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Building for Tomorrow

If the Church of the Nazarene is to become permanent and go forward with its great work of spreading Scriptural Holiness, we must maintain our schools. Our schools are the bulwarks of our offensive and defensive movements. They train our preachers and missionaries and then they preserve the faith of their converts during the trying days of the educational period. Our schools not only benefit those who attend them, but they give strength and encouragement to those who are unable to take courses in residence. Those of our people who are attending schools where faith has to maintain a great fight against materialistic evolution and higher criticism are stronger for knowing that we have schools where all the essentials of knowledge are taught and yet where the tenets which are opposed to faith are rejected. Education is not the hand maiden of scepticism when it is carried on under the influence of sanctified teachers and true Christlan environment.

The Church of the Nazarene now has eight schools, and, considering the geographical necessities, this seems to be about the number that we ought to have and they are quite well located for serving our constituency. The General Board of Education has now asked all our schools to set in to raise money to pay off their indebtedness, so that our schools can present "A clean slate" by the time the General Assembly meets.

Our Northwest Nazarene College at Nampa, Idaho is one of our best and most promising schools. Dr. Wiley is a great college president and is signed up for a long term of service with our school at Nampa. I think it is proper to say of Dr. Wiley as of Mark Hopkins, that with Dr. Wiley on one end of a log and a student on the other you have a university. There is as fine a religious atmosphere and as genuine a missionary spirit at Nampa as at any other place in the United States. The student body there is predominantly Christian and is as serious and as much in earnest as any that can be found. The country about Nampa is ideal for home making and presents a most splendid opportunity for people to come and locate and make a living while educating their children. Then the plant, when completed, will be one of the best in our movement. The brethren there have had vision and have planned on a permanent basis and there is no tearing up of foundations to be done. When paid for, the Nampa property will be a credit to our whole movement and an honor to the Nazarenes of the Northwest.

The Nazarenes of the Northwest Educational District are strictly loyal and progressive and will "Come up to the help of the Lord" in the matter of paying off the indebtedness on the school. The school is, in a special sense, the property and project of the people of this Educational District, since they have to bear almost all the load themselves. Brother Little and Dr. Wiley have worked out a plan for lifting the indebtness on the school and the people of the Northwest are going to co-operate with them and see them through to success. The amount required is not large, considering the number who are called upon to pay it. It will just require full cooperation and the earnest help of every one concerned—that is all. And we must carry the plan through and pre-

sent the school free from debt to the next General Assembly.

The Call for Teachers

Many people, including some of the holiness churches, overlook the fact that God calls some to be teachers. In the ancient church they were needed and recognized. St. Paul mentions teachers as third in order in the church, and as called of God to this work.

What a wonderful thing it would be for our churches to have God-called teachers in the Sunday Schools! If a preacher who is called of God needs to be trained, surely a teacher needs training.

But what kind of training do teachers get in the regular Teachers' Colleges and Normal Schools? The teacher is taught so that she can teach the children, that the child is the product of evolution and exemplifies all stages of animal life in his development. The child's play is used as illustrating this,—running through leaves is the dog playing; climbing trees is the monkey life; digging caves and living in a tent is the barbarian survival, and so on. Especially the child's hand and brain are quoted as instances of evolution.

Nor is this all. On the social side, the Normal Schools and Teachers' Colleges usually emphasize dancing, moving pictures and dramatization. Dancing occupies a prominent place in the plays and games of the children, and many lessons are dramatized in the primary and Grammar School grades. Is it not clear that the holiness colleges should stress the training of teachers, as well as preachers and missionaries?

Teachers educationally equipped and trained in our holiness schools are in demand in the public schools and they are needed. We should also train teachers for our own schools. A professor in one of our schools admitted to his class one day, that, while he had a good experience of salvation, the training which he received in the University had biased his thinking and teaching along evolutionary lines. We believe that Northwest Nazarene College is a good place to train teachers to answer the call.

An Urgent Need in the Church

With our rapidly growing work our needs are many. We need equipment of every kind; we need church buildings. One ever present need seems to be money. Yet with all these, there remains still a very pressing need. As one goes over the various districts one finds that although there may be the problem facing the different pastors of a place to worship, although there may be the question how the budget is to be raised and how the different benevolences are to be cared for. yet over and above all these, there comes the urgent need of men to man the work. Many churches are without pastors, and the interest and prosperity wane because of this. In the pastoral appointments of nearly every assembly several places are read "To be supplied." Then there are many fields that might be opened up, but the question at once arises, who would care for the work, if it should be opened up so because of this the opportunity is lost.

That this need is a very fundament; al one is apparent from the fact that the churches constitute our main resources to supply all of the rest of our institutions. Without the home churches we can not have foreign missionary work. Just now we are facing the problem of financing the missionaries already on the field, and there is need that we send others that they may be in training so that when those who are now serving us come to the time of furlough, trained missionaries may be in readiness to take their places. Yet we can not do this because of the lack of financial depression and also in part due to the fact that we have not the vision as we ought, yet there is no doubt the futher reason that our home base is not strong enough, that we need to enlarge our borders at home that we may be ready to carry a heavier load on the foreign field. Then there are

our other interests such as our Publishing House and our schools which are in need of strong financial support. With out the churches these can not run.

Not only is this need a fundamental one, but it is also one that can be supplied only by our own institutions. Some time ago Dr. Chapman wrote an article for the Herald of Holiness entitled, "The Cat Brought up in the Mill," In this he showed how men from other denominations as a rule do not fit into our work. They have not the peculiar Nazarene touch. We have sometimes seen men come to us with a great flourish of banners, and we felt that a truly great man had come into our midst, but inside of a year's time, he has been heard of no more; he has disappeared, no doubt he had returned to his own kindred. On the other hand, when our young people have been converted in our churches, sent to our schools and kept in training for a number of years, they become thoroughly infused with the Nazarene spirit and ideals and go out into the church as a part of it and propagate the true Nazarene

teaching because it is an inherent part of them and not some accretion that has been added unto themselves.

Since then we need our own men trained in our own schools, we see the imperative need of supporting our institutions. Here is where we are to get the men and women to man the church in days to come. Our older workers are dropping off one by one. Those who have stood the storms in the earlier days are going on to their reward, and a new band of workers must come forth, From our schools each year they are coming, full of fire and enthusiasm, bringing in new life and energy. To fail to maintain our schools, would be to fail to support the very source of our livelihood. These are the men we need for our churches to go into the new districts and to revive some of the older works. If we are crying for workers for a special section of the field and we feel that the need is great, that finance is required for the local need, we should consider that if we limit our finance to our local need, we thus are dealing ourselves a death blow, for we cut ourselves off from receiving properly trained men to care for the work that we would finance. Thus by financing our schools, we help our work. It may be that it will take a number of years for the "bread that is cast upon the waters" to return in some cases, for a thoroughly trained worker is not made in a day, but at the end the returns will come and then the waiting will be amply repaid. We feel confidence in our church that has so loyally stood by us that they will continue to do so and thus we shall scw and reap together.

Greater Things Ahead

We have not begun to realize the possibilities we have as Nazarenes through closer co-operation and more systematic presentation of our work. The Seventh Day Adventists are only about twice the size of our church from a numerical standpoint, but here is their record, as taken from a recent report.

They have over 1,000 parochial schools and 100 academies and colleges, including a medical college and missionary training schools. In these schools and colleges are 2 500 teachers and over 40,000 students. They have 46 Publishing Houses, 23 of these being in the foreign fields. Recently they devised a plan whereby the larger publishing houses would give assistance to the smaller ones by furnishing financial support to the extent of 55 per cent of the net earnings. In one year—the first year that this plan was tried, \$182,000.00 was donated to the smaller publishing houses In addition they trained their superintendents editors and printers. They send out on an average of 100 missionaries every year.

The Nazarenes have only eight schools and colleges and these are well located geographically for our work. The Northwest Nazarene College represents the educational interests in the Northwest and is backed by over 3,000 Nazarenes. In view of the above, our task does not seem so large. Let us make this campaign a great success and come np to the Assembly with the college out of debt and our buildings completed.

The large deficit for the year 1918-1919 is due to the fact that the school was closed on account of the "flu" and tuitions were refunded while salaries were paid.

The deficit for 1921-1922 is due to the fact that we failed to receive the budget funds from the districts. Had our Educational District paid us the small sum of \$1.00 per member per year there would have been a balance in our treasury this year instead of a deficit.

It may be easily seen that we shall have no difficulty in carrying on the running expenses of the College if the Districts will place \$1.00 per member per year in their hudget for the education of the young people and then promptly pay their obligation.

In the above statement we have been very conservative in the value of equities, notes and accounts; it is true that our indebtedness must all be paid even though there is a shrinkage of our assets.

We have included no pledges which are not backed up by notes although we have a definite promise by one of our creditors that when we pay \$7500.00 he will donate \$5000.00.

From the statement above shown it is very evident that when we raise approximately \$50000.00 we will have Our Plant Clear and it is Worth One Hundred Twenty nine Thousand Eight Hundred Twelve Dollars and Eighty-nine Cents.

In our report last Assembly we showed an indebtedness of \$100,000.00; this year \$80,000.00, a reduction of \$20,000.00. Thank God and take courage.

You will note that \$31486.11 was paid in during the year; some of this was paid in on the Budget, \$6000.00 was used to pay the interest so the actual indebtedness was reduced only \$20,000.00.
