The speakers at the Academy of Senior Professionals' luncheons come from a variety of backgrounds and interests. On March 14th we will welcome a fund raiser from the Salvation Army.



For the past seven years, our March speaker, Mike Jestes, has been working with the Salvation Army as their Divisional Resource Development Director for Arkansas and Oklahoma. He leads a team of six people in fund raising and strategic partnerships throughout the two states.

Mike's formal education includes an undergraduate degree from the University of Oklahoma in Organizational Leadership as well as a master's degree from Oklahoma Christian University in Public Administration.

His professional life began with two decades of work in banking and insurance. Then, he served 14 years as executive director of the Oklahoma Family Policy Council, a statewide public policy non-profit associated with Focus on the Family. Prior to taking the position with the Salvation Army, he spent three years on the staff of the Free Methodist Church in Edmond.

In 1998, Oklahoma's governor appointed Mike to be the chair of the State Advisory Group of Juvenile Justice, a position he held for eight years. More recently, he has been involved with the Oklahoma County Citizens for Juvenile Justice organization.

Mike and his wife, Donna, have been married fortysix years. They have three children and six grandchildren. He says he and Donna enjoy traveling and spending time with the grandchildren.

Grant Winfield Keeton passed away on January 16, 2022. He was born April 23, 1926, in Bethany where he attended public school. After high school graduation in 1944, he enlisted in the Navy, entering service on



"D-Day." After the war, he attended what is now Southern Nazarene University where he met and married Evelyn Hudgens.

Grant began a career with the US Postal Service eventually becoming the Bethany Postmaster. Grant was instrumental in Bethany keeping its own zip code. Today, a building near the post office sports a mural depicting the Pony Express with Grant's portrait.

Grant was very involved in volunteer service. He was president of the Bethany Chamber of Commerce, being named Most Useful Citizen in 1979. He was a Kiwanis member and chairman of "Meals on Wheels."

He was treasurer of the Bethany Historical Society and helped raise funds to start the Bethany YMCA as well as to build the Bethany High School's first football stadium. Those efforts led to his induction into the Bethany Schools Hall of Honor.

At church, he taught a youth Sunday school class, was a Caravan leader, and volunteered in youth camps. He served as a church board member for 18 years and was a NIROGA staff member.

Grant was preceded in death by his wife of 73 years. He is survived by daughter Vickie Stearman of Oklahoma City, son Steve of Rogue River, Oregon, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

A memorial has been established at Southern Nazarene University, "The Evelyn Keeton Memorial Scholarship" (snu.edu/give).



SNU Connections by Howard Culbertson

Our behind-the-scenes SNU employee that we will interview on March 17 for the SNU Connections Moments will be Johnny Stubbs, director of transportation for the university. In that position, Johnny is no stranger to the Academy of Senior Professionals.



Johnny is an Oklahoma native who grew up in Henryetta where his family was part of the Church of the Nazarene. Since graduating from Southern Nazarene University in the early 1970s, Johnny has been involved in the lives of high school and college-age young people.

His first post-college job was at SNU where he was assistant basketball coach. He also was resident director for a period of time in Snowbarger Hall, an SNU men's dormitory. Then, with his new bride Sharon, he served as youth pastor for churches in Amarillo, TX and Sacramento, CA. Back to Bethany, Johnny became head high school basketball coach for Bethany Public Schools as well as a classroom teacher.

Johnny Stubbs has been back on staff at Southern Nazarene University for twenty-one years. For the first 14 years of that period, he was head of security and transportation. The last seven, he has been head of transportation, scheduling the university's fleet of buses and vans and making sure they have qualified drivers. That task includes, of course, the shuttle bus that each month brings people from Southern Plaza and the Sawyer Center parking lot to the ASP luncheon meetings. Indeed, he often drives that shuttle himself.

*Book Discussion*by Barbara Culbertson


