## **2023 Nazarene Fast Facts**

- The Church of the Nazarene ministers in **164 world areas**.
- In 2022, there were **489 missionaries** originating from **63 world areas**, serving in **91 countries**. Of these missionaries, **325 served as global deployed** and **164 were sponsored deployed**. Last year, there were **60 new missionary deployments**. Within these missionary families, there are **306 missionary kids**.
- The number of Nazarene churches dropped to 30,518 churches with slightly over 2.65 million members, a decrease from last year.
- In 2022, there were 468 districts and 33 pioneer areas around the world, with 31,461 credentialed clergy.\*
- 50 educational institutions, including graduate seminaries/theological colleges, 12 liberal arts
  colleges/universities, 30 undergraduate seminaries/theological/Bible colleges, including two
  nurses training colleges, one teacher training college, and 1,032 education centers (extension)
  had a 2022 combined enrollment of 45,124 students globally.\*
- Persons in need were treated at community-based clinics and health care centers all over the
  world with concentrated efforts in India, Papua New Guinea, and Eswatini (formerly known as
  Swaziland).\*
- **376 retired missionaries** received benefits through the Global Missions Pension Plan for the 2021-2022 fiscal year.\*
- NMI membership for 2022 was 1,042,338, with 19,558 organized local NMIs.
- JESUS Film Harvest Partners (JFHP), raising \$4.3 million, reports that World Evangelism Fund (WEF) helped provide infrastructure for 960 JFHP teams to share God's love. In 2022, teams reported over two million evangelistic contacts. Of these contacts, 584,063 indicated decisions for Christ, with 366,191 new believers receiving initial discipleship follow-up. Teams started 10,771 Preaching Points in 2022.
- NMI and others partnered with local churches to help raise slightly less than US \$38.6 million through the World Evangelism Fund during the 2021-2022 fiscal year.\*\*
- Churches globally gave US \$31.4 million for Approved Missions Projects.\*\*
- In 2022, 99 districts gave 5.5 percent of their income and beyond to the World Evangelism Fund (54 of which were from regions other than the USA/Canada region). WEF giving beyond 5.5 percent helps open new work, sustains works opened in recent years, and helps send new missionaries that God calls.<sup>1</sup>
- Missionary Health Care provided US \$406,362 in medical assistance for Nazarene missionaries, through offerings, Memorial Roll gifts, and Distinguished Service Award gifts.\*\*

<sup>&</sup>quot;New work" refers to new world areas, a geographical area, or new entities such as institutions. Pioneer areas or Phase 1 districts are considered new work. When a district reaches Phase 2, it is no longer a "new work."

- Nazarenes gave US \$256,610 to World Mission Broadcast (WMB), providing radio, television, and Internet programs to share the gospel globally.\*\*
- Nazarenes gave US \$4.2 million in deputation and missionary support offerings for missionaries.\*\*
- NMI has all six regions participating in Care and Connection, contributing \$129,203, and creating
  personalized connections between local churches, districts, and missionaries around the world.
   Each connection is vital in continuing to share about the impact of missions.
- Nazarenes gave **US \$2.9 million for Alabaster**, to fund projects in 2022. The Alabaster Offering is used in all six global regions.\*\* No Alabaster funds are used for administrative costs.
- International Student Scholarship Fund (NMI 80th Anniversary project) provided 88 scholarships for students outside the USA/Canada to attend Nazarene theological institutions.
- NMI partnered with Nazarene Compassionate Ministries to give more than US \$8.4 million, for disaster response and compassion projects around the world and to support 11,126 children through Child Development Centers and Pastor's Kid programs.\*\*
- NMI assisted Work & Witness in raising approximately US \$999,576.
