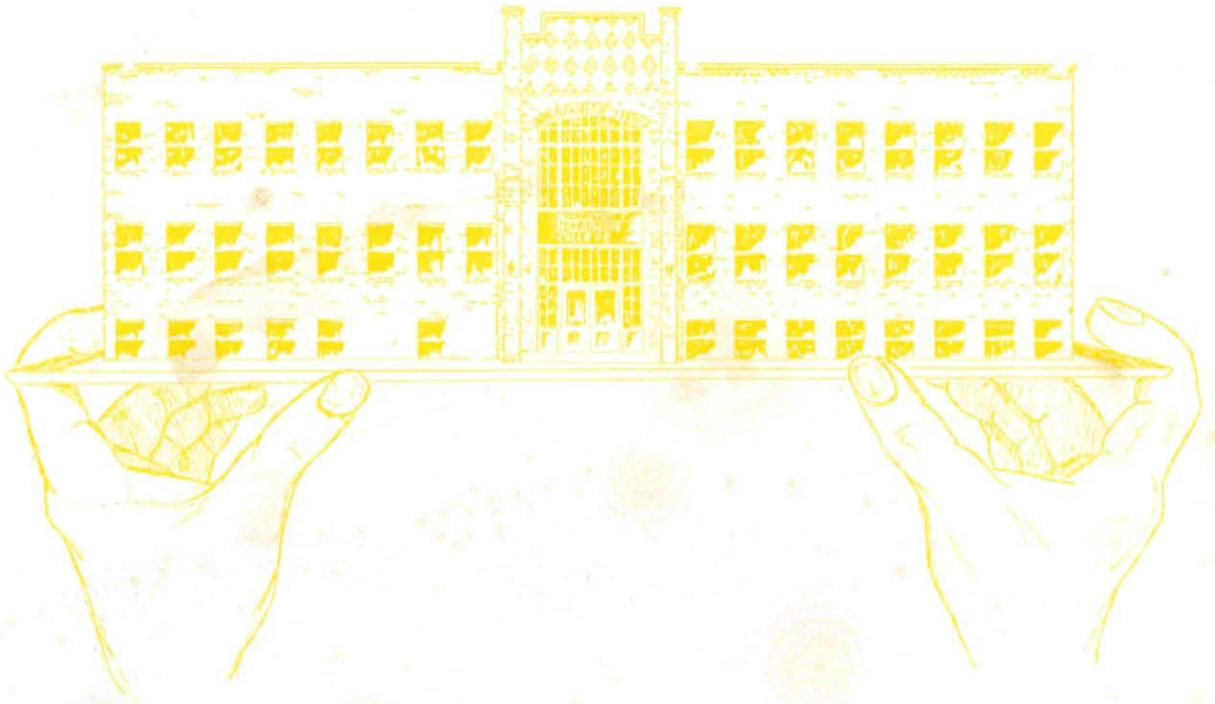

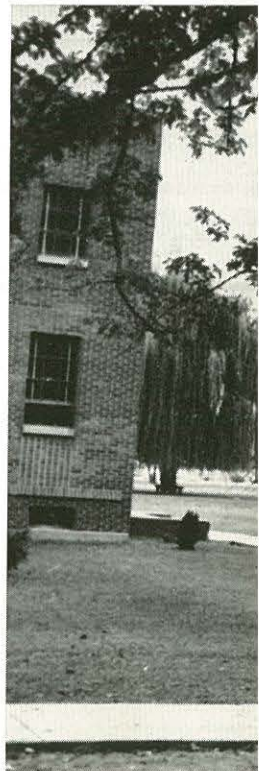

Whose mental adventures in the pulpit, on the chapel platform, and behind the presidential desk have startled us into thought and guided action. . . .

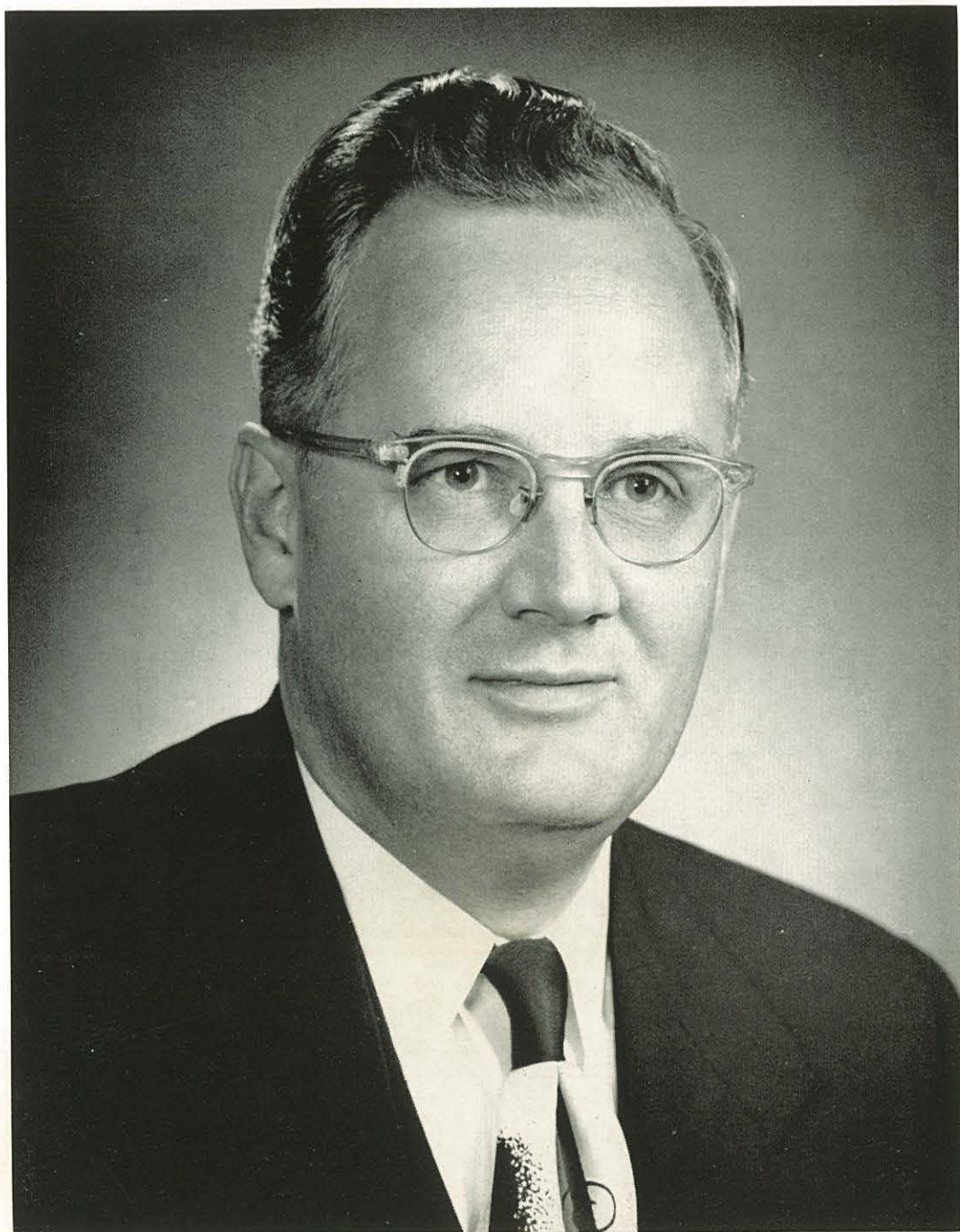
Whose flair for humor has revealed itself in Irish vein. . . .

From a heart that had grace to spare.

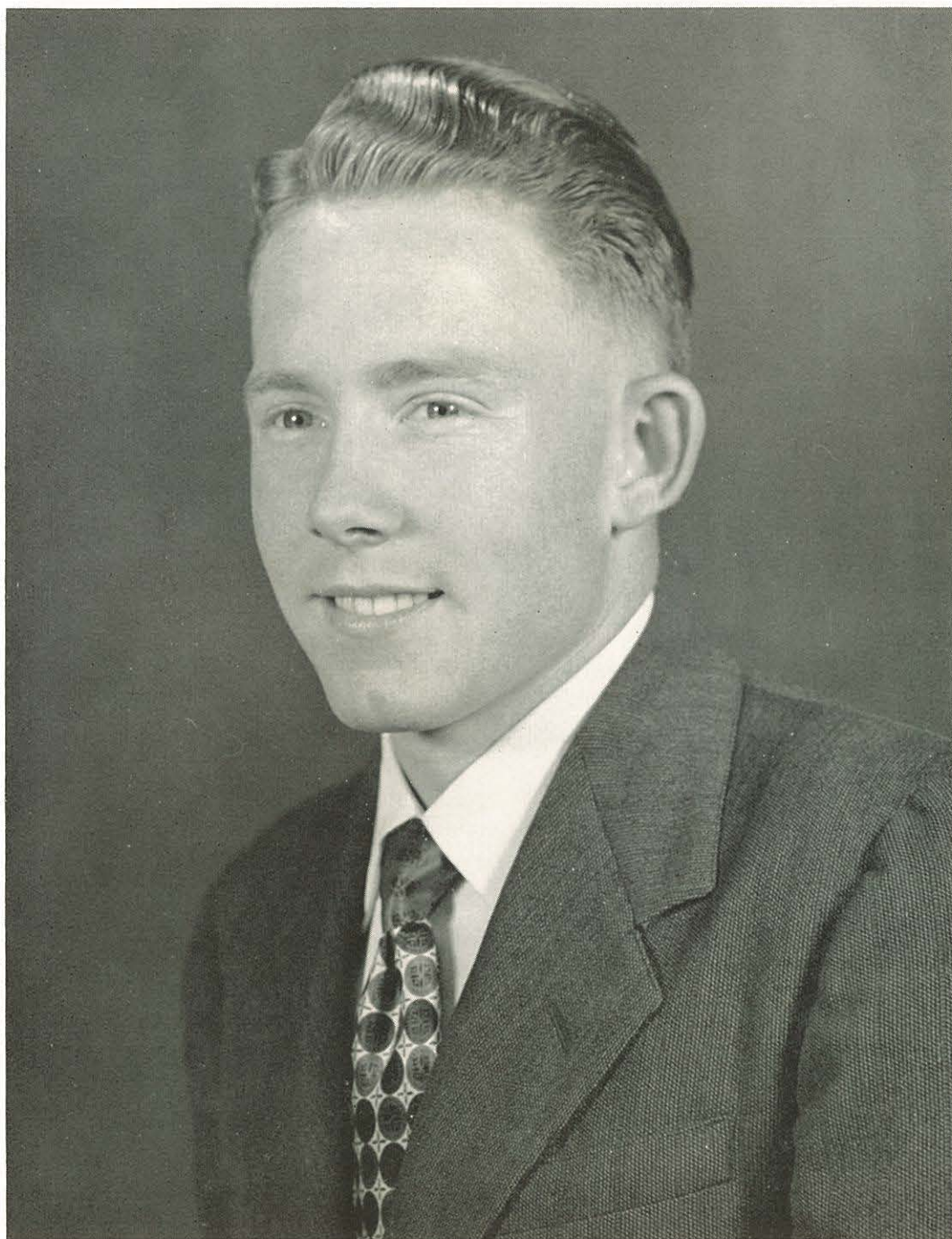
In eternal tomorrow when all will be known

Of hands of love.*

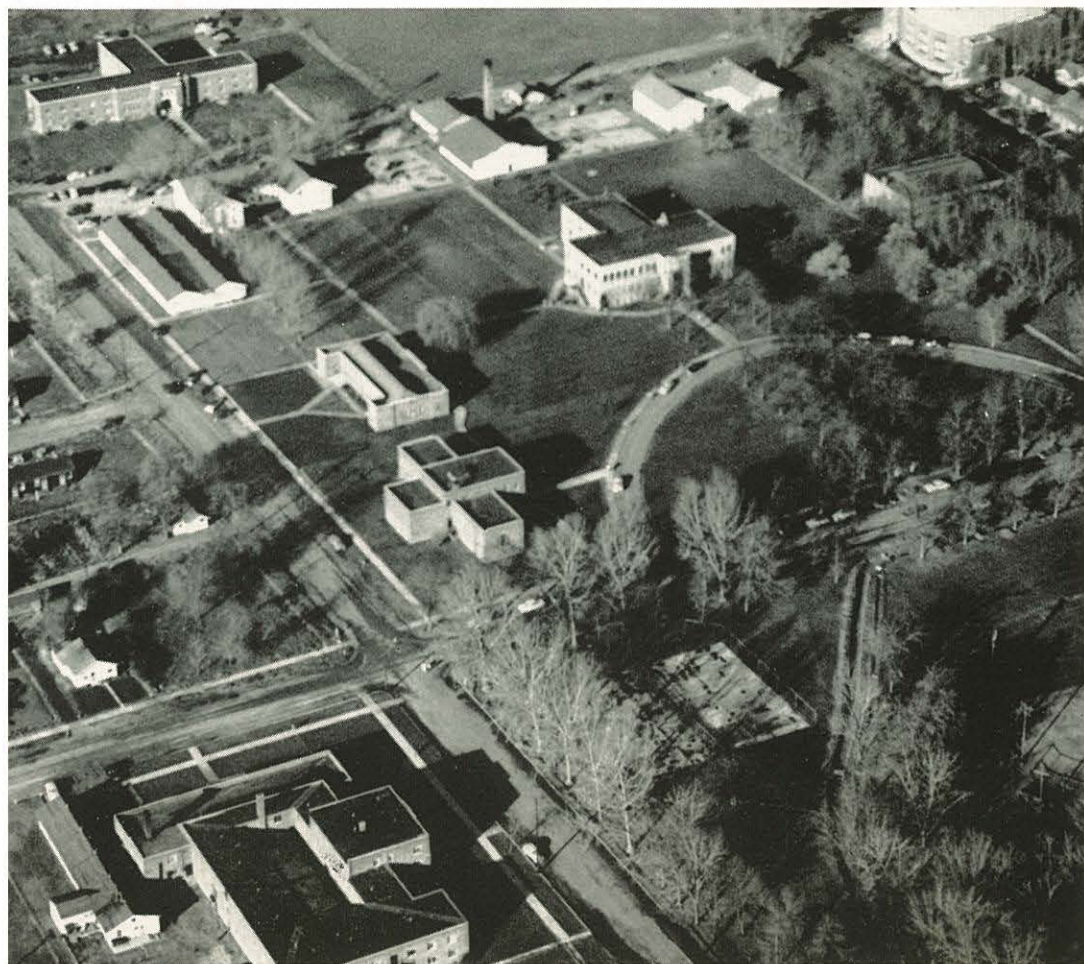

What bit of sculpture will emerge tomorrow from the work of your hands?



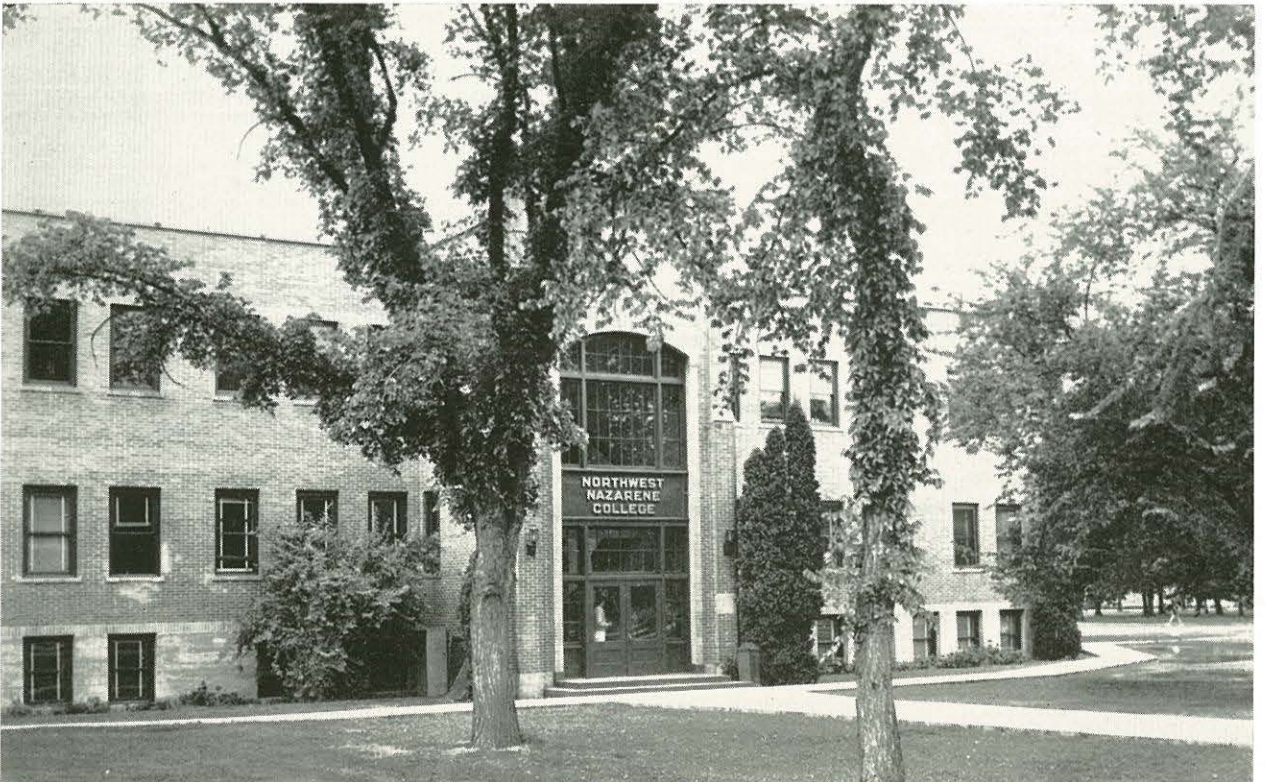

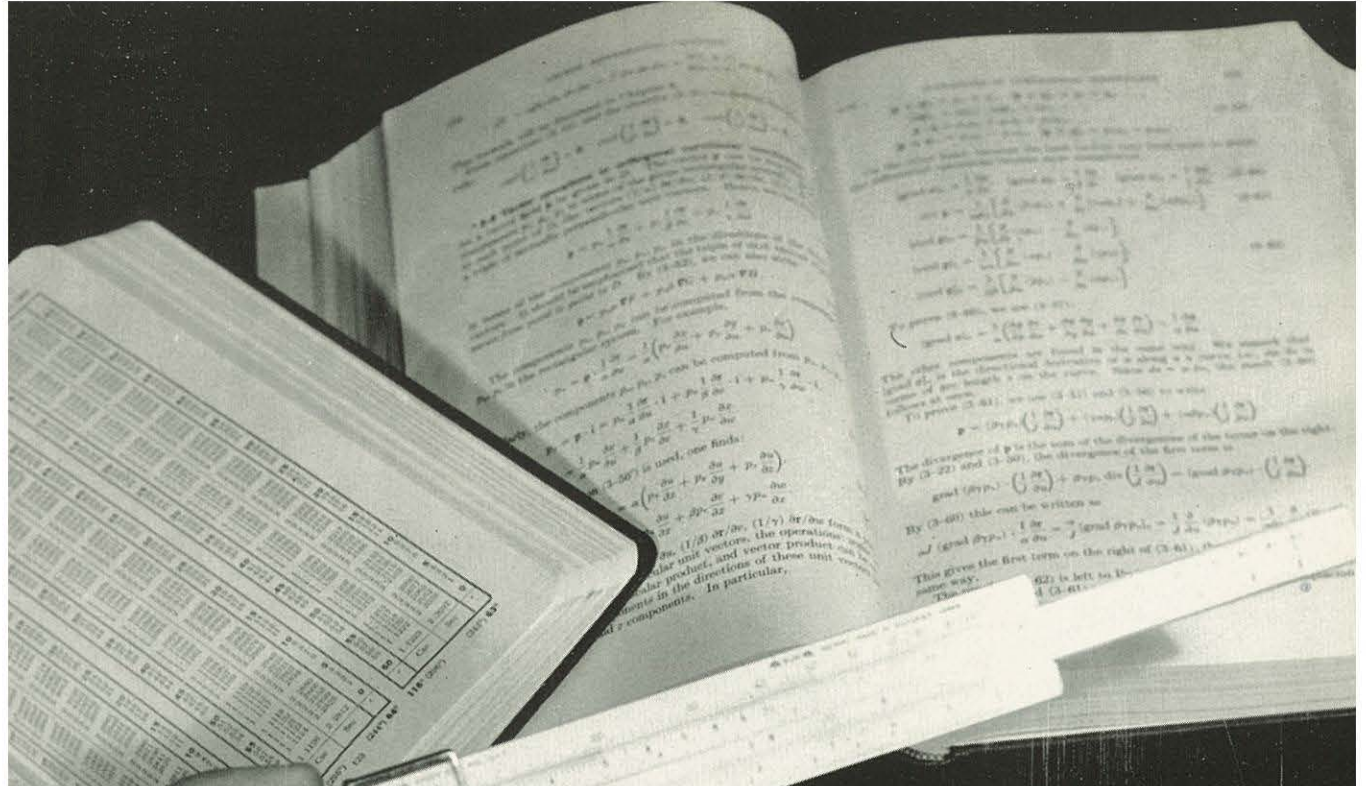

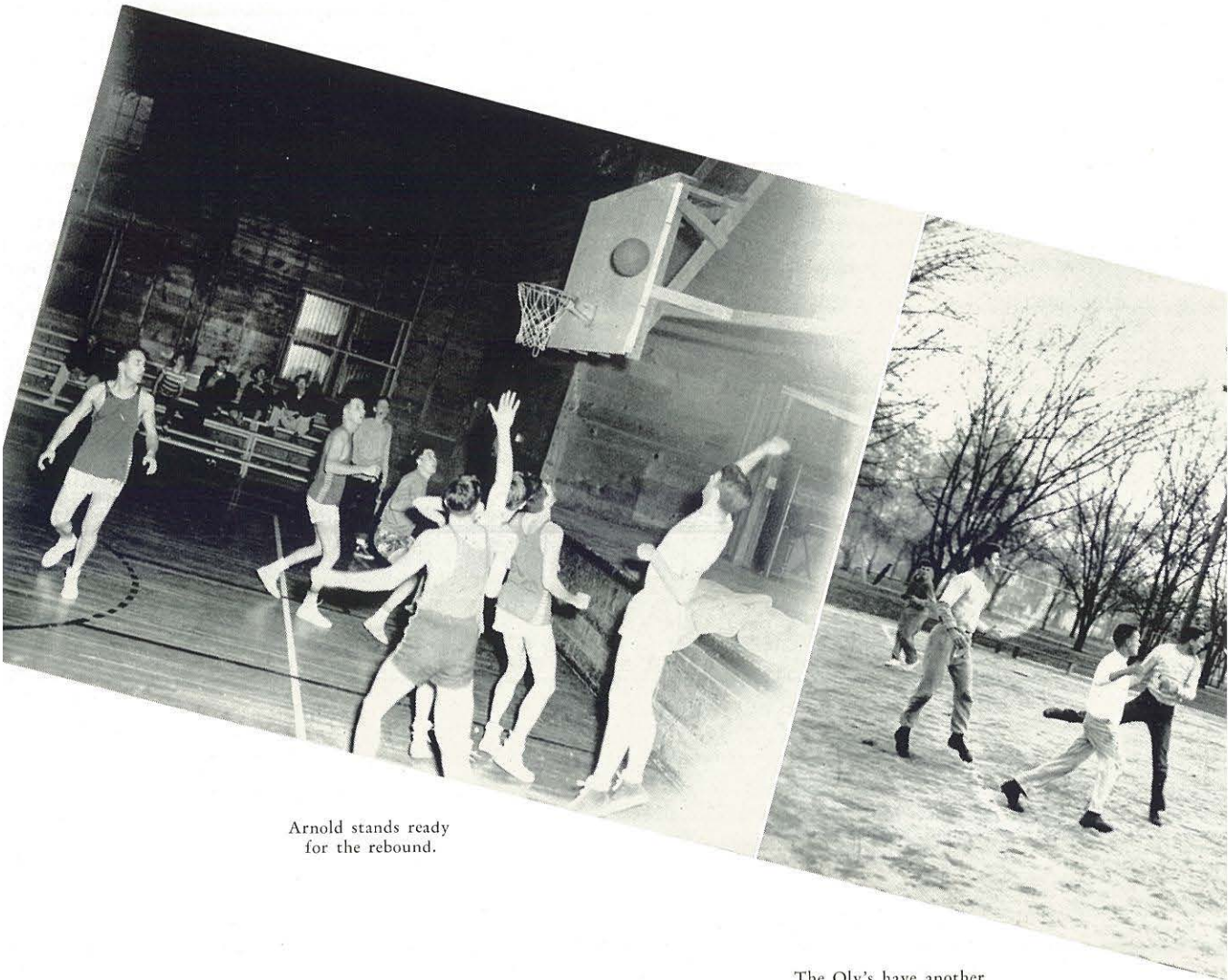

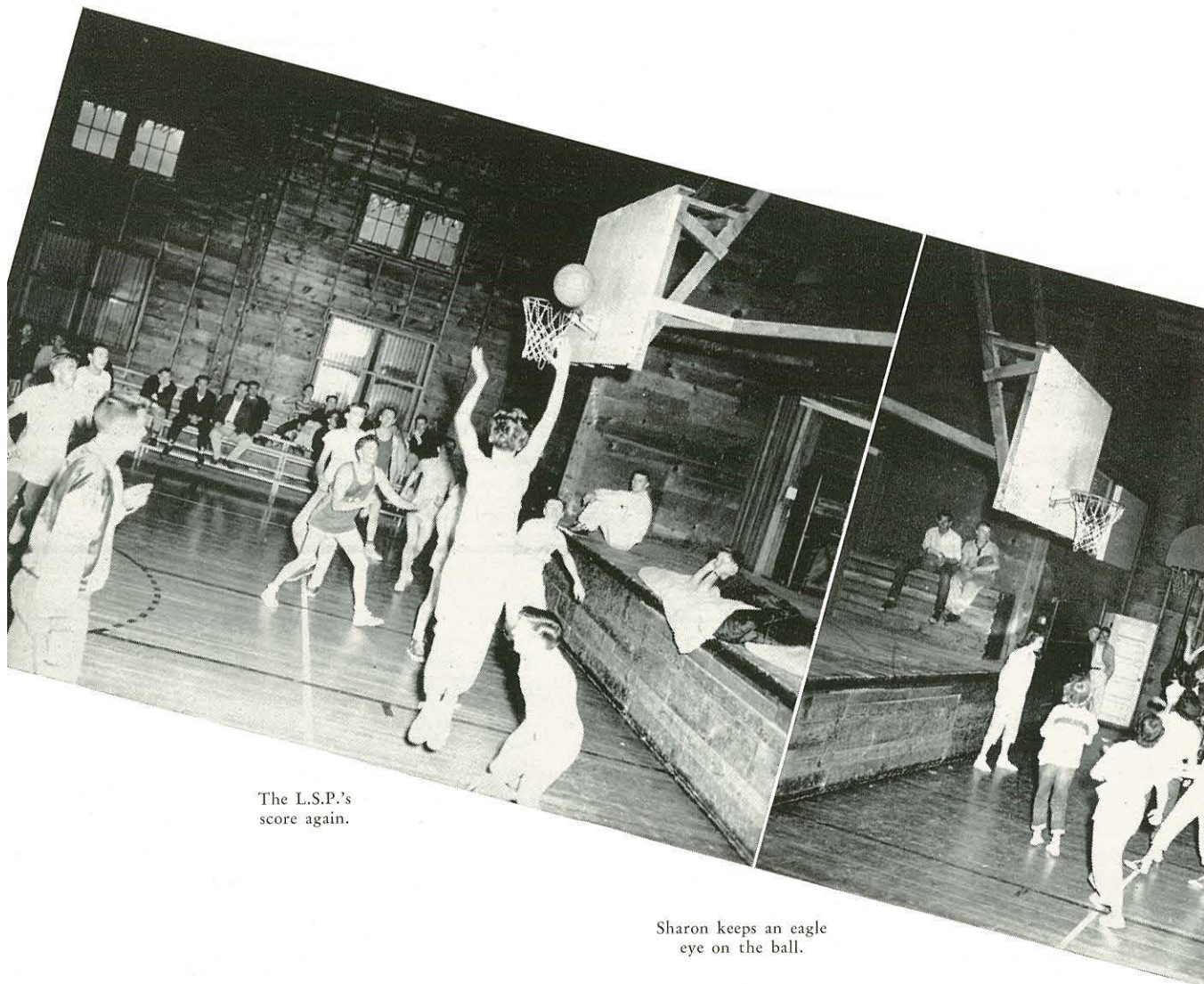

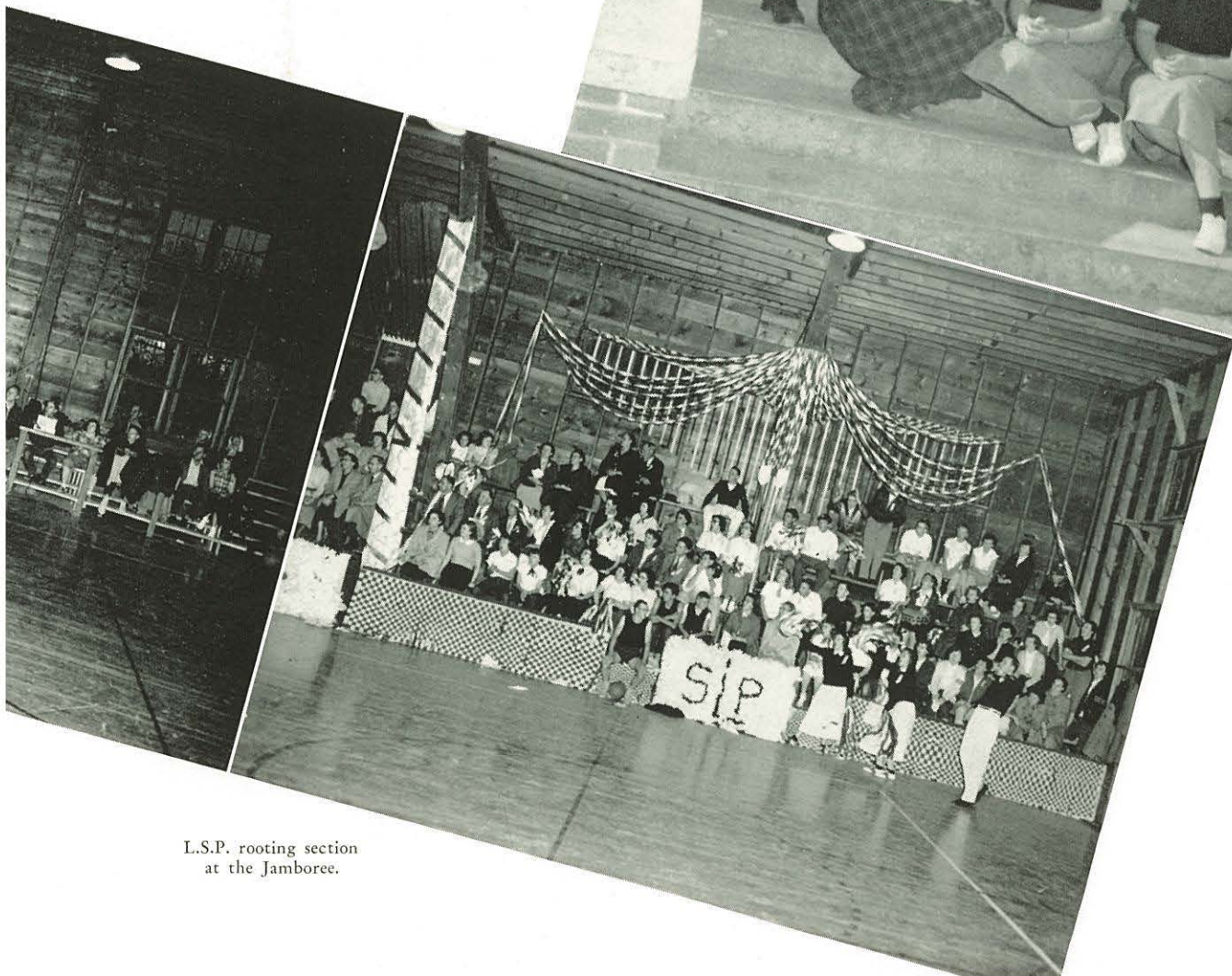

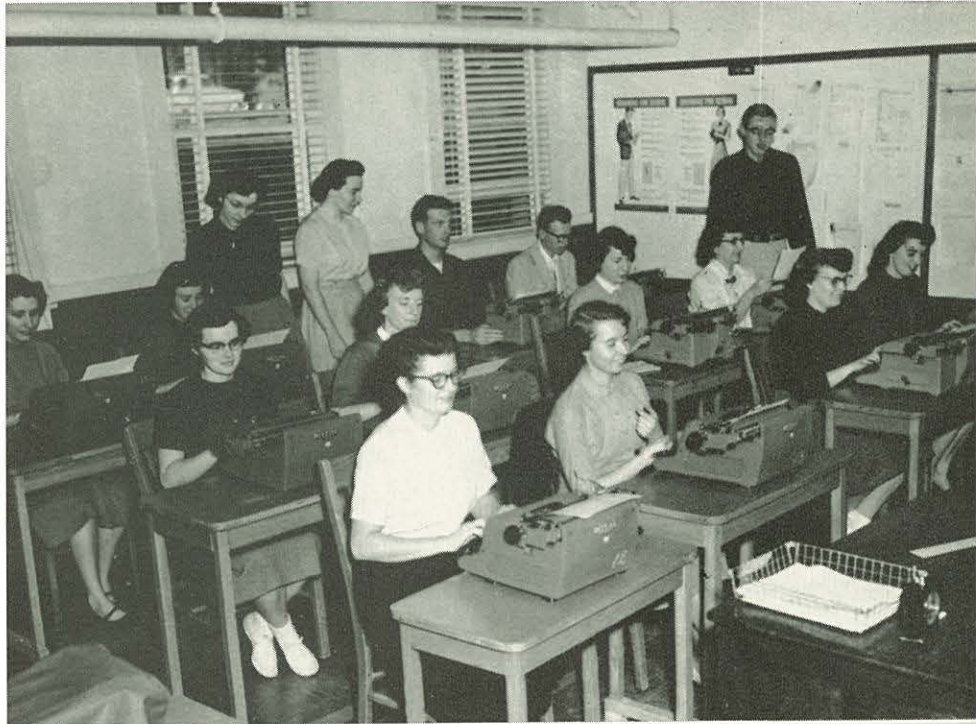
The high light of the year was the opportunity the group had to participate in the Businessmen's Convention which was held on the campus this spring.

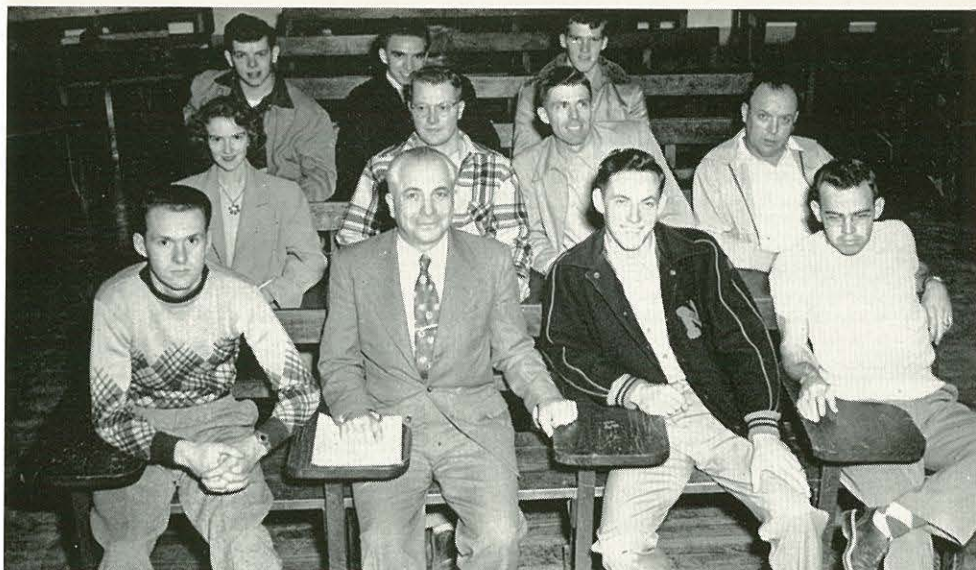

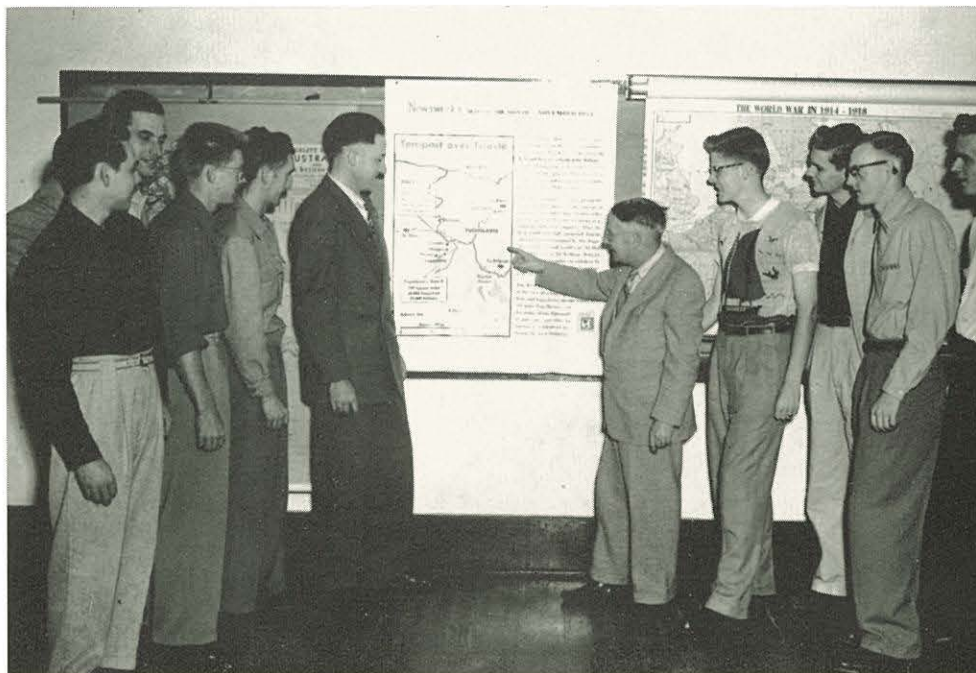

JUNIOR VARSITY

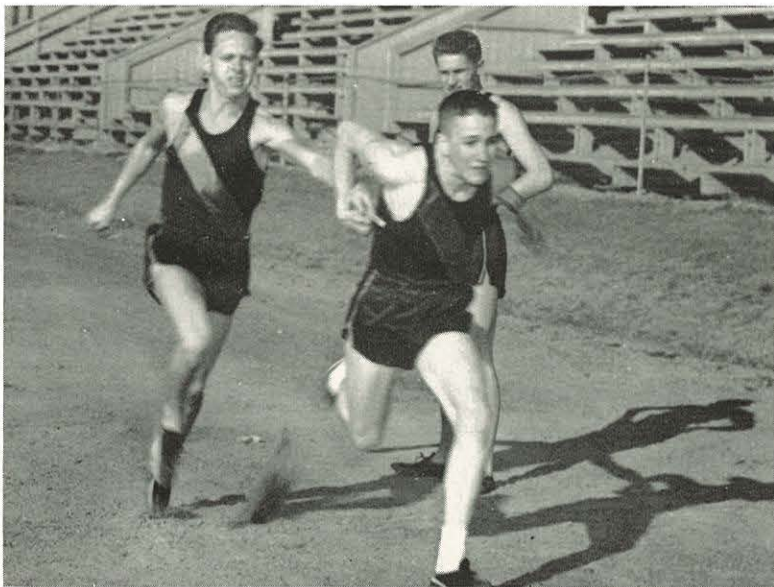

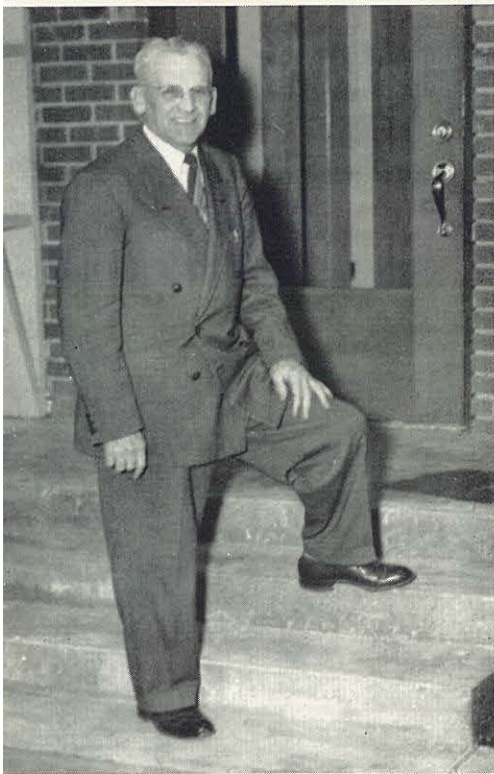
