







The school year at Trevecca has been a head-spinner. After a few controversial days in the Fall, things pretty well settled down. The Business Department has not undergone any drastic changes, but instead it has only improved over the past two semesters. The faculty this year included: Mr. Gregory Runyan, Mrs. Mary Phillips, Dr. Mary Ann Meiners, Dr. Alan Matthews, Dr. Wilma Johnson, and the Department Chairperson Dr. James Hiatt. The faculty had a fine year, as did the students.

The true test of a good department is the accomplishments of its students, and if TNC students are the primary indicator, then this department is doing a fantastic job. This year at the Phi Beta Lambda state competition, Trevecca students placed 12 out of the 13

members who traveled to Memphis to compete. 5 of these placed first in their category, five placed second, and two placed third. These include: Jason Scott, who took second place as Mr. Future Business Executive, Sharon Ray placed first in management, Marquette Scott placed second in the job interview, Stephanie Harney received second place in Information Management, Joy Gulley placed first in Economic. Brian Sims placed first in Computer Concepts, Steve Mobley took first place in Computer Applications, Christian Roa finished in third place in Business Principles, Cindy Wells finished first in Business Law, Bart Bullock and Shaun Newman placed second as the Business Decisions Team and Shannon Quinn placed third in Accounting 2.

For bringing the largest percentage of their school PBL chapter to the competition, Trevecca also won the Spirit Award. These students worked hard in written and oral competition against four other schools that were received an award in their category and most of the first and second place members are eligible to travel to Chicago for the National Competition. Our chapter was able to get several members elected as state representatives. These include: Marquette Scott, state secretary, and Joy Gulley, state treasurer. The Department objectives include the development of effective communication skills, broadening of the students' understanding of the nature and role of communication in human affairs. Another objective is to help pre-

pare students for careers and professions which rely heavily on communication skills.

The Communication Department is involved in a number of events that take place throughout the year. One of which is the drama productions. Director Jeff Frame captured the attention of audiences with "Animal Farm" in the Fall and "The Diary of Anne Frank" in the spring. Mr. Frame is also responsible for the touring drama group "MasterWorks". The group travels to schools and organizations all over the area. The Art Of English

The Department of English offers a variety of coursework leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree in English and English Education, as well as minors in English and journalism. Through a series of three General Education courses in English, all Trevecca students receive instruction in writing and literature studies during their first two years. Tutoring and enrichment programs in basic writing and grammar are available through the

Center for Individualized Studies. Introductory language courses in French, German, and Spanish provide students an opportunity to explore communication processes in other cultures.

All English majors and minors support the cultural life of the academic community through regular attendance and participation in recitals, plays, readings, and concerts, particularly the Renaissance Christmas and

Shakespeare Day events. Senior English majors work with faculty advisors to prepare either a scholarly paper or collection of creative writing which is presented in a public lecture or performance. History and the Social Sciences have always been important areas of study at Trevecca Nazarene College. Historians and social scientists alike believe that the perceptions of people different from ourselves in time, space and life-expressions are built upon our understandings of our own social and political experience. The department's goal, therefore, is to promote understanding of modern societies through the methods of the historian and social scientist. Students desiring to enter the professional fields of teaching,

historic preservation, museum-related work, social science, or behavioral science as major fields. In addition, minors in history, political science, behavioral science, social science, social welfare, or sociology may be selected to back up work in any area of study.

The Psychology Program at Trevecca has three goals: to give students a solid base of preparation for graduate study in psychology, to allow students to make the application of psychological ideas and principles to post-baccalaureate work world, and

to provide teacher educational students with appropriate support courses as well as to enhance the general education core. Another objective is to assist all students in acquiring interpretation of human behavior which is in harmony with a Christian view of people and is substantiated by the empirical information of a solid scientific psychology. 

Pursing Success

The Management and Human Relations (MHR) department is an undergraduate program for adults who wish to earn a B.A. degree in management. The students must be at least 25 years of age and have two years of previous college education. The program was started in 1987 and is headed by Mike Clyburn who has been the director for 4 years.

MHR is one of the largest academic departments that is offered at Trevecca. It involves at least 150 students year round. The class meets one night

each week for 13 months. The students work on a year long project thesis in which they research ways to solve problems in their jobs and communities. At the end of the term, they participate in the graduation ceremony.

Many of the students are from middle Tennessee. The average age of the students is 37, and the male/female ratio is 50:50. The staff is excited that they have included Asians, Indians, Negroes, and other minorities in this beneficial program.

This program has increased Trevecca's outreach in several ways. It provides a Christian education for the working community as well as solving problems through each student's project. The Music Department's educational philosophy is based on the premise that a student must experience the performance of music. Therefore,

W hat Hurts?

In 1992, Trevecca's Allied Health Department remains a reputable and competitive asset to the college and is proudly recognized nationwide as a quality avenue to profitable career in medicine. The department specializes in various health programs one of which includes the Physicians Assistant (PA) program.

Dr. Gary C. Johnson heads the program and has served as its director since 1983 and is delighted with what the PA program stands for and has to offer. Serving with Dr. Johnson is Dr. Mike Mordock as the medical director consultant.

The Physician's Assistant program gives interested students an education based in the medical setting, training them as an extension of the physician in any field of medicine. A common misunderstanding centers around the word "assistant." They assist in surgery as well as in the deliveries of babies. They are entitled to prescribe medication and work as an essential link between the doctor and the patient.

There is a growing need for PA personnel. As a matter of fact, a 2 year

bachelor's degree as a PA affords the graduate of 100% chance of getting a job anywhere in the United States. Starting pay anywhere in the country is approximately \$35,000.

Obtaining a PA degree at TNC is something to be proud of. Within the U.S. there exists 51 other PA programs and Trevecca is above the mean in performance on the national boards and is accredited by the American Medical Association. Trevecca's PA program carries quite a reputation, other national programs as is evident by the background of those currently enrolled. The average class size ranges from 25 to 30 students and will double next semester according to applications received.

The curriculum design is focused around a solid foundation based on science and human biology as each new semester builds on the previous one.

One aspect that sets TNC's PA program apart from the rest takes shape when noticing how the staff and faculty view their students. There is a great dedication as the PA program personnel maintain an on-going asso-

ciation with the students after graduation. The program also has a unique orientation with a Christian emphasis which makes a considerable difference in all areas concerned and is noted as being contributing factor in Trevecca having one of the best Physicians Assistant programs in America.

One final aspect about the program that needs stressed concerns how it takes a total program effort working with students to educate with the best interest of the students' in mind to produce the best results. The TNC PA program operates from this perspective and is never satisfied with excellence. That's why they are always involved in an on-going self-study. This means that the program is always working and probing on how to possibly be of even better quality and to see if students are really adherent and truly satisfied. A hard working and diligent faculty, a Christian emphasis, a reputable post and a promising future; all of which points to excellence in Trevecca's Physicians Assistant Program. 

The Department of Mathematics and Science at Trevecca not only provides the necessary courses for General Education requirements but also offers courses to obtain degrees in six different areas. Also offered in the Department of Science and Math is training in Careers in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, and engineering.

The variety of majors offered in the department include Biology, Chemistry, General Science, Mathematics, Mathematics Education, and Mathematics/Computer Science.

Biology majors' objectives consist of exploring and classifying organisms while determining and identifying characteristics of organisms in relation to their place in the environment. A

Biology major should also be able to carry out experiments concerning specific biological problems.

Chemistry majors are expected to be thoroughly aware of properties, principles, and general concepts in the area of Chemistry. Interpreting, demonstrating, and formulating solutions to chemical problems at a college level is required to complete a Chemistry major.

A General Science Teacher Education major is expected to prepare, analyze, and identify chemical solutions and biological systems, appropriately listing the functions of each.

Mathematics and Mathematics Education majors, as well as Mathematics/Computer Science majors are

required to determine specific solutions for mathematical problems and organize particular lesson plans to demonstrate in the manner most effective. To successfully complete a major in Math/Computer Science, a student needs a full knowledge of certain computer systems as well as mathematics.

With only two underclassmen and one senior returning, the Trojans had a tough season, finishing 13-20 overall. Because they had so many new players, it was hard for the team to work together. "Only two players on the team had ever played together," Greg Scharf, a junior, said of himself and senior David Suddeth. And although the freshmen and the transfers had talent, it was difficult for them to work together. "Most of us worked really hard. We had good talent, but we couldn't seem to put it all together," sophomore Jason Pennington remarked.

Despite the lack of experience and the loss of several key starters in some of the games, the Trojans finished 8-7 in the conference. David has averaged 22.9 points per game and has been selected to each All-Tournament team in every tournament the Trojans have played in for the past four years. He was also named Second Team All-American his junior year and Honorable Mention All-American in both his sophomore and senior seasons.

David says this year in particular has taught him that it is really not all about winning. "Getting along is the most important thing. This year we really learned to get along." And since the Trojans were able to gain experience, both on and off the court, along with some good recruiting, next year promises to be a better year. 


"For the first time, we had team unity and we all got along great, probably due to the new coach."

Along with improving relationships and team records, this year's team had very significant academic accomplishments. All six members made the Academic All-Conference Team and three players, juniors Dee Howell, Stacie Nichols, and Kim Tinker, were nominated for Academic All-American.

Knowing that the 1991-1992 season would be the last for the program, the women worked hard and did their best for their coaches and for themselves. The men's team also tried hard to do well since it was the last year. And do well they did. "We tried to do our best for Coach Smith," freshman Roger Merz, who will return to Switzerland to play next year, said. The men finished their season with an impressive 14-0 district record and 20-2 overall. They also clinched to district title, taking 34 of the maximum 36 points, and once again earned a well deserved trip to the national tournament. Three of the six players and one of the doubles teams received NAIA national rankings. Freshman Juan Carlos Bianchi, who has been nominated

Although they knew that they would be leaving after this season, the men managed to pull together. However, the news of the cancellation of the program put a significant damper on the season. Smith, who achieved his 300th career victory as a coach this year, pointed out that the news made the season very different. "It was an emotionally draining year for me because I knew it was the last. There was no loyalty built among the guys because they had to begin looking for another school in mid-January."

Regardless of the shocking news, the men agree that this season was great and exciting. Freshman Mucha Murapa said, "Although we're losing the program, we kept smiling and had a lot of fun." Adam Lane, the only American on a team whose other members originate from Argentina, Venezuela, England, Sweden, and Switzerland, said that this season was very special to him. "I got to meet and know some of the best players from all over the world." Juan Garat, an All-American in doubles in 1990, believes this team was more united than those of the past. "We all respected each other. If we had a problem, we tried to solve as a team."

Both teams would attribute much of their success to the man who has been at the helm of Trevecca tennis for twenty years. To many people, Coach Alan Smith has been a coach, a leader, and a friend. Junior Dee Howell points out, "He is not only my coach but also my friend. Despite what we've done to hurt him, he's been loyal to both the team and the school." Junior Stacie Nichols, who is from Oregon, agrees. She said, "Coming from across the country, he's not only been a coach but a father figure to me. Since I've been here I've gained a lot of respect for him. He's a great example, especially in his walk with Christ." Coach Smith, looking back on his career at Trevecca, reflected on his years of coaching: The 1991-1992 Tennis program was once again one of strength, integrity, and winning. Whether playing for the team, themselves, or Coach Smith, both the women's and men's teams proved themselves once again and will walk away with both great friendships and the memory of the winning tradition they carried on through the final year of Trevecca tennis. 









James A. Knear was a teacher of Communication, but more importantly, he was a teacher of students, preferring to call them "colleagues." Students sensed that respect and thrived on it.




