
## Buildings



T. Williams library. Statistics bear this out for N.N.C.'s record of over 25 books per student checked out yearly puts her in the top twenty-five per cent of U.S. colleges for book use.

A number of instructors use the library and its resources for laboratoy work









in conjunction with their regular schedule of instruction. Mrs. Voget's classes in secretarial science include a unit on the library; education classes meet in the library from time to time to use curriculum and reference materials. And we could go on. . . .

Students have access to the services of three professional librarians, one of whom is always on duty when the library is open.

Head librarian is Mrs. Geneva Bittleston, who came to N.N.C. in 1945. Trained at Western Reserve University, Mrs. Bittleston has headed an expansion program designed to increase the number of book holdings to 25,000 by 1960. Affable, helpful and witty, Mrs. Bittleston is appreciated by faculty and students alike.

In her second year on the library staff, Miss Lois Herron is an alumna of N.N.C. who has returned to serve her alma mater. A leader in her student days, Miss Herron has proved herself a valuable aide in a vital campus spot. During the summer Miss Herron will be finishing work on a master's degree in library science at the University of Washington.


From the leafy campus of a sister college in the South comes Miss Edith Lancaster, newest addition to the library staff. After completing an A.B. at Trevecca Nazarene College, Miss Lancaster obtained a master's degree in library science at George Peabody College for Teachers. In addition to overseeing the cataloging of new books, Miss Lancaster "rode herd" on the seventeen student librarians.

Northwest Nazarene College is becoming a nationally-known institution!

For instance, the spring of '56 marked the second time an N.N.C. choir has traveled to General Assembly.

Dubbed "Operation K.C.," the great event was planned well in advance and several money-raising activities such as concerts were sponsored by choir members. The result was that the Crusader Choir of N.N.C. was heard by thousands of people in attendance at the General Assembly in Kansas City, Missouri.

Another musical group, The "Collegians," became the first quartet ever to represent N.N.C. at the international barbershop quartet contest held on the campus of Pacific University at Forest Grove, Oregon.

Sports-wise, Northwest Nazarene College toured the nation from Seattle, Washington to St. George, Utah to Portland, Oregon, Billings, Montana, and finally to Kansas City where they took part in the N.A.I.A. national tournament. This marked the first time a Crusader basketball team has taken to the maple court in a national tourney.

Nor did the college lag in forensic fame. All the way from Shreveport, Louisiana came Jack Wright to enroll in N.N.C. as a sophomore. When it came time for the All-Idaho Intercollegiate

Forensic Tournament, Jack dusted off one of his original (and inimitable) orations on "The Southern View of Integration" and delivered it to the tune of third place honors.

When came the balmy breezes of spring, members of the girls' tennis team put their heads together with that of Miss Rhodes and decided that they would be the first traveling tennis team for N.N.C. And they were!

Meanwhile there was activity a plenty at home.

The first few weeks of school found campus politicos at work with two debate partners, Jim Martin and Jim Ridgeway, heading Young Republicans and Young Democrats, respectively. All major Idaho candidates visited the college and several spoke in chapel.

An already lively intramural program was sparked even more by the creation of two new athletic-literary societies, the Spartans and Athenians.

In drama the fall semester saw the presentation of two successful collegiate productions, "Love Is Eternal" and the Chinese literary triumph, "Lute Song." Kenneth Shen, exchange student from Formosa, aided immeasurably in the presentation of "Lute Song" which won the faculty award.

Cups in the first-year speech contest were won by Kitty White and Clayton Bonar with Doris Ramsey coming in second. Given honorable mention were Phil Campbell and Allan Olson.

Yell King, Jim Hilliard, sparked an outstanding year in pep and participation at ball games.

### Summary of Divisionals and Majors

Northwest Nazarene College is a fully-accredited, four-year liberal arts college owned, operated and supported by the Church of the Nazarene.

Down through the years since the founding of N.N.C. in 1913, many a student has found the doors of Emerson Administration Building an open invitation to life and learning as well as portals of preparation for the future.

During those first jam-packed days of freshman registration the new Crusader discovers that majors are offered in everything from A to Z—art to zoology! Majors are offered in art, biology, business, chemistry, education, English, history, home economics, mathematics, music, nursing, philosophy, physics, religion, religious education, sociology, speech, zoology. Divisional majors are offered in philosophy and religion, language and literature, social science and mathematics and natural science.

Curriculums leading to certificates are offered in Bible, religious education and secretarial training. Programs preparing for professional study in schools of dentistry, engineering, law and medicine and in theological seminaries may be pursued.

There is also a curriculum of graduate studies leading to the degree of Master of Arts in religion.

In addition to classroom instruction in the various fields of learning, much of interest to students along vocational lines is offered in the various departmental clubs. Business students find an outlet for practical planning and an inspiration for future careers through the N.N.C. chapter of Future Business Leaders of America.

Future Teachers of America has long been active on the local campus through N.N.C.'s E. E. Angell chapter. Incidentally, N.N.C. had the first F.T.A. in Idaho and can claim the further distinction of having the first state F.T.A. president in the person of Norman Crofford.

The Collegiate Ministerial Association, Home Economics Club and other departmental groups make a real contribution to the lives of those

students who find a large share of their extracurricular activities centered in this expression of their major study fields.

Northwest Nazarene College graduates find that their training at N.N.C. has been adequate for the tasks which confront them. An example of this was seen in a conversation at a statewide intercollegiate forensic meet this year.

A lawyer who was judging one of the events asked a contestant from N.N.C. what college he was representing. When the boy replied that he was from N.N.C. the judge's retort was:

"Northwest Nazarene College? I had a high school teacher who was graduated from that institution. She was the best teacher I ever had!"

Similar comments may be made about graduates from all departments of N.N.C.

As this year's Oasis went to press, word had just been received that three N.N.C. graduates —Earl Emerson, Wayne Likens and Helen Bogle —have been awarded substantial grants to pursue graduate work in science.

This year's senior class sees Bill Armstrong and Howard Johnson preparing to enter two of the nation's top medical schools.

Northwest Nazarene College is also making herself known in the political realm with Phyllis Hartley on the staff of Senator Henry Dworshak (R) in Washington, D.C. and Jim Ridgeway, an appointee of Senator Frank Church (D). Jim plans to study law and return to Idaho to practice.










#### Student Government



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## SENIORS




Each Junior enters a door of specialization, in which he seeks knowledge of his major field. This door beckons him on to develop new loyalties and self-confidence.



Overseeing the various aspects of dorm life is the long-suffering dean. The girls are proud of Mrs. Volk, their lovely and thoughtful dorm mother.




#### BRIARWOOD AND HADLEY




Planning the Homecoming reception, ushering and selling at basketball games, and helping at track meets and baseball games are some of the activities of the club.

It is the sincere wish of the staff of the 1957 OASIS that this book will become a living memory of this school year at N.N.C.










### Band

The "winningest" team ever produced by N.N.C., wound up its fabulous season with a 25 win 9 loss record. Big 6' 4" Dave Gardner copped the individual scoring record for the year with a total of 506 points. He also led the team in rebounds with 422. Close behind him were Tom Tracy with 481 points, Duane Peppley with 361.


The team played in three tournaments during the year. In December, the Crusaders emerged victorious in the annual Christmas tourney in Lewiston. In the Intermountain Conference, however, they could only manage a disappointing tie for third. Later, at the close of the season, the N.N.C. cagers entered the District 5 N.A.I.A. tourney at Billings. Again the Crusaders fought their way to victory, downing tough Rocky Mountain and Western Montana Colleges. These victories entitled Coach Orrin Hills and his squad to enter the national meet in Kansas City. Here the Crusaders found competition a little tougher, as they were ousted in their first game by top seeded Southeastern Oklahoma, who later took runners up cup in the tourney.

Besides being the first team in the school's history to win over 20 games in one season, the squad was the first to ever represent N.N.C. in the N.A.I.A. Tournament. One of the main reasons for the excellent season was due to the cooperation and good spirit shown by the team. Coach "Tiger" Hills should be duly congratulated for his hard work and enthusiasm in making this year's team one to be remembered for years to come.







The girls' tennis team, active in intercollegiate competition, has a record of 8-1 of which we are very proud.






A vital part of the spiritual life of N.N.C. is provided by College Church, the "church home away from home."




## The "Messiah"



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




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
